In preparing this background report, we undertook an examination of all readily available and relevant electronic and online records, several hundred Nexis and news articles, dozens of active and archived web pages, and several dozen public records from Nexis and the resources of various federal, state, and municipal government offices. The results of our analysis are contained below.

Voting History

• Since 1995, Rubio has failed to vote in at least five elections including the 2020 presidential preference primary election.

Foreclosure

- In June 2010, Rubio and several others were named in a lis pendens and foreclosure complaint.
 - In June 2010, the case was dismissed after the property was sold or the outstanding debts were paid.

Recent Profressional Ties

Former Lobbying Firm Foreign Ties

• In March 2022, Rubio's former employer, Becker & Poliakoff disclosed they were lobbying on behalf of Qatar.

Ties To Trump Critics, Journalists, And Democrats

- On his 2022 Personal Financial Disclosure, Rubio revealed that he received \$30,000 from the Javelin Group, which is a literary agent group co-founded by Matt Latimer.
 - In 2019, Latimer represented then-anonymous Miles Taylor, who published "A Warning," which sought to undermine the Trump Administration and was highly critical of Trump and his advisors.
 - In 2019, the Javelin Group promoted the book on Twitter.

- The Javelin Group has worked with a variety of journalists and Democrats, including outspoken Trump critic Tim Alberta, whose book appeared on Barack Obama's favorite reads of the year.
 - The Javelin Group tweeted they agreed with President Obama about his recommendation of the book.
- The Javelin Group has also worked with Democrats including far-left Minnesota Attorney General Keith Ellison.

Anti-Trump Record

<u>Overall</u>

- Media narrative: Rubio's evolution on Trump outspoken critic to hopeful Vice President.
 - Rubio was an outspoken opponent of Trump "before he ended up grudgingly backing Trump in 2016, more enthusiastically backing him in 2020, and even more enthusiastically backing him in 2024—endorsing him in January over their home state Governor, Ron DeSantis, the day before the Iowa Caucus".
 - Recently, in March 2024, Rubio claimed he would be honored to serve as Vice President.
 - Rubio initially rejected being Trump's Vice President but has since flip-flopped.

2016 Primary

- During the 2016 campaign, Rubio offered harsh, vocal criticisms against Trump and promoted the Never Trump movement.
 - 2016: "Rubio has called Trump a 'con man' seeking to perpetrate 'the biggest scam in American political history' on American voters, and attacked him for his failed businesses, allegedly fraudulent real-estate courses and his lack of policy proposals...".
 - On social media, Rubio repeatedly promoted the never Trump movement during the 2016 GOP primary.
- During the 2016 campaign, Rubio levied allegations that Trump destroys America and promotes violence.
 - Video: In a march 2016 press conference, Rubio condemns Trump's violent rhetoric for feeding into a political culture that will result in America being "ripped apart at the seams".
 - Video: In a march 2016 press conference, Rubio claimed Trump's movement and rhetoric was a "frightening, grotesque and disturbing development in American politics".

- Video: In March 2016, Rubio blames Trump for political violence and encouraging it with his lack of leadership.
- Video: In 2016, Rubio broadly criticizes Trumpism as an empty reaction to anger and frustration in America and contends Trump does not actually represent real leadership.
- Video: In March 2016, Rubio criticizes Trump's rhetoric promoting violence as "disastrous" and accused him of promoting hate, anger, and frustration.
- On his 2016 campaign site, Rubio promoted his claims that Trump was "ripping our country apart" and urged his supporters to "Stop Donald Trump".
- During the 2016 campaign, Rubio levied allegations that Trump destroys the Republican Party and conservative movement.
 - Video: In 2016, Rubio contended Trump was destroying the Republican Party and the conservative movement.
 - On social media, Rubio offered several other criticisms regarding Trump's alleged harms for the conservative movement.
- During the 2016 campaign, Rubio levied allegations that Trump is dangerous for the world.
 - In 2016, Rubio contended that Trump was dangerous and could not be trusted with America's nuclear codes – a position he continued to hold even after dropping out of the 2016 GOP primary.
 - On social media, Rubio offered several other criticisms regarding Trump's alleged danger for the world.
- During the 2016 campaign, Rubio promoted criticisms of Trump's personal characteristics (ad hominem attacks).
 - During the 2016 campaign, Rubio made "fun of Trump's tan, his hair and ultimately the size of his hands a veiled jab at Trump's manhood".
 - Rubio suggested Trump once wet his pants after debating him.
- During the 2016 campaign, Rubio promoted criticisms of Trump's character and business record.
 - In 2016, Rubio did not disavow Trump after his access Hollywood comments but noted "I ran against Donald Trump. And while I respect that voters chose him as the GOP nominee, I have never hesitated to oppose his policies I disagree with. And I have consistently rejected his offensive rhetoric and behavior. I disagree with him on many things...".

- In 2016, Rubio alleged Trump was a "con artist" who "has spent his entire career sticking it to the little guy".
- Video: Rubio: "Donald j. Trump is a political con man ... He's trying to take over the party of Reagan and the conservative movement we can't let that happen".
- Video: Rubio, on Trump: "he's not a conservative. But more importantly, he's a con".
- Video: Rubio: "if Donald J. Trump is president, he's not going to make America great. He's going to make America broke".
- Rubio: "Donald Trump has been perhaps the most vulgar no i don't think perhaps the most vulgar person to ever aspire to the presidency...".
- In 2016, "Florida Sen. Marco Rubio and Texas Sen. Ted Cruz released income and federal tax data Saturday as part of an attempt to pressure Donald Trump, the Republican presidential front-runner, to do the same".
- On social media, Rubio repeatedly criticized Trump for his record on Trump university and being a fraud.
- During the 2016 campaign, Rubio promoted criticisms of Trump's rhetoric on race and immigration.
 - In 2015, Rubio condemned Trump's comments on Mexican immigrants noting "Trump's comments are not just offensive and inaccurate, but also divisive".
 - Video: in 2016, Rubio condemned Trump for failing to firmly disavow the KKK and contended it made him unelectable.
 - On social media, Rubio repeatedly criticized Trump for being a hypocrite on immigration.
- During the 2016 campaign, Rubio promoted criticisms of Trump's rhetoric on terrorism and the military.
 - Video: in 2015, Rubio criticized Trump's criticism of Bush over 9/11 and claimed Trump "doesn't have a fundamental understanding of what caused 9/11".
 - Rubio, in 2015: "America's POWs deserve much better than to have their service questioned by the offensive rantings of Donald Trump".
- During the 2016 campaign, Rubio promoted criticisms of Trump's record on workers.
 - Rubio's 2016 campaign site claimed "Donald Trump puts American workers last"; the site promoted opposition research attacking Trump's record on labor and his companies' various worker related controversies.
 - Video: Rubio: "Trump tower was built by illegal immigrants from Poland".

- Rubio was known to have skipped the 2016 Republican National Convention despite endorsing Trump.
 - In May 2016, Rubio "told reporters he'll not only vote for Trump, he'd be willing to speak on his behalf at the Republican National Convention in Cleveland".
 - Previously, Rubio had been reluctant to endorse Trump in April 2016 and had been signaling his support for Ted Cruz after dropping out.
 - In July 2016, Rubio noted he would not be attending the 2016 RNC citing campaign events.
- During the 2016 campaign, Rubio promoted a slew of additional criticisms of Trump.
 - In 2015, "Florida Sen. Marco Rubio bashed GOP front-runner Donald Trump a day after the real estate mogul called the use of eminent domain 'wonderful'".
 - In January 2016, Rubio criticized Trump as a distraction and "entertaining sideshow" for skipping a debate.
 - On social media, Rubio called several times for voters to "Stop Trump".
- During the 2016 campaign, Trump was known to promote criticisms against Rubio.
 - Trump, in 2016: "I will be using Facebook and twitter to expose dishonest lightweight Senator Marco Rubio. A record no-show in Senate, he is scamming Florida".
 - In 2016, Trump "laced into Rubio as 'even worse' than Ted Cruz, calling the Florida Senator 'such a scoundrel'".
 - Trump: "lightweight Marco Rubio was working hard last night. The problem is, he is a choker, and once a choker, always a choker! Mr. Meltdown".
 - Video: in 2016, Trump mocked Rubio's widely panned SOTU response during which Rubio awkwardly drank water.
 - Video: in 2016, Trump mocked Rubio as "little Marco".
 - Video: in 2016, Trump mocked Rubio as a "choke artist".

Post-2016 Primary / Trump Rhetoric

- Following the 2016 primary, Rubio still expressed criticism of Trump's rhetoric on race.
 - In June 2016, Rubio criticized Trump's racial attacks against Judge Gonzalo Curiel.
 - In August 2016, Rubio criticized Trump's attacks against Gold Star Parent Khizr Khan.

- In 2017, Rubio was one of the Senators critical of Trump's rhetoric in the aftermath of Charlottesville.
- In 2019, Rubio criticized Trump's rallying cry of "send her back" against Ilhan Omar and contended "what he said was wrong".
- Following the 2016 primary, Rubio still expressed criticism of Trump's rhetoric on women.
 - Rubio, in October 2016, after the access Hollywood comments: "Donald's comments were vulgar, egregious & impossible to justify. No one should ever talk about any woman in those terms, even in private".
 - In the aftermath of the 2020 election, despite initially supporting Trump's challenges, Rubio shifted his rhetoric and "mostly stopped talking about the election".
 - On January 6th, 2021, during the U.S. Capitol Protests, Rubio attacked the patriotism of protestors and described the event as "anti-American anarchy".
 - Video: On January 6, 2021, Rubio condemns the U.S. Capitol protests as "one of the saddest days in our modern history, probably in our history" and deems it "inexcusable".
 - Video: In January 2021, Rubio criticizes stop the steal efforts for convincing people that the election could be overturned and condemns January 6th protestors as a "national embarrassment".
 - Rubio: "Some of them unfortunately were adherence to a conspiracy theory and others got caught up in the moment. The result was a national embarrassment".
 - Video: Later in January 2021, Rubio continued to condemn the January 6th protests as "unpatriotic," "disgusting" and ran "county to everything we stand for".
 - \circ Rubio has continued to condemn January 6th protestors and support their prosecution; he has not offered his support for Trump's call to pardon them.

2020 Election

- Rubio voted to certify the 2020 election results.
 - In January 2021, Rubio voted to certify the 2020 election results for Arizona and Pennsylvania.
 - Rubio has described voting against certification of the 2020 election results "a terrible idea".
 - Video: in January 2021, on the Senate floor, Rubio condemns Senators who still are seeking to block certification of the 2020 election results as a "terrible idea".

- Rubio promoted criticism of Trump's claims on vice presidential power concerning the 2020 election certification.
 - In 2022, Rubio "rejected a claim by former President Donald Trump that former vice president mike pence had the power to overturn the results of the 2020 presidential election".

Criticisms Of Trump's Policies And Presidency

- During Trump's presidency, Rubio expressed support for and was involved in the oversight of the Trump-Russia investigations.
 - "After the 2016 election, Rubio ultimately became chairman of the Senate intelligence committee, and oversaw the panel when it investigated the connections between the Trump campaign and its Russian benefactors. The Rubio-led investigation ultimately uncovered, among other things, a "direct tie between senior Trump campaign officials and the Russian intelligence services".
 - In 2017, Rubio backed Robert Mueller's investigation and contended "that he believes the prosecutor will carry out his investigation into whether the Trump campaign colluded with Russia during the 2016 Presidential Campaign "in a fair and balanced way".
 - In 2018, Rubio defended the FBI's investigation regarding possible ties between Trump campaign officials and Russia.
 - Rubio, in 2019: "I've been very clear from the very beginning the best thing for the country and for the president was for the Mueller probe to move forward unimpeded".
- Following Trump's presidency, Rubio appears to have criticized Trump's handling of classified documents.
 - Video: in 2022, Rubio couched his defense of Trump's handling of classified documents noting "the documents that were at Mar-A-Lago by all accounts were turned over. Look if the process wasn't followed then there needs to be something that happens about that".
 - In 2023, Rubio was critical of Trump storing documents at Mar-A-Lago noting they "should not have been there" but was more critical of an indictment having been brought against Trump in the first place.
- Rubio has previously criticized Trump's border security policies.
 - In 2019, Rubio criticized Trump's efforts to declare a national emergency to build his proposed southern border wall noting "we have a crisis at our southern border, but no crisis justifies violating the constitution".
- Rubio has previously criticized Trump's posture towards China.

- In 2018, Rubio issued a series of social media posts contending the Trump administration was "losing" in its negotiations with China.
- In 2018, Rubio criticized Trump for reportedly considering backing away from limits on Chinese investments.
- In 2019, Rubio repeatedly criticized Trump's apparent easing of restrictions on Huawei and noted that to follow through with such a policy would be a "catastrophic mistake".
- Rubio has previously criticized Trump's posture towards NATO.
 - In 2016, Rubio disagreed "with Donald Trump's suggestion that the united states shouldn't automatically come to the defense of fellow NATO members if they are attacked".
 - In 2019, Rubio joined a bipartisan group of Senators sponsoring legislation "that would prevent the president from withdrawing from the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) without Senate approval".
- Rubio has previously criticized Trump's posture towards Russia.
 - In 2017, Rubio criticized Trump's suggestion to pair with Russia on cybersecurity measures.
 - In 2018, Rubio underscored that Putin interfered in the 2016 election, developed a preference for Trump, and should be punished for having done so.
 - In 2018, Rubio did not criticize Trump for meeting with Putin in Finland but was critical of how the meeting had left "the impression that my intelligence community says one thing, Putin says another, I'm siding with Putin, and that was a bad impression to leave behind".
 - In 2018, Rubio was critical of Trump's rhetoric for not reflecting the threat posed by Russia and Putin but did not the Trump administration's policies did so.
 - In 2019, Rubio was among the Senators to vote "to advance legislation blocking President Trump's plan to lift sanctions against three Russian companies despite an eleventh-hour effort by the administration to kill the bill".
 - In 2022, Rubio said it was "unfortunate" Trump was using language in seeming praise of Putin and called on Trump to be more "careful" with his wording.
- Rubio has previously criticized Trump's posture towards North Korea.
 - In 2019, Rubio "said President Donald Trump's tweet that he would reverse sanctions on North Korea that had just been imposed by the treasury department could cause people to second-guess future announcements of sanctions".

- In 2019, Rubio "also said he's skeptical that ongoing negotiations between Trump and North Korean Dictator Kim Jong Un would lead the Asian country to give up its nuclear weapons".
- Rubio has previously criticized Trump's posture towards Syria.
 - In 2019, Rubio criticized Trump's decision to withdraw troops for Northeast Syria noting "if reports about us retreat in #Syria are accurate, the Trump administration has made a grave mistake that will have implications far beyond Syria".
 - In 2018, Rubio was among the Senators to "a letter to president Trump... asking him to reconsider his decision to begin withdrawing troops from Syria".
- Rubio has previously criticized Trump's economic policy concerning tariffs.
 - In 2018, Rubio argued Trump "should drop tariff fight with our allies in Europe, Asia and Latin America. We can work out our differences with them later".
- Rubio has previously criticized Trump's economic policy concerning tax reform.
 - "Rubio voted for the GOP tax law last year. But some Republicans believe he complicated the party's vigorous defense of the measure with recent comments to the economist magazine about corporations".
- Rubio has previously criticized Trump's law and order policy concerning the 'first step act'.
 - In 2018, "Sen. Marco Rubio was one of just 12 Senators to vote against the First Step Act, a bipartisan criminal justice bill that overwhelmingly passed the Senate on Tuesday night".
- Rubio has previously criticized Trump's handling of covid.
 - Video: in 2020, Rubio was critical of Trump's handling of covid and his push to reopen by easter noting "i don't think we can solely make this decision on the basis of economics because you can't have a growing economy if you've got a significant percentage of your population dying and your hospitals aren't working".

Criticism Of MAGA

- Rubio has previously criticized MAGA-aligned Republicans.
 - In 2021, Rubio implicitly criticized Marjorie Taylor-Greene noting "reporting that a politician believes in/flirts with conspiracy theories is legit, but the attention they get should be proportional to their ability to influence actual public policy don't make them famous, help them raise money or elevate conspiracy theories".
 - "While Rubio doesn't identify the subject of his entreaty, it's not hard to suss out".

 Video: In January 2024, Rubio blames the failure of the 2024 Senate border security measure on Biden essentially out-maneuvering "the crazy Republican MAGA people in the house…".

RINO Ties

- Rubio has deep ties to the Republican establishment and "GOP elites".
 - Rubio is known to have previously led "GOP elites" on immigration and Hispanic issues.
 - $\circ~$ Rubio has long standing ties to Jeb Bush a man Rubio once considered his mentor.
 - Rubio has previously expressed praise for George W. Bush and Dick Cheney.
 - Rubio was noted to have been vetted as a potential running mate for never-Trumper Mitt Romney.
 - Rubio is known to have been boosted by moderate GOP mega donor Paul Singer.

CAMPAIGN FINANCE

Since 2023, Marco Rubio has received an aggregate of \$1,961,815.61 in total contributions for his re-election campaign. Rubio has been funded by a variety of corporations that may be viewed as problematic within the Republican Party such as Eli Lilly, Amgen, and L3Harris. Rubio has also received tens of thousands of dollars from special interest groups, law firms, and PACs. Between 2017 and 2022, Rubio received an aggregate of \$47,382,478.38 in total contributions. Rubio received more than \$500,000 from the real estate-backed VoteSane PAC as well as nearly hundreds of thousands of dollars from potential controversial corporations like Disney, American Crystal Sugar, Google, and the GEO Group (private prison). Rubio additionally received hundreds of thousands of dollars from establishment Republicans including \$500,000 from John Coryn, \$15,000 from Mitch McConnell, among others; Rubio also received funding from Koch Industries. Between 2000 and 2016, Rubio received a total of \$84,465,176 for his various campaigns for federal and state office, including President of the United States. Similar to his more recent campaigns, Rubio was funding largely by establishment politicians, corporations, and megadonors like Mitch McConnell, Richard Uihlein, Koch Industries, and John Bolton. Rubio additionally received funding from various defense corporations like Lockheed Martin and Honeywell, as well as pharmaceutical companies like Pfizer.

Individually, Rubio has contributed an aggregate of \$5,037.89 to federal and statewide campaign committees. Federally, Rubio contributed \$1,100, giving to Lincoln Diaz-Balart and the Florida Republican Party. At the state level, Rubio has contributed \$3,937.89, giving more than \$1,000 to his own campaign, as well as contributing to Charlie Crist's 2006 gubernatorial campaign and the Republican Party of Florida.

Some of those attacks seem to have hit their mark, and in recent days Trump has unleashed his own volley in response, suggesting Rubio puts his makeup on "with a trowel," that he's a "lightweight" and a "choker" and calling him "little Marco," prompting Rubio's response on Sunday. It's part of an effort by Rubio to position himself as the anti-Trump candidate in the GOP field, in hopes of consolidating the majority of Republican voters that national polling has shown oppose Trump as the GOP nominee. And the energetic crowds he saw as he campaigned across the South on Saturday and Sunday cheering at every Trump knock seemed to suggest Rubio was making some progress in that effort. Ken Hawley, a small businessman from Roanoke, Virginia who attended Rubio's rally Sunday, said while the attacks on Trump "probably should've been done sooner," he felt like it was resonating. 

Indeed, it appears to have hurt him, as he struggled to overcome Ted Cruz during the Super Tuesday contests and his support has since cratered, resulting in disappointing finishes in primaries across the nation over the past week. Some Republicans have criticized Rubio for "damaging the image of the Republican Party," as major Republican donor Fred Malek put it on MSNBC this week. Rubio's comments Wednesday were an implicit acknowledgment that the strategy didn't work, and he has since shifted away from personal attacks on Trump in favor of more policy-focused fare. But he insisted that it was "appropriate" to point out that Trump is "portraying himself as something he's not," a central focus of his argument against the GOP frontrunner." (NBC News, 3/9/16)

Rubio's full-throated offensive came the morning after he and Ted Cruz teamed up against Trump at the 10th Republican debate in Houston. Rubio specifically pounced on Trump's hiring of foreign workers and his nowdefunct Trump University, both examples Rubio cited here as he argued the billionaire is doing a "con job" on voters. "He's going to Americans that are struggling, that are hurting, and he's implying, Tm fighting for you because I'm a tough guy,"" Rubio said. "A tough guy? This guy inherited \$200 million. He's never faced any struggle." Rubio added: "The other day, he told a protester, 'I'm going to punch you in the face.' Donald Trump has never punched anyone in the face. Donald Trump was the first guy that begged for Secret Service protection." Appearing later Friday morning in nearby Fort Worth, Trump called Rubio's tirade a sign of desperation that shows the Florida senator is not "presidential material." Trump also took issue with a number of Rubio's claims, including that Trump inherited \$200 million and that his vodka line went out of business. "I used to call Ted Cruz a liar, but now I'll also call Marco Rubio" a liar, Trump told reporters before the start of his own rally at the Fort Worth Convention Center. At one point in his rally, Rubio pulled out his phone and read from the stage a series of misspelled tweets Trump had sent earlier in the morning. The tweets, one of which called Rubio a "leightweight chocker," prompted the Florida senator to offer two theories for the spelling errors. "No. 1, that's how they spell those words at the Wharton School of Business," Rubio said, referring to Trump's oft-touted alma mater, "or No. 2, just like the Trump Tower, he relies on a foreign worker to do his own tweets."" Trump has so far declined to release his tax information, saying he's being audited. "It is time to stop the excuses," Cruz said in a statement. "If Donald is embarrassed about his tax returns, it's up to the voters to assess the facts." When asked about why only summaries were released, Cruz offered to disclose more information if other candidates did. "If Marco wants to release the complete thing for the recent years, I'm happy to do so as well and I would certainly encourage Donald Trump to do it, but we just did it to match what the other candidates are doing," Cruz told reporters. Rubio promised to release additional tax information in the future, but wanted to get the summaries out for the sake of time. "We'll do the rest too," Rubio told reporters. "As controversy over his remarks about Mexican immigrants to the US continued to attract international condemnation and damage his commercial relationships, the White House hopeful Donald Trump drew heavy fire from Marco Rubio, a Hispanic member of the 14-strong GOP presidential field. On Friday, Rubio released a strongly worded statement which said: "Trump's comments are not just offensive and inaccurate, but also divisive." At the launch of his presidential campaign two weeks ago, Trump said: "[Mexico is] sending people that have lots of problems, and they are bringing those problems to us. They are bringing drugs, and bringing crime, and their rapists." The government of Mexico called the comments "prejudiced" and "absurd"; the Venezuelan president, Nicolás Maduro, said Trump was "mentally ill". Hispanic leaders in the US called on Republicans to condemn Trump's remarks. Many candidates have been cautious and relatively mild. The former Florida governor Jeb Bush, the frontrunner whose wife was born in Mexico and who speaks fluent Spanish, said Trump was "wrong" and added: "Maybe we'll have a chance to have an honest discussion about it onstage.' Trump, running second in some polls, is on course to appear onstage in the first Republican debate, which will be hosted in Cleveland by Fox on 6 August. Only the top 10 in the currently 14-strong GOP field will be allowed to participate. Rubio's statement continued: "Our next president needs to be someone who brings Americans together - not someone who continues to divide. Our broken immigration system is something that needs to be solved, and comments like this move us further from - not closer to - a solution. We need leaders who offer serious solutions to secure our border and fix our broken immigration system." On Saturday, speaking on the Fox & Friends morning show, Trump attacked Rubio for being "very weak on immigration". He also said the

former New York governor George Pataki, who has criticised his remarks, was "a sad figure" and "a terrible governor of New York" who had "zero numbers in the polls". Trump said he "respected" the Texas senator Ted Cruz, who has defended his remarks on immigration. On Friday, Trump lost the support of another US institution when the chairman of Nascar said the auto-racing series would not host its season-end awards at his Trump National Doral resort in Miami." 

Bush inherited all sorts of things from the Clinton administration, including intelligence agencies and others who weren't doing a very good job that were not sharing information across agencies. Including a government that under President Clinton had not taken seriously al-Qaeda and the threat that they posed," Rubio continued, citing the attack on the U.S.S. Cole, the first World Trade Center bombing, and other terrorist attacks. For the past week, Trump has discussed the Sept. 11, 2001 attacks, specifically noting Bush was president during the attacks and had responsibility for them. Trump went as far saying the Bush administration was warned by the CIA director the attack was coming and did nothing. Rubio noted Bush had been in office for less than a year when the attacks happened. "As a result, President Bush was only in office nine months when this happened, but that plot to conduct 9/11 and the steps that it took to bring it about --- those began well before he was even sworn into office," Rubio said. "It happened under the watch of President Clinton, in fact, the 9/11 Commission says that. If you look, all of their recommendations, many of them were about reversing mistakes that were made during the Clinton presidency." At a rally in Mount Pleasant, S.C., Monday evening, Trump read the statement to loud cheers from the crowd. He repeated claims that Muslims around the world believe violence against Americans is justified and that they believe American Muslims should be allowed to live under sharia law. Trump also addressed how people can be radicalized online, suggesting "maybe in certain areas closing that Internet up in some way." He also repeated calls for surveillance on mosques in the U.S. "Yes, we have to look at mosques, and we have to respect mosques," he said. "Because something is happening in there. Man, there's anger, and we have to know about it." His appearance was interrupted by protesters several times, including when he was explaining his latest proposal on keeping Muslims from entering the country. At that point, Trump referred to the person interrupting his rally by saying, "That's alright. He sounds like he's very exhausted." Trump, the wealthy real estate magnate who remains atop the GOP presidential field, has faced backlash for previous statements against Muslims and, before that, Hispanics. And he didn't rule out the possibility of serving in a Trump administration. Rubio said his apparent shift isn't that hard to understand. Supporting Trump as the presumptive GOP presidential nominee is an easy choice, he said, compared to the prospect of a Hillary Clinton victory at the polls in November. "Donald Trump will sign the repeal of Obamacare. She won't," Rubio told reporters Thursday. "I want the successor to Antonin Scalia on the Supreme Court to be a conservative. I believe that's the kind of judge that he'll appoint, and I know she won't. I want someone that will defend life. I know he will and she won't." Rubio said Trump earned his status as the GOP presumptive nominee at the ballot box. "He campaigned and the voters chose him," he said. "I respect that process. And so I'm going to support him. I'm going to vote for him." Social media, of course, won't let him off the hook that easily. "Rubio is truly a politician with no ideas, just a jumble of crap, ready to support any position, person, anything to help him get ahead," progressive radio talk show host Mike Signorile tweeted. "Stop Excusing Republicans Like Rubio For Supporting Trump Because Of A Stupid, Worthless Pledge," tweeted the conservative blog Red State, referring to Rubio's frequent promise during the campaign to get behind the eventual nominee. While Rubio was still a presidential contender, his rivalry with Trump featured highly charged, personal attacks. Trump, mocked the Florida senator as "Little Marco" and poked fun at his tendency to sweat on the debate stage and drink lots of water. Rubio said Trump was unfit for the Oval Office, citing his inflammatory rhetoric, his past support for Democratic policies and his call for deporting undocumented immigrants. He also criticized Trump's physical features: "You know what they say about men with small hands ... You can't trust them." But Rubio also consistently said he would support whomever Republican voters nominated. And on Thursday, the Associated Press announced that Trump had captured the 1,237 delegates necessary to lock up the nomination. Despite the heated campaign, Rubio said it's time to move on. "We were competitors," he said of Trump. "I don't dislike him. I don't have any negative feelings about him personally. I disagree with a lot of his positions. That was well established during the campaign. (But) I also think he happens to be substantially better than Hillary Clinton." Al Cardenas, former head of the Florida Republican Party and a Rubio confidante, said the possibility that he and many other Republicans will support Trump is a "work in progress." But he's not willing to judge Rubio. "It's a fairly quick turnaround in his conversion to becoming a supporter, but so be it," said Cardenas, former chairman of the American Conservative Union. "I'm still not there. I guess Marco figured out a way to get there."" (USA Today, 5/27/16)








Trump, the presumptive GOP presidential nominee, said the federal judge overseeing a lawsuit relating to Trump University should recuse himself from the case because he is of Mexican descent. Judge Gonzalo Curiel, who was born in Indiana, is the son of Mexican immigrants. "Donald Trump's comments on the ethnic heritage and religion of judges are absolutely unacceptable," Sen. Susan Collins said in a statement Monday. "His statement that Judge Curiel could not rule fairly because of his Mexican heritage does not represent our American values." Florida Sen. Marco Rubio, the son of Cuban immigrants, also criticized the remarks in a television interview. "Quite frankly, I'm very disturbed by the way he's talking about this judge. He's an American." Texas Sen. Ted Cruz, another Republican of Cuban descent, said, "Of course, it is inappropriate to be attacking a federal judge's race or ethnicity." On Sunday, Trump also said it is "possible" that a Muslim judge would also be biased against him, during an interview on ABC's "This Week." In what's become a widely ridiculed statement, Trump said over the weekend, "Mr. Khan who has never met me, has no right to stand in front of millions of people and claim I have never read the Constitution, (which is false) and say many other inaccurate things." The real estate mogul also questioned why Khan's wife, Ghazala Khan, remained silent on stage in Philadelphia, suggesting she wasn't allowed to speak because of her Muslim faith. But as with other Republicans, Rubio's repudiation of Trump's comments came without him withdrawing support for the Republican nominee's White House bid. Earlier in the day, Arizona Sen. John McCain issued a blistering critique of Trump as did the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Sen. Majority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky and House Speaker Paul D. Ryan of Wisconsin also rejected Trump's comments but did not take back their support for his campaign for president. According to a transcript circulated by his office, Rubio said that on the broader question of Muslim immigration to the United States, the government should know exactly who is entering the country. "We have Americans who are Muslims who are patriotic and love this country, as evidenced by the Khan family. In The Aftermath Of The 2020 Election, Despite Initially Supporting Trump's Challenges, Rubio Shifted His Rhetoric And "Mostly Stopped Talking About The Election." "Rubio did both. When Trump first started to allege irregularities in the election and his legal team filed lawsuits aimed at overturning the results, Rubio huffily defended the then-president's right to raise such questions. After President Biden was declared the winner of the election, Rubio continued to defend Trump's assertions that something untoward had happened. By the evening of Nov. 7, when the race was called, Trump's team and his allies were already 0 for 9 in their legal challenges. A few days later, Rubio's approach to the issue shifted. The issue was less that there were perhaps "irregularities" to be uncovered but, instead, that concern over potential irregularities from Republican voters demanded redress. This was a clever rhetorical shift eventually used by his colleague, Sen. Ted Cruz (R-Tex.), in opposing the counting of electoral

votes from several states. But it's also a hedge, allowing Rubio to stand alongside Trump while pointing in a slightly different direction. Rubio, like Cruz, is smart enough to know that by mid-November, there was no real evidence of fraud and that Trump's path to a second term in office had dried up. By Nov. 23, he'd referred to Biden as president-elect. But he's a politician and Trump had (and has) the enormous power of the Republican base. So Rubio tried to find a middle path. Over time, Rubio mostly stopped talking about the election. Trump was still tweeting out nonsensical claims about fraud, claims no more derived from reality than Greene's assertions about spacecraft starting wildfires in California. Rubio's response was not, as his tweet about Greene might suggest, to forcefully confront Trump's claims and expose them as false. His response instead was silence." (*Washington Post*, 2/3/21)

I think they're high fiving in Beijing and the Chinese look at this and are very happy about it. It kind of bolsters their claim that we're falling apart and they're the country of the future. I think it's inexcusable completely a hundred percent excusable. I don't care what the motivations and obviously people are going to get arrested, we're going to learn more about who was there and what this was all about. And I think it'll be interesting to see sort of the mix of people that were there and so forth. I think it's been tragic, and I want to say something, I want to thank the Capitol police officers. We know a lot of these people personally, we walk by

them every single day who had to go out there and do this, and we're really undermanned for and overwhelmed by this at one point in time. (01:01) And so none of it is an excuse. Now, I do think that one of the challenges we have is we have a serious crisis of confidence in this country. There is now literally no individual or institution in this country that can speak definitively about anything. And that's not an excuse for any of this, but it explains some of the things that create an environment that lead to this all across the board. And the media is shocked that they have zero credibility. They're viewed largely as biased. Then you have the censoring of news stories before an election by social media companies. And then you have these questions that in normal times people would look at and be able to work through. But in that environment of lack of confidence really sparks up. And I think those things need to be answered because elections, democracy doesn't just depend on having elections and depends on people's confidence in those elections and their willingness to abide by those results. They're interrelated. I don't know why the Senate can't do Watergate style, Titanic style hearings. We could take testimony, subpoena records. It wouldn't change the outcome of this race, but it would give people the clarity, the answer. And by the way, the changes that we need to make. When I was in Florida in the legislature, I served on a task force after 2000 that made a bunch of changes to the mechanics of our elections, and I think we could do that for the country. TUCKER CARLSON (02:13): I wondered all day what Republicans in the Senate made of this. So people came to your place of work, and I'm not talking you personally. I am really despised by an awful lot of people. And every once in a while I think to myself, they have good reason to despise me. Maybe I can communicate differently. I mean, it should evoke some soul searching in the person who's despised a little bit. And I wonder if Republican senators are thinking to themselves tonight, I hate the vandalism, I hate the violence. I hate all this crap. On the other hand, a lot of my voters really hate me. Maybe I should change the way I behave. Do you think anyone's thinking that? MARCO RUBIO (02:47): Well, I certainly think there's two things that have to happen. First, we have to firmly say that this stuff's not acceptable. It just can't happen. I mean, I TUCKER CARLSON (02:54): Couldn't agree more. MARCO RUBIO (02:55): We look like the third world. And there are real factors out there that are contributing not just to an erosion of confidence and trust in America, but some of the, you made a point and I caught the tail end of it, and it's absolutely right. There is no such thing as a country in which half of us are very happy and the other half is very unhappy. It can't work. None of us is going anywhere. So we're going to have to figure out a way to coexist. That's always been the challenge in America. A country that covers this vast continent such, so diverse. And that's what our system is about and that's what law and order is about, is allowing us to have those disputes without violence, but through passionate debate. TUCKER CARLSON (03:49): We are in it together whether we want to be or not, a lot of us don't want to be, but it's kind of not up to us. So I agree with that. Senator, great to see you. Marco Rubio is claiming some of the Trump supporters who barged into the Capitol building "got caught up in the moment." Rubio, whose staff told CBS4 News wasn't available for an interview, spoke about the assault on the Capitol on Fox News Thursday night. He condemned the violence, but also spoke about other President Trump supporters. "Ninety-nine percent of the people that went yesterday to Washington, DC, to protest and have their voices heard did not barge into the Capitol. But 1% of thousands of people is a lot of people," the senator said. "Some of them unfortunately were adherence to a conspiracy theory and others got caught up in the moment. The result was a national embarrassment." Wednesday night, the senator did not object to election results from certain states. "The senators who filed it said we know we are not going to win but we are making this point. People were led to believe that these challenges would prevail," Rubio said. The riot was fueled by conspiracy theories and false claims about the election. Even though Rubio didn't formally object, he believes there are still problems. "The practice of states going to court to friendly judges, changing the laws so they can get an advantage for Democrats and circumventing the legislature. All that needs to be addressed," he said. In another interview, Rubio compared the siege to that of unstable countries. "This is stuff you see in another country. We got tin pot dictators out there lecturing us and mocking us in their Twitter feeds and online. So that stuff can't happen," said Rubio. "Rubio has been sharply critical of the Democratic-led investigation into the Capitol Hill insurrection, and when asked if he believes Trump was responsible for the Capitol attack, he instead pinned the blame on those who broke into the building. "I think the people responsible for January 6 are ultimately the people that entered this building and broke the law," Rubio said in an interview. Rubio wouldn't say whether he agreed with Trump's call to pardon the rioters. "We have too many real problems for me to focus on hypothetical ones," he said. And he also contended that the Capitol attack would not be a decisive issue in his race. "What happened January 6 was horrible and it was a terrible day, it should never happen again. And people are being prosecuted for it," Rubio said. "But what does that have to do with the fact that people are paying exorbitant prices for everything, they can't find things, can't find workers?" The Florida Republican also turned the screws on his opponent, even as he conceded there is "no doubt" she would raise more money than him in the highly expensive state. "She's a Pelosi puppet, votes with Pelosi 100% of the time, that's why she wants her in the Senate," Rubio said of Demings, referring to Speaker Nancy Pelosi. "The Senate overwhelmingly turned aside challenges to President-elect Joe Biden's victory in the presidential election, guaranteeing the result will stand. The objection to the results in Arizona -- spearheaded by Rep. Paul Gosar and Sen. Ted Cruz -- was rejected 93-6 on Wednesday night. Among those voting against the challenge were Republican Florida Sens. Marco Rubio and Rick Scott. The Republicans -- both allies of outgoing President Donald Trump, split, however, on a later vote over a legal challenge to Pennsylvania's election. After lawmakers reconvened following a siege on the US Capitol that stalled the proceedings, Scott was among the seven senators who voted to reject Pennsylvania's electors. Rubio, however, voted not to sustain any objections to states' electors. The legal challenge to Pennsylvania's election, ultimately rejected by the U.S. Supreme Court, hinged in part on a Pennsylvania Supreme Court ruling in favor of expanding allowable vote-by-mail ballots. Scott contends the move was "in defiance of (Pennsylvania) state law." "We simply cannot tolerate partisan political attempts to change the rules and tip the scales in our elections," Scott wrote in a statement Wednesday. Rubio and Scott were among a myriad of Florida Republicans who rushed to condemn Wednesday's violence in the halls of Congress. During his floor remarks, Rubio said the display made a mockery of U.S. politics and delighted of foreign adversaries. "China's laughing. They're loving this tonight. In Beijing, they're high-fiving because they point to this and say, 'This is proof that the future belongs to China. America's in decline.' Vladimir Putin? "The Democrats are now alluding to the the concept that having an Informant placed in an opposing party's campaign is different than having a Spy, as illegal as that may be," he tweeted on Friday. "But what about an 'Informant' who is paid a fortune and who 'sets up' way earlier than the Russian Hoax?" It's not clear whether the FBI paid the informant. Rubio did not give a direct answer to questions on ABC about whether Trump's claims were wrong. "I have no evidence that those people were part of an investigation on the campaign. If that exists, I would want to know about it, we should all know about and that — that would be wrong and we should — we should do something about it," he said. "But up to now, what I have seen is evidence that they were investigating individuals with a history of links to Russia that were concerning." "Former President Donald Trump is scheduled to appear in a Miami courtroom on Tuesday where he will address an indictment consisting of 37 felony charges related to his handling of classified documents after he left the White House. Trump vehemently denies any wrongdoing in connection with the case. In an interview with "CBS Mornings," Florida Sen. Marco Rubio, vice chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee and author of the new book "Decades of Decadence: How Our Spoiled Elites Blew America's Inheritance of Liberty, Security, and Prosperity," expressed concern about the impact of the indictment on the country — and said it is "political in nature." "When you bring an indictment like this, it's not done in isolation. It's not done in a vacuum. You gotta take a lot of things into account. There's no allegation that there was harm done to the, to the national security. There's no allegation that he sold it to a foreign power or that it was trafficked to somebody else or that anybody got access to it," said Rubio. "You have to weigh the harm of that, or lack thereof, on the harm that this indictment does to the country. This is deeply divisive," he said. He said prosecuting the likely GOP presidential nominee, who will run against an incumbent president, is alone "political in nature," and said there will be "certain harm." This will put institutions into "tremendous crisis," he said. "The judge will be attacked. The process will be attacked. The Department of Justice will be attacked. The prosecutor will be attacked," said Rubio. While the senator said the classified documents found at Mar-a-Lago "should not have been there," he said the indictment "is a separate thing." "You're bringing an indictment that basically alleges no real damage to national security — not that it excuses it — versus what we're going to see now. We're going to subject this country to a divisive spectacle" at a time when we're dealing with major issues. When asked about Trump's leadership qualities, Rubio

"President Donald Trump announced Friday that he is declaring a national emergency, circumventing the legislative branch to secure border wall funding. "We're going to confront the national security crisis on our southern border, and we're going to do it one way or the other, we have to do it," Trump said in a speech from the White House Rose Garden. "I'm going to be signing a national emergency, and it's been signed many times before. It's been signed by other presidents. From 1977 or so, it gave the presidents the power. There's rarely been a problem. They signed it, nobody cares, I guess they weren't very exciting." Trump's declaration comes as he failed to secure congressional support for more than \$5 billion he wanted for border security in a broader spending bill that funds a variety of federal agencies. His unilateral move to declare a national emergency is based on the 1976 National Emergencies Act. It's been used 60 times since the law was passed, including after the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks, when President George W. Bush sought additional powers to organize the military. But Trump's critics assailed the move, accusing the president of manufacturing a crisis and vowing a fight in the courts. "President Trump's personal political predicament does not qualify as a national emergency," said Tampa Democratic Rep Kathy Castor. "He manufactured a national emergency to unlawfully divert funds to his pet project instead of focusing on what matters to American families like lowering health care costs, creating jobs through infrastructure and tackling the climate crisis." House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.) and Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.) said Friday in a joint statement that Trump's actions "clearly violate the Congress's exclusive power of the purse, which our Founders enshrined in the Constitution. The Congress will defend our constitutional authorities in the Congress, in the Courts, and in the public, using every remedy available." Trump fueled his critics by suggesting during his press conference that he didn't "need" to issue the declaration, as he also emphasized that the wall is necessary to block drugs, criminals and gang members from entering the United States. "I could do the wall over a longer period of time, I didn't need to do this, but I'd rather do it much faster," Trump said. Congress does have the power to end a national emergency declaration from a president, but it would likely mean mustering a veto-proof majority in both chambers, a steep climb in the Republican-controlled

Senate. Many Republicans are supportive of Trump's plans, including Florida U.S. Senator Rick Scott, who said he applauded the decision to put "country first" and use his authority to secure the border. "This is a reasoned, measured approach to fulfill his duty as Commander in Chief and keep our country safe, and I appreciate that he kept his word to not repurpose funds designated for disaster relief funding for Florida or Puerto Rico, which I've discussed with him at length. I look forwarding to working with him as Florida continues to rebuild following multiple devastating hurricanes," Scott said. However, Florida's senior U.S. Senator, Marco Rubio, took a dissenting view of Trump's action. He warned that the move could lead future presidents to pursue their own agendas by using emergency declarations. "We have a crisis at our southern border, but no crisis justifies violating the Constitution," Rubio said in a statement. He's warned that releasing restrictions on the Chinese firm, which is partly owned by the government, could put U.S. national security and intellectual property at risk. Rubio's allies say the tweets enable him to potentially grab Trump's attention. "That's how you get things done with this administration. When Marco tweets, Fox picks it up, and that's how the president sees it," said one informal adviser to Rubio, who spoke on the condition of anonymity to be more candid. But a Republican consultant close to the White House called the tweets "shortsighted." "What does Rubio get out of it? It will definitely get Trump's attention, and Trump will choose to smack him down. What's Rubio's endgame?" asked the consultant, who also spoke on the condition of anonymity to openly share an assessment. The White House did not respond to a request for comment on Rubio. Rebutting the criticism that he was being too soft on China, Trump said Tuesday, "For those who say maybe Trump is getting a little bit easy - ZTE, we closed it." Rubio is far from the only lawmaker who has been issuing rebukes or caution on China and ZTE. But the Florida senator has been one of the sharpest critics. "In the case of ZTE, I believe it's not so much a trade or economic issue as it is a national security issue," said Sen. Roy Blunt (R-Mo.), vice chairman of the Senate Republican Conference, offering a more measured take than Rubio has this week, but making the same general argument

Article 5 of the NATO Treaty lays out that an attack on one member amounts to an attack on all members, and that fellow NATO states must help the one that was struck. Trump's comments about NATO, delivered in a lengthy interview with The New York Times, were just his latest bombshell on the foreign policy front. The Republican presidential nominee has offered a radically different view of U.S. engagement with the world than many in his own party hold — one that is defined primarily in economic terms and which does not hold treaties sacrosanct. In the Times interview, which came ahead of his speech Thursday night at the Republican National Convention, Trump also said he would not chide authoritarian leaders for cracking down on civil liberties or purging their political rivals; that he'd pull the U.S. out of the North American Free Trade Agreement if Canada and Mexico didn't agree to better terms; and that he may pull back U.S. troops deployed around the world, even from highly sensitive areas such as the Korean peninsula. The bill, introduced by four Democrats and four Republicans, would require two-thirds approval from the Senate for a president to suspend, terminate or withdraw the United States from NATO. "President Trump's repeated threats to withdraw from NATO are dangerous," Sen. Tim Kaine (D-Va.) said in a statement announcing the bill's reintroduction. "Our NATO allies have fought alongside our troops since World War II, yet President Trump disparages these nations and cozies up to our adversaries." The other co-sponsors are Sens. Cory Gardner (R-Colo.), Jack Reed (D-R.I.), Lindsey Graham (R-S.C.), Chris Coons (D-Del.), Marco Rubio (R-Fla.), Richard Blumenthal (D-Conn.) and Susan Collins (R-Maine). The same bill was introduced last year after Trump rattled NATO allies at a July summit in Brussels. The sponsors last time were Kaine, Gardner, Reed and the late Sen. John McCain (R-Ariz.). The reintroduction comes after a New York Times report that Trump told aides several times last year that he wants to withdraw from NATO. One of the occasions when Trump reportedly raised the issue of withdrawal was the lead-up to the NATO summit in July, when he told his top national security officials he did not see the point of the alliance and thought it was a drain on the United States. Right now, presidents are required to get the consent of the Senate to enter into treaties. Article 13 of the NATO treaty requires a country give a one-year "notice of denunciation" before it can exit NATO. In addition to requiring Senate approval for Trump to withdraw, the bill reintroduced Thursday would authorize the Senate Legal Counsel and the General Counsel of the House to challenge in court any attempt by the administration to withdraw from NATO without the Senate's consent. In statements touting the resolution, the co-sponsors stressed the importance of a strong NATO alliance. "NATO is more





"I don't have a problem with the President of the United States interacting with the president of the Russian Federation," Rubio said. "They've got a lot of nuclear weapons, and so we do need to interact with them. That is separate from the question of whether or not we should be clear-eyed about who Putin is." Rubio, who made his comments in an interview on CNN's "State of the Union," said he regretted Trump's handling of his meeting with Putin in Helsinki, Finland, last week, where he appeared to side with Putin over the US intelligence community on alleged Russian efforts to influence the 2016 election. Trump clarified his remarks after returning to the United States, saying that after reviewing a transcript and video of his statements, he realized he had misspoken in a key sentence about Russian interference in the 2016 US election. "The sentence should have been: 'I don't see any reason why it wouldn't be Russia,' " he said. "Sort of a double negative." Referring to Trump's claim later that he meant to say "wouldn't" instead of "would" at the summit, Rubio said, "I'm glad he came back the next day and sort of walked that back." Rubio said he did not "know what to believe" about Trump's "would" versus "wouldn't" remarks, but he reiterated that he was glad Trump tried to walk back the remark. "I don't think it was a good moment for this administration, and I disagreed with it," Rubio said. "I know he came back the next day and said something to clean that up. And I'm glad that he did it, you know? I'm glad that he cleaned that up because it left, if you watched that video, it leaves the impression that my intelligence community says one thing, Putin says another, I'm siding with Putin, and that was a bad impression to leave behind." Senators voted 57-42 to begin debating the resolution, with only a simple majority needed to get over the initial hurdle. Though only a procedural vote, it's the latest foreign policy break between the Trump administration and Senate Republicans, who have been wary of his warmer rhetoric toward Moscow. It comes amid reports that the president has discussed pulling the United States out of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). "I do disapprove of the easing of the sanctions because I think it sends the wrong message to Russia and to the oligarch and close ally of Mr. Putin, Oleg Deripaska, who will in my judgement continue to maintain considerable [ownership] under the Treasury's plan," Sen. Susan Collins (R-Maine) told reporters. {mosads}In addition to Collins, GOP Sens. John Boozman (Ark.), Tom Cotton (Ark.), Steve Daines (Mont.) Cory Gardner (Colo.), Josh Hawley (Mo.), John Kennedy (La.), Martha McSally (Ariz.), Jerry Moran (Kan.), Marco Rubio (Fla.) and Ben Sasse (Neb.) voted to proceed to the resolution on Tuesday. The same senators also helped block a separate effort from Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) to pigeonhole the measure. The setback for the administration comes after it announced plans late last month to relax sanctions on the three businesses - Rusal, EN+ and EuroSibEnerg — connected to Oleg Deripaska, an oligarch with ties to Russian President Vladimir Putin. Under the 2017 sanctions bill, Democrats are able to force a vote on a resolution to block the administration from lifting the financial penalties. Treasury Secretary Steve Mnuchin led a lobbying effort to try to squelch concerns on Capitol Hill about the decision. He met with House Democrats last week and pitched Senate Republicans during a closed-door lunch Tuesday, hours before the vote. Mnuchin declined to say if he believed the administration had the votes to prevent the Senate from passing the resolution of disapproval but argued it shouldn't be a "political issue." But he added that the administration believed the sanctions against the three companies should be lifted because Deripaska's ownership in the entities has fallen below 50 percent. "We put together an agreement that we think meets the requirements of the laws and the regulations to do this," Mnuchin said. {mossecondads}Sen. Mike Crapo (R-Idaho) echoed Mnuchin in opposing the resolution to block the sanctions from being lifted. "I will vote 'no' today because this was a hard-fought negotiation resulting in one of the strongest agreements ever, which supports long-standing U.S. sanctions policy and foreign policy toward Russia," he said. GOP leadership had been tight-lipped about whether they would be able to pull together the simple majority needed to sink the Democratic resolution, noting a swath of their members wanted to hear from Mnuchin. Sen. John Thune (R-S.D.) said "a lot of our members are anxious to ask questions" of the Trump administration before the vote. "Whether we get on it, is still kind of an open question, I think," Thune said. McConnell separately knocked Democrats for forcing the Russia vote even as they are blocking a GOP foreign policy bill as part of their shutdown strategy. "It was all just a farce. The Democratic leader doesn't actually mind doing other business because he now intends to bring a privileged and political stunt of a motion relating to the administration's use of sanctions against Russia," McConnell said. Democrats needed to win over at least four Republicans to advance the resolution, provided they could also unite their own caucus. They could still face a 60-vote threshold filibuster of the measure before a final passage vote, which would require them to get 13 GOP senators. Gardner, a member of the Foreign Relations Committee and a vulnerable 2020 incumbent, said on Tuesday that he would support the resolution. "I anticipate voting to overturn the decision by the administration," Gardner told reporters. Rubio added that while he "appreciated" the Treasury Department's effort, "for all

"Donald Trump may have called Vladimir Putin "savvy" and a "genius," but to U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio those controversial comments are just sarcasm. Rubio, who continues to do multiple interviews a day on the Ukraine crisis, was asked Tuesday about Trump's comments made last week on a conservative talk radio program, where the former President seemed to extol the Russian leader and possible war criminal for smart moves in invading Ukraine last week. "I heard that interview, OK? I'm not going off the press reports. I heard the interview. I didn't hear him say that. I heard what I heard. A guy who was being sarcastic. He was saying, 'Oh, look at this guy, he's a genius, this, that and the other," Rubio said on CNBC's Squawk Box Tuesday. "The problem is people think Donald Trump is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. He doesn't talk like that! He doesn't talk like some analyst at a think tank. He doesn't talk like most people in Washington," Rubio added. "But right after he said that stuff — and I don't agree with all the stuff he's said about Russia — right after he said all that stuff that people are pointing to, he talked about how we need to impose crushing sanctions," Rubio continued. Despite advocating said crushing sanctions, the fact remains Trump offered a singularly dichotomous comparison of the American and Russian leaders in extended comments last week. "Well, what went wrong was a rigged election, and what went wrong is a candidate that shouldn't be there and a man that has no concept of what he's doing. I went in yesterday and there was a television screen, and I said, 'This is genius.' Putin declares a big portion of the Ukraine — of Ukraine — Putin declares it as independent. Oh, that's wonderful," Trump said on the Clay Travis and Buck Sexton program. Though the transcript includes the descriptor "(sarcastic)" after Trump's "Oh, that's wonderful," the sarcasm did not apply to the preceding statements. Trump has been very clear in his position that the 2020 election was not legitimate, and he has routinely bashed Biden's competency as well. The former President continued in tones of admiration that didn't seem especially sarcastic. "So, Putin is now saying it's independent, a large section of Ukraine. I said, 'How smart is that?' And he's gonna go in and be a peacekeeper. That's the strongest peace force, we could use that on our southern border. That's the strongest peace force I've ever seen. There were more army tanks than I've ever seen. They're gonna keep peace all right. No, but think of it. Here's a guy who's very savvy. I know him very well. Very, very well," Trump said. "You gotta say that's pretty savvy. And you know what the response was from Biden? There was no response. They didn't have one for that. No, it's very sad. Very sad," Trump added. Rubio said it was "unfortunate" that Trump used that language, arguing that other Republicans used language praising Putin's savvy that was "twisted." Trump's Friday tweet set off widespread confusion when he appeared to announce that he would undo recently imposed sanctions on North Korea. "It was announced today by the U.S. Treasury that additional large scale Sanctions would be added to those already existing Sanctions on North Korea," Trump wrote. "I have today ordered the withdrawal of those additional Sanctions!" After hours of uncertainty, administration officials insisted Trump had not been referring to the new sanctions on North Korea that his administration rolled out a day before. Instead, the officials claimed, the president was saying he was opposing not-yet-announced sanctions on Pyongyang. Lindsey Graham (R-S.C.), Jeanne Shaheen (D-N.H.), Joni Ernst (R-Iowa), Angus King (I-Maine), Tom Cotton (R-Ark.) and Marco Rubio (R-Fla.), expressed concern that withdrawing U.S. troops from Syria would "renew and embolden" ISIS's efforts in the region. "We write today to express our concern regarding your Administration's consideration to withdraw U.S. forces from Syria," the senators wrote. "We believe that such action at this time is a premature and costly mistake that not only threatens the safety and security of the United States, but also emboldens ISIS, Bashar al Assad, Iran, and Russia." {mosads}"If you decide to follow through with your decision to pull our troops out of Syria, any remnants of ISIS in Syria will surely renew and embolden their efforts in the region," they continued. "However, ISIS is not the only threat. The brutal dictatorship of Bashar al Assad continues to weigh heavily upon the Syrian people, and we fear that a withdrawal of our troops may embolden Bashar al Assad to take further actions to solidify his power," they added. The senators also said they believed removing American presence from Syria would give a boost to "two other adversaries," Iran and Russia. "As you are aware, both Iran and Russia have used the Syrian conflict as a stage to magnify their influence in the region," the senators wrote. "Any sign of weakness perceived by Iran or Russia will only result in their increased presence in the region and a decrease in the trust of our partners and allies." The senators urged the president not to "repeat the same mistakes" made by administrations before

his. "Your administration must not repeat the same mistakes that previous administrations have made and concede to these bad actors," they wrote. Trump declared victory against ISIS in Syria on Wednesday morning in a tweet after The Wall Street Journal, followed by The Washington Post, reported that he was preparing an immediate withdrawal of U.S. troops from Syria. "We have defeated ISIS in Syria, my only reason for being there during the Trump Presidency," the president tweeted. The White House confirmed in a statement Wednesday that the administration has "started returning United States troops home" but emphasized that coalition efforts in Syria would continue. It also doubled down on Trump's claim that "the United States has defeated the territorial caliphate." "The United States and our allies stand ready to re-engage at all levels to defend American interests whenever necessary, and we will continue to work together to deny radical Islamist terrorists territory, funding, support, and any means of infiltrating our borders," White House press secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders said in a statement. Senate Republicans, in a rare move, lashed out at Trump over the decision, with several lawmakers saying Congress received no warning of Trump's announcement. "It's a terrible decision," Rubio said earlier Wednesday. "I hope it can be entirely or at least partially reversed, or we're going to pay a big price for it in the years to come." It also included more money for post-prison rehabilitation programs and halfway houses, and to study methods for reducing recidivism rates. Advocates for the bill, mainly criminal justice reform groups, lobbied hard for Rubio's support. But in a brief statement Tuesday night, Rubio vaguely said the bill "did not address serious concerns raised by local law enforcement, federal prosecutors and constituents in Florida about the sentencing reforms in this bill." "As I've said before, reforms to our criminal justice system are needed because 95 percent of federal inmates will be released at some point," he added. "Preparing them to integrate into society and find meaningful work is in our best interests, but we must always err on the side of public safety." He elaborated his opposition somewhat on Fox

News radio yesterday. Here's what he said: "Let me just tell you that I think everyone is in favor of the first part of that bill which I've long supported as a separate bill and that is the idea that if someone is going to get out of jail anyway, they're scheduled to be out of jail in 10 years, 5 years or 15 years it behooves us, it's in our interest, to make sure that those people have training and those people have skills acquisition and the kinds of things that you need in order to be successful so you don't go back to jail. The second part of it is what's troubling and that is the incentive that they want to use to get these people to take these services is a reduction on the back end, a credit time, credit for the back end where they're able to serve part of the sentence in a halfway house or even in non-detention home probation. Whatever it might be. And then on the front end also reducing some mandatory sentences for certain cases. That's the part that I get nervous about because ultimately you're talking about some very bad people that have done some horrible things. We have to be very careful when we start walking in that direction. I think mandatory minimum sentences can sometimes have impacts that you look at it and say aren't fair, but we also have to recognize mandatory and minimum sentences have taken really terrible human beings off the streets for long periods of time. The best way to prevent a criminal from committing another crime is to not let them get out there...I'm not sure given the Amendments that are out there that they could ever get to the point where I'm 100% confident. I don't understand why we didn't just do this for a small select group of crimes and start from there and build it up as oppose to the reverse, but they've decided to take a huge bite of the apple. Rubio's first job out of law school was with the firm of Al Cardenas, the Cubanborn Miami lawyer who was already close to Bush and later became his state party chairman. Bush donated to Rubio's first run for elective office, a West Miami city commission seat in 1998, the same year Bush was elected governor. Bush introduced Rubio at his election night party in 2010 when he defeated Republican-turned-independent Gov. Charlie Crist. But "mentor" in the traditional sense of working closely with a younger colleague? That did not really happen. In fact, Bush's archived emails suggest that for most of the seven years the two men shared in Tallahassee, their relationship was similar to those Bush had with all the other lawmakers outside of the House and Senate presiding officers. In spring of 2002, Rubio met with Bush about a \$750,000 state grant request for West Miami's sewage plant. The grant nevertheless wound up on the list of projects Bush would veto. There are a few people who do fit that protégé description in Bush's orbit—first are his sons, George P. and Jeb Jr. The elder, George P., has already, at age 38, won statewide office in Texas, as land commissioner. (Jeb was seven years older than that before he won his first big election.) And outside Bush's family is Brian Yablonski, who might be the closest thing Bush had to an intellectual and ideological soulmate during his years in Tallahassee. Yablonski was a recent law school graduate when he went to work for Bush at his Foundation for Florida's Future between the failed 1994 bid for governor and the successful 1998 run. From 1980 forward, there were only three November elections when he did not have a personal interest in the outcome, whether as the campaign chairman (Gov. Bob Martinez, 1990), the son of a vice presidential or presidential candidate (1980, 1984, 1988, 1992), the brother of a presidential candidate (2000, 2004) or the gubernatorial candidate himself (1994, 1998, 2002). But in the election to replace him, it was clear that whether Democrat Jim Davis or Republican Charlie Crist won, Bush's successor would not feel at all committed to preserving his legacy. And so Rubio's role in 2007 was in part as a vessel for keeping Bush's people at some of the levers of power, even after his own departure. Jeb Bush Has Noted That Rubio "Followed [His] Lead" While He Was Governor. "From the start, Rubio made crucial alliances with politically powerful Cuban exiles. Rubio scored his first electoral victory in 1998, a seat on the West Miami City Commission, with a gamechanging assist from a local power broker, Mayor Rebeca Sosa. Sosa, today a commissioner with Miami-Dade County, pointed out that she had been born in Camaguey, the same province as Rubio's mother, Oria. "I first met Oria, who was always active in the [West Miami] community at meetings here," Sosa tells me. "Then her son Marco introduced himself to me. I knew from the start that he was ready for bigger things." Two years later, having astutely worked Miami's Cuban politics, Rubio was seated in the Florida House, representing a lopsided district that included blue-collar Cuban Hialeah, the largely African-American and Dominican neighborhood of Allapattah and tony Coral Gables. That same year, Jeb Bush assumed office as governor, marking the first time since Reconstruction that the GOP controlled the governor's mansion, the Florida House and its Senate. "At that point, Jeb Bush was a god," says Dan Gelber, who served eight years in the Florida House, including as the Democratic leader, working amicably with Rubio. 

But not every business could be exported, which meant Wall Street simply figured out how to import cheap labor, much of it coming from illegal immigrants. This was a slower, more subtle process. Sure, some politicians made a big deal about "jobs Americans wouldn't do," but otherwise the only outcry came from workers who found their wages stalled, benefits cut, and hours slashed until they could be replaced by someone willing to work more hours for less. More often than not, it is about jobs Wall Street doesn't want Americans to do because hiring Americans would require higher wages and better working conditions. To them, it is better to import cheap labor and buy off Americans with cash welfare programs provided by the government. What's more, many sought to rationalize the entire process in glowing, nonexploitative terms. They were convinced that the end of history made us all "citizens of the world." Why should jobs in America be reserved for Americans if borders don't matter? In a global economy, the source of the labor doesn't matter, so long as the job gets done. "Rubio's journey on the issue has been complicated too. As a state legislator from the overwhelmingly Hispanic community of West Miami, he supported legislation that would allow undocumented students to qualify for in-state tuition. After being selected as house speaker in 2005, he scuttled several Republican efforts to crack down on undocumented immigrants. The obscure book he published laying out his agenda, 100 Innovative Ideas for Florida's Future, included three ideas for preventing identity theft and zero about immigration. But when he announced his underdog campaign for the Senate in 2010, Rubio became a hard-liner. He attacked then governor Charlie Crist's support for reform as Obamafriendly liberal amnesty and opposed the Dream Act, which would have given legal status to those sympathetic immigrants brought here as kids. He started out 30 points behind, with the GOP establishment lined up behind the moderate Crist. While immigration wasn't the big issue in the primary-Crist had embraced the Obama stimulus and even literally embraced Obama at a stimulus rally-it helped convince the party's base of older, exurban Tea Partyers that the hiphop-loving Cuban American was one of them. Crist was forced to quit the party to run as an independent. Rubio still buried him in the GOP midterm landslide and captured more than half the Hispanic vote." (Time, 2/7/13)

During His 2010 U.S. Senate Campaign, Rubio Was Outspoken On His Opposition To Ever Supporting Amnesty For Illegal Immigrants. "Immigration reform was a hot topic in the 2010 Florida Senate race when Rubio ran against Charlie Crist, who ultimately ran as an independent, and Democrat Kendrick Meek. The conservative Shark Tank blogger, Javier Manjarres, asked Rubio in 2009: "Are you pro-amnesty for illegal immigration?" "No, no. Never have been. In fact, I'm strongly against amnesty for a number of different reasons. The first is, I always use the example of the speed limit. If you say the speed limit is 70, but you don't ticket people until they reach 80, well then the speed limit is really 80, it's not 70. Amnesty is the same thing. The most important thing we need to do is enforce our existing laws. We have existing immigration laws that are not being adequately enforced. Nothing will make it harder to enforce your existing laws if you reward people who broke them." Rubio also said: "I will never support never have and never will support – any effort to grant blanket, legalization, amnesty to folks who have entered or stayed in this country illegally." In October 2009, Rubio said in an interview on WSRE in Pensacola: "You cannot grant amnesty. If you grant amnesty, you will send a message that all you have to do is come into America illegally, stay here long enough, and we will let you stay. No. 2, you will destroy any hopes you have of having a legal immigration system that works. If the American people see us grant amnesty, they will never again believe in legal immigration, they will never again support it. And that's wrong for our country, bad for our future." "In fact in '86 when Reagan created an amnesty program, about 3 million people were granted amnesty. The result was that you had a bunch of people standing in line to enter legally who all claimed to be illegal because it was easier to get through the amnesty program. So we can't have

amnesty. "And I think if you have a guest worker program in place that functions, the illegal folks that are here now will go back home through attrition." In a Senate debate on Univision in September 2010, Rubio spoke against the DREAM Act, which Senate Democrats planned to debate the following week. Dreamers are young people brought to the United States illegally as children. "What they're offering now is a bill that would in essence grant amnesty to 2 million people," Rubio said. "It's a cynical way to play politics with the lives of real people . . . This is what always happens with Hispanic voters in this country, they manipulate them come election time." The bill mandated fines, background checks and waiting periods, and it was tougher than its 1986 predecessor. In April 2013, Rubio went on Meet the Press to defend the bill. "Oriales García Rubio knows how it feels to want more. When she was a girl in central Cuba in the 1930s, her family of nine lived in a one-room house with a dirt floor. Her dolls were Coke bottles dressed in rags. She dreamed of becoming an actress. Instead she married a security guard, moved with him to the U.S. and found work as a hotel maid. Her husband got a job as a bartender while starting a series of failed businesses-a vegetable stand, a dry cleaner, a grocery. They never had much. But their house had a real floor. Their daughters had real dolls. They sent all four of their children to college to chase their own dreams. That's why on the morning of Dec. 21, she called her youngest son, Marco Antonio Rubio, the 41-yearold Senator from Florida and great Hispanic hope of the Republican Party-or, as she calls him, Tony. She got his voice mail. "Tony, some loving advice from the person who cares for you most in the world," she said in Spanish. "Don't mess with the immigrants, my son. Please, don't mess with them." "A bipartisan group of senators asked President Trump on Thursday to grant temporary protected status (TPS) to Venezuelan citizens in the United States, amid an ongoing political and humanitarian crisis in the South American country. Senate Minority Leader Charles Schumer (D-N.Y.), fellow Democratic Sens. Dick Durbin (Ill.) and Bob Menendez (N.J.), and Republican Marco Rubio (Fla.) wrote to the White House, asking for the administration to designate Venezuela within TPS. In a letter reviewed by The Hill, the senators asked Trump for the designation "in light of the ongoing violence, deteriorating security situation, and humanitarian crisis in Venezuela caused by the illegitimate regime of Nicolás Maduro." Under TPS, foreign nationals of a country undergoing man-made or natural disasters are allowed to live and work in the United States as their home country recovers. Designations are made on a country-by-country basis and apply to foreign nationals already in the United States, and can be renewed indefinitely for periods of up to 18 months. Trump has systematically targeted for termination long-standing TPS designations — including some that have been consistently renewed for decades, such as El Salvador. But the Trump administration has kept at least one newer designation active — for Syrian nationals fleeing the country's civil war — suggesting a potential openness to maintain the program in effect. And the Venezuelan crisis has become a central foreign policy issue and a rare point of accord for Trump and Congress. "The situation in Venezuela is volatile and violent, so it makes all the sense in the world to extend Temporary Protected Status to Venezuelan immigrants who should not be forced to return there while circumstances are so dangerous," said Schumer in a statement. "It is imperative Venezuela, working in concert with our allies throughout Latin America, move past the disastrous and despotic Maduro regime and reestablish order, democracy and human rights. The United States must stand as a beacon of freedom and extend this protection to eligible Venezuelans yearning for a peaceful, prosperous and democratic Venezuela," he added. Durbin, Menendez and Rubio, along with Sens. Patrick Leahy (D-Vt.) and Cory Booker (D-N.J). introduced last week a bill to designate Venezuela for TPS. But the program generally operates by executive action, with the secretary of Homeland Security announcing new designations and terminations. In their letter, the senators ask Trump to mandate a designation for Venezuela, based on the country's political and economic conditions. "Venezuela clearly meets the standard for TPS as it is obviously too dangerous for Venezuelan nationals to return to their country. It is facing simultaneous humanitarian, economic, and political crises of monumental proportions due to Maduro's criminal regime," wrote the senators. The senators added a reminder that TPS designations don't carry any permanent immigration

benefits for their beneficiaries, and any recipient must pass a background check. "As the United States and our partners in the international community have condemned the illegitimate Maduro regime's brutal campaign of repression, granting TPS to Venezuela is a concrete measure your Administration can immediately take to alleviate the suffering of innocent Venezuelan civilians and to demonstrate our nation's commitment to supporting a safe democratic transition in Venezuela so that individuals can safely return home soon," they wrote. Where others focused exclusively on the domestic economy -- the size of the U.S. debt, the need for a balanced-budget amendment, their opposition to raising taxes -- Rubio chose a global theme, offering his vision for America's role in the world in the 21st century. This week, Rubio will expand on that theme with a speech at the Jesse Helms Center in North Carolina that is intended to be a full-throated defense of American engagement overseas, even at a time of belt tightening at home. Rubio says he believes its important to account to people why it is "essential" for the United States to "spend money and risk lives on foreign policy." In particular, Rubio says he will reinforce the importance of promoting democracy. "We don't always agree with other democracies but very rarely do we find ourselves fighting them," he says This kind of rhetoric on U.S. policy abroad certainly doesn't fit the stereotype of a politician who rode to office in 2010 on the backs of tea party activists -upsetting a popular governor along the way -- and who embodies in many ways the new generation of fiscal conservatives in Congress. But Rubio seems intent on carving out a path distinct from many others in the Class of 2010. Through his high-profile speeches, as well as his legislative collaborations with senior senators and daily work on the Foreign Relations and Select Intelligence panels, he is emerging as a fresh GOP voice on foreign policy. In doing so, he is contradicting the notion that the tea party is synonymous with international isolationism. Attempting to show off his foreign policy chops, Rubio argued for an American foreign policy that remains engaged in foreign lands, saying the U.S. should become involved in Syria, and arguing that military action may need to be taken to prevent Iran from obtaining a nuclear weapon. "I disagree with voices in my own party who argue we should not engage at all. Who warn we should heed the words of John Quincy Adams not to go 'abroad, in search of monsters to destroy," said Rubio at the Brookings Institution. "I disagree, because all around us we see the human face of America's influence in the world." Rubio, whose speech did little to dismiss the vice presidential speculation surrounding him, stressed the need for America to build coalitions when becoming involved in foreign affairs, saying there is no other country "to hand off the baton to, even if it were wise to do so." But such coalition building should not hamper the U.S. from leading on the international stage, he said. The Florida senator criticized President Obama for "an overreliance on institutions, global institutions whether its the security council or its the United Nations to take the lead on some of these issues." "Addressing a gathering of conservatives here on Thursday, Mr. Rubio, a potential 2016 presidential candidate, sought to link the right's resolute belief in American exceptionalism with a call for the United States to play a more robust role in confronting bad actors on the world stage. That posture stands in contrast with other members of his party, notably Senator Rand Paul of Kentucky, who argues that the United States should be wary of foreign intervention and retreat from the policies of the George W. Bush era. The divergent national security views of the two ambitious, first-term senators offer an early preview of a debate sure to play out in the Republican presidential primary in 2016. "There is only one nation on earth capable of rallying and bringing together the free people on this planet to stand up to the spread of totalitarianism," Mr. Rubio told attendees of the Conservative Political Action Conference, offering a tour d'horizon of affairs in China, North Korea, Iran, Venezuela and Russia. After suffering a bruising from conservatives over immigration, Mr. Rubio, who devoted over half of his 16-minute address to national security issues, has been delivering the same message of late in formal speeches to conservative think tanks, in Twitter messages, op-ed pieces, television appearances, on the Senate floor and in private conversations with leaders on trips to Britain, South Korea and Japan. He is not only trying to rehabilitate his image among those conservatives who believe that he was advocating for amnesty for illegal immigrants, he also is seizing an opening to put a potential presidential rival who has enjoyed far better reviews recently on the defensive. For a while, Mr. Paul's views on national security, such as his opposition to the use of drones and the National Security Agency surveillance program, dovetailed with the deep conservative unease toward empowering President Obama. But Ukraine offers a moment for hawks like Mr. Rubio to reassert themselves. In an interview, Mr. Rubio did not mention Mr. Paul by name, but the Floridian plainly wants to begin drawing differences between his more hawkish approach to foreign policy and Mr. Paul's preference for restraint abroad. "There are forces within our party, there have always been in American politics, that basically say, 'Who cares what happens everywhere else? Just mind our own business,' " Mr. Rubio said, warning that there are "consequences and repercussions" to such an outlook. Doug Stafford, a top adviser to Mr. Paul, said the senator from Kentucky "rejects the label of isolationism." "He believes in a strong national defense, and an America that leads the way in the world and engages with other nations," Mr. Stafford said. It will either end in the demise of a brutal anti-American dictator, or in his victory over us and our allies. Another option could be to transport Libyans in need of advanced care to U.S. medical facilities in Europe. We can also help Libya lay the foundation for sustainable security. This requires safeguarding the immense stockpiles of weapons and dangerous materials that exist across the country. It also requires bringing Libya's many militias under the TNC's civilian authority, and working toward their demobilization, disarmament and reintegration into Libyan society. We and our allies should encourage this peaceful process as much as we can, and oppose external efforts to pick winners who would advance factional or ideological interests through force. Many Libyans recognize that they need a new civilian-led national army and police force. The TNC has asked the U.S., perhaps together with our Arab partners, to help train this new security force. American involvement in a small training mission could help Libya build a professional security force that contributes to national unity and forms the basis of our future security cooperation. Here, too, the TNC offered to reimburse the costs of our efforts. American support is also important for Libya's democratic transition. The TNC wants to cooperate with the U.S., especially with our nongovernmental organizations, in the monitoring of national elections (which could be held soon), the drafting of a constitution, and the development of civil society. Another area where we can play a vital role is in helping Libya reform its justice system. That the TNC invited us into al-Jdeida prison is evidence of its commitment to treating detainees humanely, with maximum transparency. Yet we continue to hear credible reports that Libyan militias are mistreating and taking revenge against detainees, especially African migrants. American assistance could help Libyans achieve their goal of creating a transparent and accountable system to deliver equal justice. Finally, now is the time to expand our economic ties with Libya and help the Libyan people take part in a more open regional economic order. This could include reactivating and building upon our existing Trade and Investment Framework Agreement, working toward the goal of a bilateral free trade agreement, helping Libya meet the requirements for accession to the World Trade Organization, and gradually turning the "no-fly zone" over Libya into a "pro-fly zone" that fosters civilian air travel. Americans have had their disagreements over the U.S. intervention in Libya, but the sources of those disagreements are now fading into history. What remains is an enormous opportunity for the U.S. to build a partnership with a democratic and pro-American Libya that contributes to the expansion of security, prosperity and freedom across a pivotal region at a time of revolutionary change. This is a worthy goal that should unite Democrats and Republicans, Congress and the president, America and our allies. Libyans will build their own nation. But they desire and deserve our support. Tom Cotton, R-Ark., introduced a budget amendment to increase the Pentagon's budget. At the time, Rubio argued that adjusted for inflation, defense spending had declined by 21 percent since 2010 -- a claim PolitiFact National rated Mostly True. Rubio's amendment proposed restoring defense spending levels to what had been proposed in the spring of 2011, for fiscal 2012 going forward, by then-Defense Secretary Robert Gates. Gates' proposal was prior to spending limits that were imposed by the Budget Control Act of 2011, which became law in the summer of 2011. Returning to the so-called 2012 proposed spending levels would add \$1 trillion in defense spending over 10 years, Benjamin Friedman, a defense research fellow at the liberatrian Cato Institute, told us. That is also the estimate made in a July 2015 report from the nonpartisan Congressional Research Service. The morning after the Milwaukee debate, Rubio was asked in a Fox News interview: "So, where are you going to get the trillion dollars from that Rand Paul says we shouldn't be spending?" Rubio didn't address the figure, saying: "First of all, before we fund anything, the federal government should be fully funding national security." But he has made references to the \$1 trillion cost in the past. In a September 2014 speech, Rubio said he agreed with a recommendation by the bipartisan National Defense Panel to return to the 2012level spending, "which we are on track to be around \$1 trillion short of through fiscal year 2022." And on his campaign website, Rubio says he would restore defense spending to the 2012 level, "and begin to undo the damage caused by \$1 trillion in indiscriminate defense cuts." Huckabee's embrace of a national retail sales tax has riled some conservatives and business groups, but only added to his appeal to Rubio, who described the former Arkansas governor as a visionary willing to swim against the political tide. "I like the concept. I think there has to be deeper discussion about how it's applied," Rubio said of Huckabee's tax stance. Huckabee supports the so-called "FairTax," a type of national retail sales tax that he claims would abolish the Internal Revenue Service and federal income and payroll taxes. The plan would essentially replace the federal tax code with a national tax on consumption. It's a retail tax much like what most states already have in place. "The notion that a consumption tax is fairer than an income tax or a property tax is something that I believe," said Rubio, who last year pushed unsuccessfully for the Legislature to abolish all state property taxes in lieu of a major hike in sales taxes. Rubio said he personally met several times with each of the leading Republican presidential contenders but consistently felt the most aligned with the former Arkansas governor. "He's the most conservative candidate in the race, and he gives Reagan Republicans like myself the best chance to win the nomination," Rubio said. "Obviously, I don't have anything against any of the candidates. I admire something about all of them. But to me, he's the one that I feel the most comfortable with on the social issues, as well as on the fiscal and other issues." Rubio's endorsement, which was announced formally in Miami on Monday, is seen as key to helping Huckabee woo Florida Hispanic and conservative voters. Both sides last week appeared ready to deal. Businesses generally shrug at a bigger homestead exemption, since there's nothing in it for them. But they do want to play nice with Rubio, who can help them next year in passing legislation to ease property taxes on businesses. They already have a menu of ideas. "Murphy was referring to a speech Rubio gave at the Ronald Reagan presidential library in 2011. The quote is accurate, but it did not come in a speech arguing for such drastic reforms to Social Security and Medicare as Murphy described. During his speech, Rubio said Democrats and Republicans created programs and levels of spending that -- while well intentioned -- were doomed to fail from the start. "These programs actually weakened us as a people. You see, almost in forever, it was institutions and society that assumed the role of taking care of one another. If someone was sick in your family, you took care of them. If a neighbor met misfortune, you took care of them. You saved for your retirement and your future because you had to." "We took these things upon ourselves and our communities and our families and our homes and our churches and our synagogues. But all that changed when the government began to assume those responsibilities. All of the sudden, for an increasing number of people in our nation, it was no longer necessary to worry about saving for security because that was the government's job. ... "The other thing is that we built a government and its programs without any account whatsoever for how we were going to pay for it. There was not thought given into how this was going to be sustained." A Rubio spokesman pointed us to the section in which Rubio said the programs didn't take into account future costs. But Rubio did say that such programs

"weakened" Americans. Rubio has long called for reforming Social Security and Medicare. In Florida, about 21 percent of Florida's population -- about 3.9 million people -- receive Social Security benefits. About 4 million Floridians use Medicare for health insurance. The programs accounted for 41 percent of federal program expenditures in fiscal year 2015. The programs face long-term financing shortfalls, leading program trustees and federal budget experts to call for action by Congress. Rubio has said that he favors raising the retirement age for people such as himself in their 40s but not for current retirees or those who will retire soon." (PolitiFact, 10/27/16)



"Even under dynamic scoring – thus taking into account economic growth it spurs - Trump's would cost \$10.1 trillion, Jindal's \$9 trillion, Rubio's \$2.4 trillion, Bush's \$1.6 trillion, Santorum's \$1.1 trillion and Paul's less than \$1 trillion, according to Tax Foundation analyses. The Tax Foundation also went forward 35 years to show the impact the Rubio plan would have on the national debt. In the long run, the plan raises revenue, it said. But unless the tax cuts are offset elsewhere in the budget, the proposal would increase the debt in the first eight years - and the "cumulative effect . . . would be significant," it wrote in a March report. Bernstein of the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities is more blunt: "The only way to absorb such large revenue losses without incurring significant new debt – debt that would take us way over the ceiling – is to cut spending by the same amount. And that's simply implausible. I certainly haven't heard any cuts of that magnitude - or any magnitude – specified by Rubio." Because of the impact of initial deficits and the extra interest costs they produce, the proposal as offered by Rubio and Lee in March would only return the national debt to its current levels in the year 2040, according to the Tax Foundation analysis. Since introducing the tax plan in March, Rubio has said he plans to attack the broader debt issue by doing two things: Cutting taxes to boost the economy and holding the line on spending. He says that the country needs to change Social Security and Medicare, ensuring that they are protected for the current recipients but acknowledging that the programs will be different for younger generations. On Social Security, for example, he has a list of policy proposals. Some of

those would reduce costs, such as one to gradually increase the Social Security retirement age. But the actual cost to the budget or to individual Americans hasn't been specified. Asked whether his tax plan would result in the debt ceiling needing to be raised, campaign spokeswoman Brooke Sammon said Rubio doesn't think it will need to be." (*McClatchy*, 10/16/15)

The Tax Foundation, a Washington think tank, has assessed the various tax plans from Republican presidential candidates to see how they would cut taxes over 10 years. The plans were analyzed under both a "static" model and a "dynamic" one that factors in expected economic growth. While the analyses show how much could be lost in tax revenue, they do not show what budget cuts candidates also say they plan to make to avoid adding to the national debt. It signified the boldest change in his 2011 "Path to Prosperity" budget outline, and Ryan promoted it and defended it relentlessly against critics, including the president. Since then, Ryan and Wyden made major revisions, including a provision like Democrats' "public option," where seniors could opt out of Ryan's most basic change altogether, enrolling in Medicare as a fee-for-service program that would continue to pay directly for care. The Ryan-Wyden plan of December 2011, the basis for what Ryan included in his 2012 budget plan, differs widely in key areas from the spring-2011 iteration of Ryan's plan-the version for which he became known. Critics have called Ryan's 2011 proposal the "end of Medicare as we know it," and that's true. Until now, Medicare has operated as a "fee-for-service" system; under Ryan's plan, it would operate more like a voucher system, although Ryan and his aides have resisted this term. Medicare would cease to pay for health services directly, instead operating as a board that approves a menu of health plans for public sale and doles out predetermined lumps of money to people enrolled in Medicare, to help them buy those plans." We've rated two specific claims when it comes to Rubio and earmarks before -- we called a claim that he supported \$800,000 to replace the turf at a field where he played flag football Half True and a claim that he tried to insert \$1.5 million into the budget for a rowing institute Pants on Fire! Florida's version of the earmark was something called a Community Budget Issue Request -- a budget request legislators made for local projects. Legislators had to file their request ahead of the budget planning process and attach their name to every request. The Legislature stopped the practice in 2009, the year after Rubio left office. In 2002, Rubio's third year, the Florida House requested \$1.5 billion in Community Budget Issue Requests, according to data kept by the state. To put that in perspective, the state budget that Gov. Jeb Bush signed that year totaled \$50 billion, and legislators had been warned of a tight budget. (They actually were summoned back to Tallahassee to slash \$1 billion from the budget in December 2001 to keep the state from going in the red.) "Republican U.S. Senate front-runner Marco Rubio brags on his Web site that he didn't officially request budget pork in his last four years as a leader in the Florida House. But during Rubio's eight years in office — including the final two when he was House speaker — he unofficially helped push loads of hometown spending: \$250 million, according to a Times/Herald analysis of little-known budget documents. The budget items linked to Rubio from 2000 to 2008 are part of a list compiled yearly by the governor's office to track hometown spending. Most of Rubio's budget items benefited his home county of Miami-Dade — from a \$50,000 grant sought for a Coral Gables park to \$80 million for a University of Miami genomics project. A total of \$25 million in requests were vetoed by the governor. The amount of budget money connected to Rubio attests to his skill as a lawmaker but also contrasts with his campaign image as a tight-fisted spending hawk crusading against "earmarks" that have plagued the budget process in Washington. Rubio wouldn't comment and his campaign referred questions to consultant Albert Martinez, who worked in the House under Rubio. Martinez said Rubio tried to cut taxes and spending, not increase them. "Marco Rubio's a limited-government conservative," Martinez said. "He's not a no-government conservative." The budget items also shed light on times when Rubio's public job as a legislator dovetailed with his private interests. One appropriation for Miami-Dade County was sought by lobbyists who worked at his law firm. Another item aided a friend's fight for a Florida Turnpike contract. Other proposals gave big sums to Florida International University and Jackson Memorial Hospital, where Rubio later worked as a consultant. Martinez said the items linked to Rubio helped the whole county, and he described the spending for the hospital and Tallahassee parlance for hometown spending lawmakers obtain for their districts, often with little scrutiny. 



In April 2007, Rubio Noted That An Apology For Slavery Resolution "Would Merit **Discussion.**" "Nearly 142 years after Florida's slaves first tasted freedom, state leaders say the time may soon be right to apologize for Florida's role in their bondage. In 1860, at the outbreak of the Civil War, 44 percent of Florida's population -- or nearly 62,000 out of 140,424 people -were slaves. Florida's miles of uninhabited coast and hidden harbors also were a haven for slavers. Although officially banned by the federal government in 1803, the trans-Atlantic slave trade continued to prosper by landing slaves in Florida and then smuggling them into other states. "There were a lot of atrocities that happened in Florida," said Sen. Tony Hill, D-Jacksonville, chairman of Florida's Legislative Black Caucus. Hill had considered asking fellow state lawmakers to face the issue during the final weeks of their annual session, scheduled to end May 4. But with so little time left, and major issues such as property-tax relief and the budget still to be resolved, he plans to wait until next year. And at least among the Legislature's top leaders, his request is likely to get a warm reception. "Obviously, slavery was one of the darkest periods in American history, one of the saddest and most tragic," said House Speaker Marco Rubio, R-West Miami. "I think it would merit discussion. There aren't a lot of defenders of slavery left." Senate President Ken Pruitt, a Civil War history buff, said he would be "very supportive" of an attempt to address Florida's role in condoning the institution of slavery. "While it is historic, it is repugnant," said Pruitt, R-Port St. Lucie. Through a push by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and black legislators, several Southern and border states this year have publicly begun to face their role in the enslavement of Africans and their descendants, an institution that helped ignite the four-year war between the states. No state has yet issued an apology, but Virginia expressed its "profound regret" in February. Similar bills have passed in Maryland and North Carolina. Legislation is pending in Alabama, Georgia and Missouri. And reparations may be considered in Mississippi. Margaret Newton of Boynton

Beach, who directs the African and African-American Studies Office for Palm Beach County public schools, said it is important for Florida to recognize and acknowledge wrongdoings. "More than 140 years after slavery thrived in Florida, some lawmakers from both parties believe now is time for the state Legislature to apologize. Democratic Sen. Tony Hill, working since last year with Republican Senate President Ken Pruitt, will propose a resolution in which the Legislature formally apologizes for the history of slavery in this state. "Black folks have come so far in this country, to come from slavery to a Democratic nominee for president," said Sen. Gary Siplin, D-Orlando. He filed legislation seeking a similar apology but vowed to work for Hill's version. "This apology is the right thing to do." Exact language isn't yet available, and it's not clear if the House leadership will sign on to the plan. But Pruitt's spokeswoman confirmed his interest, and House Speaker Marco Rubio said he generally supports the idea. "Expressions of regret are symbolic, but they are important," Rubio said. Whether the proposal will encounter opposition is unclear. None has emerged so far, and politically it's not necessarily prudent to oppose such a measure. The proposal echoes similar moves by other states, including New Jersey, Alabama, North Carolina and Virginia. The New Jersey Assembly in January passed a resolution expressing "profound regret" for the state's role in slavery. Hill's resolution would be the first of its kind in Florida, and the fact that Pruitt has been involved could boost its chances of passing. Hill, a union organizer from Jacksonville, said he was inspired to push the matter in part by the 2006 film Amazing Grace. The movie is based on the life of William Wilberforce, who fought in the British Parliament to end the slave trade in the British Empire. Hill said he and Pruitt, who works in real estate in Port St. Lucie, have discussed the film, which Hill called moving. Slavery in Florida dates back to the late 1500s, when the Spanish used slaves to build forts. Centuries later, slave use moved to the state's agriculture economy. The British imported slaves to Florida between 1763 and 1783, and the coastline was a popular dock for ships carrying slaves intended for other states. The practice grew after Florida became a U.S. territory in the early 1800s and plantation owners from Virginia, the Carolinas and other Southern states moved their operations - and their slaves - to Florida's cheaper land, primarily in the Panhandle. By 1860, there were nearly 62,000 slaves - 44 percent of the state population. "It's time for us to move forward," said Sen. Frederica Wilson, D-Miami, a member of the black caucus. "And the only way for us to do that is to say, 'We made a mistake.' Until we do that, the racial divide in Florida remains strong." Hill's plan was the second race-relations issue to come to the fore as the annual legislative session opened Tuesday. Rubio, in his opening remarks, told lawmakers he wants to address "the tragic tale of what is happening to young African-American males." "It is intolerable and unacceptable that an entire segment of our population has come to believe that the American dream is not available to them," Rubio said. "And we can never be the nation God intended us to be so long as this tragedy persists." Meanwhile, House Rep. Don Brown, R-DeFuniak Springs, wants to create a Confederate flag license plate honoring "Confederate heritage." He told the St.

The House and Senate approved a resolution expressing "profound regret for the involuntary servitude of Africans, and calling for reconciliation among all Floridians." There was no discussion before the unanimous voice votes, but the reading of the resolution — which described how slaves' ears were nailed to posts during whippings — brought some lawmakers, including Tampa Sen. Arthenia Joyner, to tears. "It was painful," said Joyner, a Democrat and black caucus member. "I tried to imagine myself under those circumstances. I mean, I know how incensed I got in the '60s just knowing I couldn't get into a movie!" Gov. Charlie Crist, affectionately dubbed "Florida's first black governor" by some black lawmakers, visited the Senate chamber to watch the vote. In the House, Speaker Marco Rubio, R-West Miami, took the unusual step of ordering all members to their seats. And in a rare appearance, Senate President Ken Pruitt, R-Port St. Lucie, sat at Rubio's side. "This was as sincere and as meaningful an apology as could be given," Pruitt said. "It was important for the words to stand on their own." The resolution did not address reparations. Crist appeared to be open to such efforts if slave descendancy could be established. "Certainly, it's something you'd like to be able to do," he said. But one black lawmaker, Sen. Al Lawson, said reparations are unlikely because they are controversial and they would cost the state so much. "But I appreciate the governor's comment," said Lawson, D-Tallahassee. As news of the vote spread Thursday, public reaction on the St. Petersburg Times' Web site, tampabay.com, varied. Some readers accused lawmakers of "wasting" time and questioned why an apology was needed when all slave owners were dead. Others said it wasn't enough; reparations are in order. Some commended lawmakers, saying they hoped it would help heal society's racial strife. "It is fundamentally impossible for America to reach her destiny as a nation founded on the equal rights of all if our government believes an entire segment of the human population doesn't have a right to exist," the 2016 presidential candidate said at the National Right to Life Convention in New Orleans. The Supreme Court legalized abortion in the 1973 decision, ruling that states cannot prevent women from obtaining the procedure up until the fetus would be viable outside the womb, around 22 to 24 weeks of pregnancy. In the years before abortion was legal, it was common for women to land in the hospital after seeking illegal, "back-alley" abortions or attempting to self-induce. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that in 1972, the year before Roe v. Wade, 130,000 women obtained illegal or self-induced procedures, and 39 of them died. Republicans in Congress are currently trying to chip away at Roe v. Wade by banning abortion at 20 weeks of pregnancy. Rubio and nearly every other Republican presidential candidate has endorsed the legislation. Ten states have enacted similar abortion limits, and anti-abortion advocates hope one of the laws eventually makes its way to the Supreme Court and overturns Roe. Rubio said Friday that the issue of abortion is "more than political or policy-related. It is a definitional issue about the kind of country we want to be." According to a recent Gallup poll, half of Americans consider themselves "pro-choice," while 44 percent identify as "pro-life." But Rubio said he believes that nearly every American is personally opposed to the procedure, regardless of whether they think it should be legal. "You can judge a cause by the arguments made on both sides. For example, I rarely meet anyone who's willing to say they're pro-abortion," he said. "I think both of those instances are horrifying and fortunately, they are extremely rare. It happens. And anytime it happens, it's horrifying and it's a tragedy," he said. "But I personally and honestly and deeply believe that all human life is worthy of protection irrespective of the circumstances, in which, that human life was created. I personally believe that you do not correct one tragedy with a second tragedy." The Florida senator has recently been vocal about his desire to see Planned Parenthood defunded following the release of videos accusing the group of illegally selling the organs and tissue of aborted fetuses. "Every single one of us started at that same stage. It can't become anything other than a human being. And it is neither up to you nor I nor any politician to decide that we're going to allow this life to move forward and this life not to," Rubio said. "Do you want to really have a government in the decision of deciding what a human life is and what's not a human life?" Rubio pushed back on the idea that his abortion positions are radical and said that a high value of human life is a traditional view that resonates with most Americans and that should not change. Sure, the Florida senator and Republican presidential hopeful is running a distant third and has only picked up a single point in the polls since October. But an influential pocket of the punditry decided long ago that Rubio is the invisible front-runner, the candidate who will surge when Donald Trump and Ted Cruz do whatever Alien and Predator did to each other at the end of Alien vs. Predator. Since Rubio has been anointed the establishment candidate, able to bridge the rabid base and the moderate moneymen, it is probably worth noting that he is strikingly anti-gay—much more so than Trump, and at least as much as Cruz. The story of Rubio's homophobic misdeeds reaches back to 2006. Florida's foster care system was in crisis. Faced with too many children and too few foster parents, the Department of Children and Family Services allowed a contractor to force abused and neglected children to sleep on the floor of a conference room at a DCF building for several days. These children had suffered severe physical harm and psychological trauma before entering the foster system—and DCF made them live and sleep in a conference room together without beds, bedding, supervision, medical care, sanitary

bathrooms, or adequate food. (The children, represented by an attorney, successfully sued DCF shortly thereafter.) Obviously, DCF's actions were inexcusable: The agency essentially permitted children to be imprisoned in inhumane conditions. (I've visited the building where the children were kept. It is not dissimilar to a minimum-security prison.) But the scandal raised a broader issue: Florida simply didn't have enough foster parents to take in all these abused and abandoned children. What to do? One option frequently floated was to expand the pool of potential fosterers and adopters by allowing same-sex couples to take in children. The Florida legislature banned gay adoption in 1977, but times had changed, and the pressure on the foster care system had grown untenable. Would the legislature reconsider the ban? Rubio, who was then serving as the Florida House majority leader, instantly and emphatically quashed the idea. "Some of these kids are the most disadvantaged in the state," he said. "They shouldn't be forced to be part of a social experiment." Rubio, in other words, would rather see the children languish in the flawed foster care system than allow same-sex couples to take them in. The path to passing a relief package was slower than after Hurricane Katrina hit Louisiana and Mississippi in 2005. Following Hurricane Sandy, President Barack Obama had just been elected to a second term and conservative Republicans elected in a tea party wave in 2010, and then in 2012, were looking for ways to curb spending. On Dec. 7, Obama requested \$60.4 billion in emergency appropriations. Three weeks later, the Democraticled Senate voted 62-32 to approve it, with Rubio voting against. Twelve Republicans joined the Democrats in voting for the bill. Republicans then countered with a stripped-down alternative of \$24 billion, which Rubio supported but which failed on a party-line vote. Rubio said he voted against the larger bill because it contained "unrelated pork." ("Pork" or "pork barrel" spending is government spending for localized projects secured primarily or solely for bringing money to political representatives' districts.) There was funding for many things in the \$60.4 billion package, including money for a declared fishery disaster in Alaska, Ellis said. But nearly everything had some relationship to a disaster — not only Sandy — although some were more tenuous than others. "The question is did it have to be funded in an emergency supplemental" meaning it would allow lawmakers to evade budget caps, Ellis said. "And the question for Sen. Rubio and every other senator, is how much is too much extra stuff and what is the alternative." Then-House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, sought to divide the relief funding. FEMA warned that it would run out of money in January if Congress didn't provide additional borrowing authority to pay claims. The first vote, a \$9.7 billion measure, passed the House on Jan. 4. DeSantis, a newly sworn-in congressman, was one of 67 House Republicans who voted against the bill. DeSantis said he sympathized with victims and that those with flood insurance should have their claims paid. But he said that "allowing the program to increase its debt by another \$9.7 billion with no plan to offset the spending with cuts elsewhere is not fiscally responsible."

The funding passed the Senate in a voice vote, in which individual senators' votes are not recorded. Rubio spokesman Alex Conant told the Tampa Bay Times that Rubio supported it, calling it a "clean" appropriation. Obama signed the measure into law. The second part of the disaster relief, a bill for \$50.5 billion, passed the Senate Jan. 28, 2013, 62-36 largely along party lines. 

Its largest donor by far was a scandal-plagued PAC called OPH (\$50,000) but Democratic super-lobbyist Ron Book also gave generously. Bridget Nocco, Mr. Rubio's lobbyist pal, was paid nearly \$26,000 by the PAC for salary and consulting services, according to its nonprofit tax filings with the IRS. Shortly before its demise FCLC made two payments to a super PAC (which are known as 527s, based on the IRS rule that allows them) with a similar name, Floridians for Conservative Leadership in Government (FCLG). The latter was formed in 2004 with Marco Rubio as its president and registered agent, his wife as the VP and Urquiola as its treasurer. In any event, the State of Florida dissolved Mr. Rubio's 527 in 2006 because—you guessed it—it failed to file an annual report. Many of the companies and individuals that donated to the two groups had major business interests before the Florida Legislature and the two entities had overlapping donors, such as super-lobbyist Mr. Book, and payees, such as Bridget Nocco, who netted \$90,062 from the 527 for salary and consulting services. Another notable recipient of cash from Mr. Rubio's 527 was a company called Servicarga, which in 2004 received \$3,500, which it billed for "courier services." What's curious here is that Mr. Rubio's wife owned Servicarga and that, according to IRS returns and other documents, the company stopped operating in 1997." (Observer, 1/18/16)

In many ways, it has been a house of horrors for Rubio, a financial and political liability heading into the 2016 election. While he and Rivera were state legislators, they paid way too much for it in 2005, only to see foreclosure proceedings embarrassingly initiated against them during Rubio's 2010 Senate race. At another point, a tropical storm flooded the entire neighborhood so badly that neighbors used canoes to get around. Now, the three-bedroom property stands as a stubborn symbol of both a politically problematic friendship and lingering questions about Rubio's personal finances, which dogged him on the campaign trail in 2010 and may do so again. The friendship has frayed in recent years, friends say, as the fortunes of Rubio, 43, and Rivera, 49, have diverged. Last week, they put the 1,228-square-foot house up for sale. The list price is 125,000 - 10,000 less than what the two men paid for it a decade ago. But chances are the home won't sell before April, when Rubio says he'll decide whether to seek the presidency. Rubio's critics are waiting to make hay of any revelations that may come of the federal investigation of Rivera and to point to their status as roommates during the years when Rivera allegedly engaged in illegal campaign activities. "This will be an issue," declared Craig Smith, a top adviser for the Ready for Hillary super PAC, echoing the views of many supporters and detractors alike. "When you run for president, voters and the press have an insatiable appetite for people's histories, what they've done, who they are. ... Rivera, running for his first and only successful congressional bid, quickly hand-delivered a \$9,525 cashier's check to cover missed payments and fees. "There is no foreclosure," Rivera told the St. Petersburg Times then. "The mortgage is paid and up to date." Rubio was infuriated, friends say. Rubio has handled paying the mortgage ever since. He and Rivera got a mutual friend to help manage the property and find a tenant later that year, a single mother who recently moved out. The tenant declined to speak with POLITICO, but she said in a written statement that Rubio and his wife "have been very gracious and understanding of my circumstances." She called them "extraordinary landlords" and expressed her "deep appreciation ... for all that you've done." Neighbors say they had little idea about the drama surrounding the house or the ambitions of Rubio. Caridad Tamayo, who has lived in the neighborhood for five years, said she didn't recognize Rubio's name. Neighbor Richard Linck said he knew about Rubio but had "no idea" he was planning to run for president. "The reality is Marco wants to sell this house because it's horrible," one friend said. "It's been nothing but trouble for him. There was the foreclosure. There was a flood that made it tough to get to without a canoe at one point. And there's David. Marco won't turn his back on David. But we all wish he would." 

The letter also mandated, in accordance with state laws, that Rubio's salary would not include any money the firm received from lobbying. Instead, the son of Cuban immigrants was brought on board largely to help the firm diversify its mostly white, male Miami office. "Because of my political obligations it was understood that my primary responsibility would not be to handle individual clients," Rubio said in a written response to questions from The Post. "Instead, my job was to raise the firm's profile in Miami, help attract younger lawyers to build for the future, and opening new doors for the firm, particularly in the Cuban American business community where Broad and Cassel had limited ties." In many ways, it has been a house of horrors for Rubio, a financial and political liability heading into the 2016 election. At another point, a tropical storm flooded the entire neighborhood so badly that neighbors used canoes to get around. Now, the three-bedroom property stands as a stubborn symbol of both a politically problematic friendship and lingering questions about Rubio's personal finances, which dogged him on the campaign trail in 2010 and may do so again. The friendship has frayed in recent years, friends say, as the fortunes of Rubio, 43, and Rivera, 49, have diverged. Last week, they put the 1,228-square-foot house up for sale. The list price is \$125,000 — \$10,000 less than what the two men paid for it a decade ago. But chances are the home won't sell before April, when Rubio says he'll decide whether to seek the presidency. Rubio's critics are waiting to make hay of any revelations that may come of the federal investigation of Rivera and to point to their status as roommates during the years when Rivera allegedly engaged in illegal campaign activities. "This will be an issue," declared Craig Smith, a top adviser for the Ready for Hillary super PAC, echoing the views of many supporters and detractors alike. "When you run for president, voters and the press have an insatiable appetite for people's histories, what they've done, who they are. ... Rivera also arranged a contract worth \$1 million between a Miami dog track and a company owned by his mother to lead a 2008 election campaign to legalize slot machine gambling in Miami-Dade County. Rivera later acknowledged accepting at least \$132,000 as part of the arrangement. But he didn't list the money on his state financial disclosure forms. Rivera faced a challenge from Democrat Joe Garcia and was alleged to have provided money to help Justin Sternad, a candidate in the Democratic primary. Garcia ultimately won the primary and defeated Rivera. The Federal Election Commission alleged that Rivera, who also is a former member of the Florida House, violated a law that bars contributions made in the names of other people. "The FEC alleges that during the Democratic primary, Rivera executed a scheme to secretly provide funds to Sternad's campaign to weaken Garcia, who was likely to be Rivera's general election opponent," Cooke wrote in a Feb. 23 summary judgment in favor of the federal agency. "In April 2012, Rivera initiated the scheme when he met with his associate, Ana Sol Alliegro and directed her to approach Sternad with an offer to provide financial support to his primary campaign. Alliegro did so, and Sternad accepted the offer. At Rivera's supposed direction, Alliegro then spent the next few months acting as an intermediary, transmitting funds to Sternad, the Sternad (political) committee and the vendors providing services to that committee." In granting summary judgment, Cooke refuted Rivera's arguments that testimony by Alliegro should be rejected. The indictment states that beginning in 2017 — shortly after former President Donald Trump took office — Rivera and Nuhfer were sought out to help lobby politicians on behalf of Venezuela and gain political support to normalize relations between the U.S. and the country led by strongman Nicolas Maduro. As part of the effort to curry favor on behalf of Venezuela, the indictment references meetings that were arranged with a U.S. congressman from Texas as well as a U.S. senator from Florida. Previous reports have already identified the congressman as former Rep. Pete Sessions. The indictment does not state the name of the senator, but Rubio played a pivotal role in advising the Trump administration over its dealings with Latin American countries." (Politico, 12/5/22)

Rubio's dealings with Rivera emerged Monday night after federal authorities arrested and charged the former Miami lawmaker with eight criminal counts, including money laundering, conspiracy and failing to register as a foreign agent for work allegedly connected to the Maduro regime. An unsealed indictment states that Rivera and an unnamed U.S. senator from Florida met in July 2017 in Washington to discuss a possible deal with Maduro in which the Venezuelan leader would agree to "hold free and fair elections in Venezuela." The senator was not identified by name, but Rivera and Rubio have known each other for years and once owned a house together in Tallahassee. Rivera and the senator first met to discuss Venezuela on July 9, 2017 at a private residence in D.C., according to the indictment The pair gathered three days later at a Washington hotel with several others, including an unidentified Venezuelan politician who attended the meeting by telephone, according to the indictment. Rubio has been a harsh critic of Venezuela and Maduro and was seen as influential in pressing the Trump administration to keep sanctions in place. Federal authorities have not accused Rubio of any wrongdoing and he was not identified by name in the indictment. In an emailed statement, however, a spokesperson for Rubio said that "during a July 2017 meeting, Mr. Rivera told Senator Rubio that close Maduro associate Raul Gorrín wanted to personally deliver a letter from the dictator to the President outlining an agreement to hold free and fair elections and exit power. A few days later Gorrin came to a brief meeting in Washington, but produced no such letter and failed to even mention the possibility of any such deal."" (*Politico*, 12/6/22)

"Mr. Rivera and Mr. Rubio were also involved in another dubious deal in the mid-2000s that is breathtakingly brazen even by Florida's promiscuous standards and which was partially unraveled over many years by a joint FBI/DEA task force. One of the key figures in the scam was Alan Mendelsohn, a GOP lobbyist and fundraiser who raised about \$2 million that he funneled to numerous Florida politicians or used for his personal benefit, according to his subsequent indictment. Of that amount about \$1.5 million came from a crooked businessman named Joel Steinger. Steinger was the founder and CEO of a private company called Mutual Benefits Corp., through which he pulled off a \$1.2 billion Ponzi scheme that targeted elderly South Florida retirees and members of the state's gay community. Mutual Benefits Corp. also helped a South American drug cartel launder money, evidence compiled by a the FBI/DEA task force showed. Mendelsohn funneled money to politicians through various political entities, including a political committee he set up called The Ophthalmology PAC. Steinger gave him money in the hopes of winning political support for a bill that would exempt Mutual Benefits Corp. from state regulation. Mendelsohn also got money to pass along to politicians from a few other dubious players, including a credit counseling firm and gambling companies. Mr. Rubio and Mr. Rivera each got \$50,000, easily ranking them among the biggest recipients of Ophthalmology PAC cash. Mr. Rubio received his payout from Mendelsohn in December of 2003 through a PAC he set up called Floridians for Conservative Leadership. The Ophthalmology PAC was by far the biggest donor to Floridians for Conservative Leadership. Mr. Rubio used the latter to pay for, among other things, courier services performed by his wife, sister and nephews; to cover the costs of meals and lodging that were allegedly campaign-related; and to pay a close friend and lobbyist who raised money for him for what was described as political consulting work." So he hooked up with some clinics and doctors and used them to pitch terminally ill HIV patients who

were desperate for quick money and would sell their life insurance policies for pennies on the dollar. To ratchet up profits even more Steinger retained a doctor, Clark Mitchell, to diagnose people as being terminally ill when they were in fact perfectly healthy. Of course, the investors in Mutual Benefits Corp. started getting angry when people who sold the firm their life insurance policies didn't die because that meant they didn't get the huge returns Steinger promised them (up to 72 percent, according to this story). "Either Rubio knows something the rest of us don't or he doesn't mind risking his reputation for some serious campaign dough." During his sentencing, Judge William Zloch, said the disgraced lobbyist's misconduct was like a "cancer" with "tentacles" that hindered good government across the state, according to the Tampa Bay Times. One of the biggest financial backers of the PAC is expected to be Norman Braman, a billionaire businessman and philanthropist who runs auto dealerships across South Florida and in the Denver area. He's the former owner of the Philadelphia Eagles and a major history buff — his Miami office, on the second floor of one of his downtown dealerships, is adorned with framed letters written by Colonial and Civil War-era generals and lawmakers. Rubio Is Known To Have A Close, Longstanding Political Leadership With The Fanjul Family, Which Owns Sugar Conglomerate Florida Crystals And Prominently Supports Continued Sugar Industry Subsidies That Rubio Also Backs. "After talking about being the son of a bartender during his announcement to run for president last year, Marco Rubio walked off stage in Miami and hugged a middle-age man in a tan suit. That man was Jose "Pepe" Fanjul, the patriarch of the family that owns sugar giant Florida Crystals and whom Rubio has credited for helping him win the U.S. Senate seat he's defending this year. The Fanjuls and their company have supported Rubio since his first election to the Florida House in 2000 and stood by him as he became the speaker, a senator and a presidential candidate. And Rubio has stood by many of the company's positions, in particular related to the environment and Lake Okeechobee discharges. In addition to the \$504,000 the Fanjuls and their company have given to support the Republican, they have organized dozens of fundraisers and introduced him to key political players. The sugar industry, including Florida Crystals competitor U.S. Sugar Corp., has invested \$632,000 on Rubio since 2000. Rubio and the Fanjuls share a common personal background. Pepe and his

brother, Alfonso, were born into a prominent Cuban sugar family that fled the island after Fidel Castro seized power in 1959. They created one of the nation's largest sugar productions in South Florida, with operations in the Dominican Republic as well. Rubio's parents left the island in 1956. "The Fanjuls believed in me early on, when few others did, and I'm grateful for that," Rubio said in an emailed statement. He declined to be interviewed for this story. Despite winning the Senate in 2010 on an anti-big government platform, Rubio is a staunch defender of a federal program that artificially inflates sugar prices. The Great Depression-era program sets quotas on imports and gives growers loans they can repay with surplus sugar if prices fall near of below the loan rate. The program has many opponents: environmentalists; manufacturers that use sugar in their products, like candy makers; and the corn industry, which produces corn syrup, a sugar substitute. Congress has voted to continue the program several times with support from several Florida lawmakers. The sugar industry employs 14,000 to 15,000 people in Florida, and Rubio is prepared to eliminate the program once other countries end their sugar subsidies, he said in a 2015 "Meet the Press" interview. "If the American sugar industry is wiped out because, for example, the Brazilians heavily subsidize theirs," Rubio said, "once we are out of the picture, the Brazilians now hold a disproportionate share of the sugar industry and at that point they can charge whatever they want for it." Rubio's Democratic opponent, U.S. Rep. Patrick Murphy, voted against a 2013 amendment to reform the federal sugar program. Murphy, who represents the Treasure Coast and northern Palm Beach County, "supports working with our trading partners to remove subsidies and barriers so that all sides can compete on a level playing field," his campaign said." "I mentioned above a PAC and a bribe so let me turn to that story now, which actually involved a few of Mr. Rubio's PACs and assorted businesses. Pay particular attention here to three key figures who were all intimate, longtime friends of Mr. Rubio's: —Alexander Heckler, an attorney who in 2011 was found to have set up PACs that shuffled illegal straw donations to political candidates for his clients. Heckler, a lawyer and leading Florida lobbyist as well as a "Hillraiser," the term for then-Senator Hillary Clinton's top fundraisers, performed legal and accounting services for the treasurer of a Rubio-affiliated PAC, but only disclosed that several years afterwards, apparently to obscure his role. Heckler is also the stepson of Franklin Sands, who for many years—including the period when

the story below took place—was the most powerful Democrat in the Florida House. —Joaquin Urquiola, the treasurer for the two Rubio-affiliated PACs who Heckler did work for, who at the same time was being questioned by federal regulators about his role at an Ecuadorian bank with Miami offices that was suspected of violating anti-money laundering laws by taking in cash from several South American drug cartels. Urquiola was an accountant and director of the bank, Pacific National Bank, and he and Pacific were in fact subsequently hit with fines for violating anti-money laundering laws and the Bank Secrecy Act. According to a 2011 story about the case in the South Florida Business Journal, the bank and its directors had previously been sanctioned for similar crimes and allowed "the violations to continue for years." —Bridget Nocco, the lobbyist friend of Mr. Rubio's whom I mentioned above. The story begins in late 2002 when Jeanette Dousdebes, Mr. Rubio's wife, incorporated a nonprofit PAC called Floridians for Conservative Leadership Committee (FCLC). She was the registered agent and only director for this short-lived entity, which the State of Florida dissolved three years later because it had failed to file an annual report. Urquiola, the executive at the bank that allowed a drug cartel to launder money, was the group's treasurer, and Heckler quietly helped him out, according to information provided to me by the National Legal and Policy Center, a Virginia-based watchdog group that provided key research for this section of the story. During its brief existence, FCLC raised \$228,350, of which roughly \$35,000 disappeared into thin air, according to the entity's own tax returns. Its largest donor by far was a scandal-plagued PAC called OPH (\$50,000) but Democratic super-lobbyist Ron Book also gave generously. Bridget Nocco, Mr. Rubio's lobbyist pal, was paid nearly \$26,000 by the PAC for salary and consulting services, according to its nonprofit tax filings with the IRS." (Observer, 1/18/16)

What's also odd is that the federal tax identification number Urquiola used for Floridians for Real Family Values' tax return was actually the same used by the FCLG, the 527 that Mr. Rubio created and was president of, which suggests that the two entities were essentially identical. Between October 24 and November 2 of 2006, Floridians for Real Family Values raised \$244,000. Also in 2006, Urquiola incorporated a company called Florida Media Productions Group Inc., which operated out of the same address as the FCLG. Florida Media Productions Group was established to work on behalf of political campaigns, but there's not much evidence that the company did any work at all. It never bothered to set up a website nor did it ever create a single TV, print or online campaign ad. The only income it ever received—about \$150,000 came from two Heckler's controlled PACs, one being Floridians for Real Family Values. All that money was paid for "consulting" services, though the payments were made long after the election year was over. Most of the money raised by Floridians for Real Family Values that didn't go to Florida Media Productions Group-about \$33,000-simply disappeared when the former was shut down." (Observer, 1/18/16)

"It wasn't, 'How's everything going?' It was, 'Can you help me become majority leader?' " recalls Fasano. (The former legislator is now supporting Bush for president.) "He had only been a member of the Florida Legislature for a couple of years. He wasn't thinking about what good he could do for the Legislature, for his party, and for his constituents. It's a tedious task, one that involves managing the grievances of dozens of lawmakers whose political careers could end with the shifting of lines. Johnnie Byrd, a Republican leader on his way to becoming speaker, thought Rubio would be perfect for the job. "He has this real ability to communicate with people all over the state," Byrd says. "Many Miami-based legislators don't have that ability to communicate statewide, so I let him run with it.' Fueled by a steady diet of Mountain Dew and Cuban coffee, Rubio pored over the legislative maps. He broke the state into five regions and met one-on-one with lawmakers to help draw boundaries. "The most personal thing a legislator ever has to deal with is their own district," Byrd says, "and he was able to make them reasonably happy. ... Imagine a freshman legislator in an organization driven by seniority and he captivates all of them, on both sides of the aisle, and brings it in for a landing." Rubio's hustle endeared him to leadership, and in late 2002, he was appointed majority leader. At some level, it was a natural stepping stone to House speaker. Yet Rubio's supporters discouraged the move, saying it would kill his speakership ambitions before they left the cradle. "I would be in the vote-counting business, and would have to twist arms on difficult votes, making as many enemies as friends in the process," he wrote in his memoir. His solution? He persuaded Byrd, the speaker, to restructure the jobmaking him primarily the chief spokesman for the House GOP while transferring the more difficult legislative wrangling to the whip's office." Senate, reversing a pledge he made a year ago to either assume the presidency or return to private life in Florida. The decision instantly transforms an already competitive race and improves Republicans' chances of maintaining the Senate majority. Rubio (R-Fla.) issued a lengthy statement explaining his decision to reverse course, citing the Senate's power to "act as a check and balance on the excesses of a president" as a central reason. "Control of the Senate may very well come down to the race in Florida," he said. "That means the future of the Supreme Court will be determined by the Florida Senate seat. It means the future of the disastrous Iran nuclear deal will be determined by the Florida Senate seat. It means the direction of our country's fiscal and economic policies will be determined by this Senate seat. The stakes for our nation could not be higher." His entry into the race comes shortly before a Friday deadline for candidate filings and after weeks of pressure from national GOP figures who urged Rubio to reconsider his frequently repeated intention to either become president or a "private citizen" come 2017. Those entreaties were rooted in blunt political reality: Rubio, with his near-universal name recognition and proven fundraising capacity, would give Republicans their best chance of winning the swing-state seat and, perhaps, retaining the Senate majority. "I think it moves Florida from a likely loss to an almost certain pickup, and so it's not only important to Florida, it has a huge impact on our ability to hold the majority," Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.), who played a leading role in persuading Rubio to run, said on Wednesday. Josh Holmes, a political consultant who is close to McConnell, said Rubio's decision will allow national Republican groups to shift resources to other competitive races across the country. "It is hard to overstate how important this development is for every Republican-held seat, given that this could take the most expensive state to defend entirely off the map," Holmes said. "This is a massive win for Florida, America and the Grand Old Party." The decision to continue his career in elective politics comes barely three months after Rubio, 45, ended his presidential campaign after an embarrassing loss in his home-state primary, finishing nearly 20 points behind Donald Trump and winning only one county outright — his home base of Miami-Dade. But the handful of candidates seeking to succeed him in the Senate each struggled to break out as Rubio sent a series of signals that he might be willing to seek reelection." Marco Rubio is trying to stamp out criticism from other presidential candidates about his slick, zip-up boots by saying he's giving American business a leg up. Rubio's ankle boots became the subject of Internet scrutiny after he was photographed wearing them in New Hampshire on Jan. 3, 2016. Pundits and fashion columnists commented on them ad nauseam. Rubio drew fire from his GOP rivals for being perhaps a bit too chic for the campaign trail. Some speculated they were to make the 5-foot-10 senator appear taller. Kentucky Sen. Rand Paul called the boots "cute" and former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush's Right to Rise super PAC made a commercial mocking them. While Rubio initially called the focus on his footwear "craziness," he's worked at thinking on his feet. At a Jan. 18 campaign event in Waverly, Iowa, a voter jokingly asked about the boots. Rubio declared his boots, appropriately outfitted with a Cuban heel, are a patriotic choice. "They sold out of those boots online," Rubio said. "They're made in Wisconsin. Florsheim! You know what that means? That means I did more for American business in one week than Barack Obama did in seven years!" He's right that Florsheim's website says some sizes of their \$135 Duke boots are out of stock, but they should be available by Feb. 1. A Florsheim spokesman told us sales of

that style have "increased significantly" since Rubio was shown wearing them. As for the part about being made in Wisconsin, well, Rubio probably should have watched his step. Like all of the Glendale, Wis., company's shoes, Rubio's boots aren't made in the United States. The company did recently collaborate with designer George Esquivel to create a luxury shoe line that is made in California, but Florsheim said their products are made in Asia, mostly from China." Though the race drew only a few hundred voters, Rubio's gift for forging connections paid off. Rebeca Sosa, then the commission chair, was tending flowers in her front lawn on a spring day in 1998 when the candidate walked up to introduce himself. "I couldn't believe how young he looked. I said, 'You're too young. Why would you run?'" Sosa says. "But he started talking about everything he learned from his grandfather, and I was just blown away." The next week, Rubio began knocking on every door in West Miami. His opponent, incumbent Tania Rozio, was a community activist. She couldn't believe this 26-year-old kid had the backing of Sosa and a bigleague manager like Lorenzo. "I'm not a politician, and I never have been. He was 20-something, and he was already a professional politician," Rozio says. "It was no contest." On election night, Rubio and the other commissioners gathered at West Miami's small city hall, a squat building tucked behind Tropical Supermarket on Calle Ocho. A half-hour after Rubio won by a convincing 744 to 244, the phone rang. "It was Jeb Bush himself, calling to congratulate Marco for winning our little race," recalls Enrique Gonzalez, who also won a seat that year. "He was the anointed golden child, even then."" It's a question his campaign can't seem to escape, especially since Rubio's rivals have targeted it relentlessly. Sen. Rick Santorum made headlines last week not for endorsing Rubio upon his departure from the race, something he did do, but for being unable to name a single one of Rubio's accomplishments. During Saturday night's debate, the senator was asked to explain his record, which offered Gov. Chris Christie the opportunity to slam it as nonexistent. This morning, at a small, employer-sponsored town hall at BAE Systems in Nashua, an employee asked Rubio to name "the single accomplishment of which you're most proud of and the leadership that you employed achieving it." Rubio answered with no less than seven specific bills, taking military contractors on a meandering review of nearly every elected office he's held in the last two decades. "As part of the debate the other night, there was a big discussion about eminent domain and Governor Bush referred to what we did in Florida to protect against eminent domain abuse," he said. "That was my law. I wrote...we helped craft that law from a committee that I chaired, we passed it into the law of Florida. I was the one that placed it on the ballot." ("Governor Bush always appreciated when State Representative Rubio supported his agenda," a Bush spokesman told MSNBC.) Rubio also touted curriculum reform in Florida -- another thing Bush has touted before -- and said that when he became House Speaker in the state legislature, he'd written a book of 100 legislative goals, more than half of which are now law or policy. PolitiFact found this claim to be just half true way back in 2010. About a third of his 100 legislative goals were enacted or partially enacted into law, far less than the more than half he touted today. As for the Senate achievements he was asked about, Rubio offered up his stock answer: sanctions on Hezbollah and Venezuela, the Veterans Affairs Accountability Act, defunding the Obamacare bailout fund, the Girls Count Act. "The clerk will stop reading until Representative Sands takes his seat," Rubio intones icily. Through months of partisan bickering, the speaker had never cracked. But that day, his caffeinated drive melted into anger and frustration. "He just exploded," recalls Dan Gelber, then the House minority leader and now a candidate for state attorney general. "He was angry, very angry, and it was worse because he knew he'd lost his cool." The cause of Rubio's outburst on April 18, 2008, was a procedural trick by Democrats, who forced Republicans to read every word of every bill aloud before a vote. The speaker, in turn, locked the chamber doors and ordered security guards to force every representative into his or her seat. He forbade bathroom breaks and turned off the chamber's Internet access. There was just a month left in Rubio's last legislative session, and his anger was the culmination of two years that began with great promise but devolved — thanks in part to his mismanagement and refusal to compromise — into a tenure critics said fell short of expectations. "I'm fond of Marco personally," Gelber says. "But throughout his term, he told the public what they wanted to hear instead of trying to actually address the complex challenges we faced as a state."" Gelber, the Democrat, puts it this way: "Marco, unlike Jeb, is not afraid of a collaborative process. He understands the notion of achieving what you can." In this respect, a Rubio presidency might prove to be a close managerial cousin of the administration of George W. Bush, who was famously comfortable delegating. Where opinion splits is on whether Rubio's tendency toward delegation is a virtue or a problem. While Byrd (a supporter) praises Rubio as "a good listener" who "makes everybody have a part in what's going to happen," Fasano (a Jeb backer) looks at the same instincts and says, "When confronted with an issue, with a problem, he pretty much would throw it in the laps of his staff and want to take the road of noncontroversy. But Santorum struggled to name one accomplishment Rubio has had in the Senate. "He's been in the Senate for four years," Scarborough noted. "Can you name his top accomplishment in the Senate ---actually working in the Senate doing something that tilted your decision to Marco Rubio?" "If you look at being in the minority in the United States Senate in a year when nothing got — four years where nothing got done, I guess it's hard to say there are accomplishments," Santorum said. "I mean, tell me what happened during that four years that was an accomplishment for anybody? It was complete gridlock." Scarborough shot back that Republicans have been in the majority for the past two years and asked what Rubio has accomplished there since being part of the majority. "Joe, look, the Republicans have been in the majority for one year and one month, of which, as you know, he was running for president primarily," Santorum said. "The first four years he was in the minority, and nothing got done. And by the way, what happened this year under the Republicans?" Scarborough insisted he wasn't defending Congress or being difficult in his questioning. "I'm just asking you to name one accomplishment that Marco Rubio ----" Scarborough said as Santorum tried to interrupt. "But list one accomplishment. Just one. Just one that Marco achieved. Maybe a bill that he wrote. Maybe a moment in a committee." Brzezinski then jumped in to make it easier on Santorum, offering a fill-in-the-blank question. "Jeb Bush ran Florida. Donald Trump built a company," she began. "Marco Rubio... - finish the sentence." "OK, Marco Rubio was, No. 1, the speaker of the Florida House, which is not something that's a minor deal," Santorum answered. "I mean, he was elected by his colleagues to be the speaker of the House. No. 2, yeah, he spent four years in the United States Senate being frustrated like everybody else that nothing got done, and then you can't point to him and say well nothing got done and therefore he has no accomplishments." The veterans measure was slipped into a larger bill that passed Congress in 2014; the Hezbollah sanctions bill and human trafficking measure each passed with no opposition in the Senate. And his role in pushing to kill the Obamacare provision, which let the government provide a key backstop for insurance companies, has been the subject of sharp dispute. On the campaign trail, Rubio takes credit for legislation that was included in a 2015 spending bill gutting the so-called risk corridors provision. While Rubio was on the forefront calling for changes to the provision in the past, it was ultimately other GOP negotiators who slipped the measure into the spending bill – not Rubio himself. Asked by CNN Thursday how he could take credit for that, Rubio said, "I led the effort to put that in. I was the first one to bring it up. I was the one who pushed forward for two and a half years. ... Did I type it on my computer? No. But did I actually get it done? Absolutely." (CNN, 2/4/16)

In 2022, Politifact Concluded That Claiming Rubio Had "One Of The Worst Attendance Records In The Senate" Was A "Mostly True" Statement – With Rubio Having Missed More Than 9 Percent Of Roll Call Votes Throughout His Career

In 2022, Politifact Concluded That Claiming Rubio Had "One Of The Worst Attendance Records In The Senate" Was A "Mostly True" Statement - With Rubio Having Missed More Than 9 Percent Of Roll Call Votes Throughout His Career. "Since taking office in 2011, Rubio has missed 346, or 9.2%, of 3,744 roll call votes, according to GovTrack, a nonpartisan website that collects congressional data. On average, members of the Senate miss around 2.3% of votes during their tenure. Most of Rubio's career absences occurred during his bid for the Republican presidential nomination in 2016. From April 2015 through March 2016, Rubio missed 129 votes. That's not unusual for a presidential candidate. For example, former President Barack Obama missed 314, or about 24%, of 1,300 roll call votes in his three-year Senate career. Independent Sen. Bernie Sanders of Vermont and Republican Sen. Ted Cruz of Texas, who both vied for the White House, have worse attendance than Rubio. Sanders has missed more than 14% of votes since 2007; Cruz missed 9.4% since he joined the Senate in 2013. Still, Rubio's attendance record did not immediately improve after his presidential campaign. According to ProPublica, in the 115th Congress, which ran from January 2017 to 2018, Rubio was the eighth most absent member in the Senate, out of 99 senators. (There was one vacancy.) In 2020, Rubio ranked 12th most absent among senators who have served more than 10 years. When looking at the current 117th Congress, however, Rubio's attendance has improved. The 117th Congress began in 2021 and goes through January 2023. So far, he's missed 41 votes, making him the 27th most absent member of the Senate. He cited "travel difficulties" for three absences, per ProPublica. It's also worth noting that none of the votes Rubio missed in the 117th Congress had a specific impact on Florida. The most absent member of the Senate recently is Republican Sen. Mike Rounds of South Dakota. So far, Rounds missed more than 25% of votes. Rubio's campaign did not answer specific questions about his record. Instead, a spokesperson pointed to a list of his achievements in the Senate, including coauthoring the Paycheck Protection Program, or PPP. Demings said Rubio has "one of the worst attendance records in the Senate. "Looking at the percentage of roll call votes Rubio missed throughout his decade as a senator, the statement is accurate. Overall, Rubio missed more than 9% of votes since 2011 — well above the average of 2.3% among members of the Senate. One of the reasons for this is his unsuccessful run for the presidency in 2016. Rubio's attendance record in the 117th Congress is a bit better. So far, he has missed 41 votes, making him the 27th most absent member of the Senate. We rate Demings' claim Mostly True." Of 1,198 total votes, Rubio has missed 99, or 8.3 percent, since taking office in January 2011. "He is one of the only senators with young children who has not moved his family to D.C., and tries to spend as much time in Florida with them as possible," Rubio spokesman Alex Conant told POLITICO. "In addition to his parental responsibilities, in recent years he's also had to return to Florida and miss votes due to his mother's health and civic responsibilities like jury duty." On Rubio's voting record over the last few years, Conant said there will be no doubt where the Florida senator stands as he travels around the country talking to potential voters for a possible presidential run. "Senator Rubio has not made a final decision about 2016, but he's seriously considering running for president and taking the necessary steps to prepare a competitive campaign," he said. Convers, who is currently the longest-serving member in either chamber, has missed 16.3 percent of 27,195 votes since January 1965. Republicans make up nine of the 10 spots on Vocativ's Senate list, with Hawaii Democrat Brian Schatz missing the thirdmost votes after his appointment to the seat following the death of Sen. Daniel Inouve in December 2012. He was subsequently reelected last November. Other names on top 10 list include Jerry Moran (R-Kan.), John Boozman (R-Ark.), Ted Cruz (R-Texas), David Vitter (R-La.), Lisa Murkowski (R-Alaska), Lindsey Graham (R-S.C.), Jim Inhofe (R-Okla.) and Roy Blunt (R-Mo.)." Rubio said in a statement that an investigation concluded his chief of staff Clint Reed engaged in behavior that "in my judgement amounted to threats to withhold employment benefits." Rubio announced the decision to fire Reed just before midnight on Saturday. The Florida Republican said he became aware "for the first time" on Friday "of allegations of improper conduct by my Chief of Staff while under the employment of my office." Rubio said the allegations were reported directly to him and that he then immediately began an investigation with his general counsel. "By early this afternoon, I had sufficient evidence to conclude that while employed by this office, my Chief of Staff had violated office policies regarding proper relations between a supervisor and their subordinates," Rubio said. Rubio said he traveled from Florida to Washington on Saturday night to terminate Reed's employment effective immediately. His office has also "taken steps to ensure that those impacted by this conduct have access to any services they may require now or in the future," he said." (Politico, 1/28/18)

It says that Mario and Oriales Rubio "came to America following Fidel Castro's takeover." And the 40-year-old senator with the boyish smile and promking good looks has drawn on the power of that claim to entrance audiences captivated by the rhetorical skills of one of the more dynamic stump speakers in modern American politics. The real story of his parents' migration appears to be a more conventional immigrant narrative, a couple who came to the United States seeking a better life. In the year they arrived in Florida, the future Marxist dictator was in Mexico plotting a quixotic return to Cuba. Rubio's office confirmed Thursday that his parents arrived in the United States in 1956 but noted that "while they were prepared to live here permanently, they always held out the hope and the option of returning to Cuba if things improved." Rubio's Recounting Of His Family's Background Has Shifted Overtime; Documents **Indicate A More Conventional Immigration Story Due To Economic And Not Political Reasons.** "When Rubio's parents left the island, Cuban migration to the United States was a trickle compared with what it would become in the years after Castro's victory. "The vast majority of people who emigrated in the '50s went for economic reasons, not for political reasons," said Maria Cristina Garcia, an expert on Cuban migration at Cornell University. Multiple documents signed by Rubio's parents, including their petitions for naturalization, show that Mario and Oriales Rubio arrived in the United States on May 27, 1956, with their son Mario, 6. Maternal grandfather Pedro Victor Garcia also came to the United States around the same time. Marco Rubio has said that his father left Cuba after enduring hardships, including the loss of his mother when he was young. Rubio has described the death in moving terms, although details have changed in his accounts. In February 2010, during Rubio's electric speech to the Conservative Political Action Conference in Washington, he said that his grandmother died when his father was 6 and that "the day after her funeral, he went to work selling coffee in the streets of Havana." Seven months later, when his father died in the midst of Rubio's Senate campaign, Rubio wrote in an open letter that his father lost his mother when he was "just days shy of his ninth birthday." But to call into question the central and defining event of my parents' young lives – the fact that a brutal communist dictator took control of their homeland and they were never able to return - is something I will not tolerate. My understanding of my parents' journey has always been based on what they told me about events that took place more than 50 years ago — more than a decade before I was born. What they described was not a timeline, or specific dates. They talked about their desire to find a better life, and the pain of being separated from the nation of their birth. What they described was the struggle they faced growing up, and their obsession with giving

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their children the chance to do the things they never could. But the Post story misses the point completely. The real essence of my family's story is not about the date my parents first entered the United States. Or whether they traveled back and forth between the two nations. Or even the date they left Fidel Castro's Cuba forever and permanently settled here. The essence of my family story is why they came to America in the first place; and why they had to stay. I now know that they entered the U.S. legally on an immigration visa in May of 1956. Not, as some have said before, as part of some special privilege reserved only for Cubans. They came because they wanted to achieve things they could not achieve in their native land. And they stayed because, after January 1959, the Cuba they knew disappeared. They wanted to go back — and in fact they did. Like many Cubans, they initially held out hope that Castro's revolution would bring about positive change. So after 1959, they traveled back several times — to assess the prospect of returning home. In February 1961, my mother took my older siblings to Cuba with the intention of moving back. My father was wrapping up family matters in Miami and was set to join them. But after just a few weeks, it became clear that the change happening in Cuba was not for the better. It was communism. So in late March 1961, just weeks before the Bay of Pigs invasion, my mother and siblings left Cuba and my family settled permanently in the United States. Soon after, Castro officially declared Cuba a Marxist state. My family has never been able to return. I am the son of immigrants and exiles, raised by people who know all too well that you can lose your country. By people who know firsthand that America is a very special place. My father spent the last 50 years of his life separated from the nation of his birth. Separated from his two brothers, who died in Cuba in the 1980s. Unable to show us where he played baseball as a boy. Where he met my mother. Unable to visit his parents' grave. My mother has spent the last 50 years separated from her native land as well. Unable to take us to her family's farm, to her schools or to the notary office where she married my father. A few years ago, using Google Earth, I attempted to take my parents back to Cuba. We found the rooftop of the house where my father was born. What I wouldn't give to visit these places where my story really began, before I was born. One day, when Cuba is free, I will. But I wish I could have done it with my parents. The Post story misses the entire point about my family and why their story is relevant. Among others things, they voted for me because, as the son of immigrants, I know how special America really is. As the son of exiles, I know how much it hurts to lose your country. "Marco Rubio's grandfather was a man without a country. Pedro Victor Garcia had left behind a home and a job with the government in communist Cuba, intent on never returning. But after his flight, Pan Am 2422 from Havana, touched down in Miami on Aug. 31, 1962, immigration officials stopped him. It had been almost three years since he had last set foot in the United States, and he no longer had the proper credentials to enter. They told him he could stay for the time being, but if he wanted to avoid deportation, he would have to plead his case. "I always thought of being here in the United States as a resident, living permanently here," the slight 62-year-old grandfather, speaking through an interpreter, said at a hearing five weeks later. He said that he had previously returned to Cuba because he did not want to be a burden on his family in the United States, but that the Cuban government had grown too oppressive and he feared what might happen if he stayed. The immigration officer was unmoved. He did not see an exiled family man — just someone who had no visa, worked for the Castro government and could pose a security risk. "It is ordered that the applicant be excluded and deported from the United States," he said matter-offactly, according to an audio recording of the proceedings stored by the National Archives. He stopped to ask if Mr. Garcia understood. "Yes, I do," Mr. Garcia said plaintively. That easily could have been the end of his American story. But someone in the immigration office on Biscayne Boulevard that day — the paperwork does not make clear exactly who or why — had a change of heart. He is in an immigration catch-22 — unable to get an immigrant visa because the U.S. consulate in Havana is closed and unable to enter the United States legally because he doesn't have a visa. "The applicant is subject to exclusion . . . as an immigrant not in possession of a valid, unexpired immigrant visa." At that point, Pedro Victor is officially an undocumented immigrant, a man standing on American soil without permission to be there. Then comes the crushing blow. The Rubios touched down at Miami International Airport in a National Airlines jet six months before Castro set sail for Cuba in a leaky yacht called the Granma. Pedro Victor, Oriales's father, followed a few months later. The years between Pedro Victor's arrival on U.S. soil and Castro's victory were not easy on him or his pride. He went to New York, where he found little more than odd jobs, then made his way to Florida where steady work also eluded him. He repaired shoes at his home and sometimes picked up a few extra dollars as a money collector in a parking lot. He was 60 years old and dependent on his daughters. But in Cuba, Pedro Victor thought, he could be his own man. So two years and two months after being admitted to the United States as a legal immigrant, Pedro Víctor reacheda difficult conclusion. "I had to go back to Cuba to work there because I did not want to be supported by my daughters, my sons-in-law," he later explained. On January 15, 1959, two weeks after Batista abdicated, Pedro Victor flew back to the island of his birth. For the first three months he operated a small shoe store he owned, but in March he started selling off all his stock and materials. One of his daughters' husbands offered a better option: he could get Pedro Victor a real job, a job with a salary, vacation time, reliability. Pedro Victor decided to take it. His new employer was the Castro government. The job was with Cuba's Treasury ministry. Pedro Victor later described what sounds like a low-level bureaucratic or blue-collar position. He would say that he was tasked with recording payments owed to the Treasury by bus and truck drivers. Castro's government was beginning to insinuate itself into all aspects of daily life. In 1960, it unveiled the Urban Reform Law, under which the government seized rental properties throughout the country. The law was part of a series of sweeping moves designed to impose a socialist economic structure on the nation. creeping oppression of the government made him desperate to get out. "They're watching you every day, and they want to know if you're trying to go out of the country, if you want to come to the United States." He says at the hearing that what made him decide he wanted to leave for the United States to join his wife and seven daughters, one of whom was Oria, Mr. Rubio's now 85-year-old mother, was when Castro confirmed suspicions that he was a Marxist. Prosecutors believed that a member of Tabraue's crew had killed Larry Nash, an undercover informant for what was then the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, in 1980 and disposed of his body by dismembering it with a circular saw and burning it in a horse trough filled with charcoal. Nash's body was never found; a jury later decided that Tabraue had committed an act of racketeering by helping to dispose of the informant's corpse. What began as a marijuanaimport operation in the late 1970s had blossomed into the far more lucrative business of distributing kilos of cocaine smuggled into South Florida from Colombia. During operation from 1976 to 1986, the ring moved half-a-million pounds of marijuana and 200 pounds of cocaine worth an estimated \$75 million. "It was a very large operation," said Delbert Woodburn, a Miami-Dade narcotics detective who investigated Tabraue in the late 1970s and early 1980s. "Republican presidential contender Mike Huckabee's calm demeanor and staunch anti-abortion stance were just a few of the reasons he picked up House Speaker Marco Rubio's endorsement, the West Miami Republican said Wednesday after a speech at The Breakers hotel in Palm Beach. Huckabee's embrace of a national retail sales tax has riled some conservatives and business groups, but only added to his appeal to Rubio, who described the former Arkansas governor as a visionary willing to swim against the political tide. "I like the concept. I think there has to be deeper discussion about how it's applied," Rubio said of Huckabee's tax stance. Huckabee supports the so-called "FairTax," a type of national retail sales tax that he claims would abolish the Internal Revenue Service and federal income and payroll taxes. The plan would essentially replace the federal tax code with a national tax on consumption. It's a retail tax much like what most states already have in place. "The notion that a consumption tax is fairer than an income tax or a property tax is something that I believe," said Rubio, who last year pushed unsuccessfully for the Legislature to abolish all state property taxes in lieu of a major hike in sales taxes. Rubio said he personally met several times with each of the leading Republican presidential contenders but consistently felt the most aligned with the former Arkansas governor. "He's the most conservative candidate in the race, and he gives Reagan Republicans like myself the best chance to win the nomination," Rubio said. "Obviously, I don't have anything against any of the candidates. I admire something about all of them. But to me, he's the one that I feel the most comfortable with on the social issues, as well as on the fiscal and other issues." Rubio's endorsement, which was announced formally in Miami on Monday, is seen as key to helping Huckabee woo Florida Hispanic and conservative voters. Rubio, a conservative Republican, is the state's first Cuban-American House speaker." (Sun Sentinel, 12/12/07)

Sales Tax – Increase (Property Tax Swap)

Rubio's courting of business is a sharp departure from last year, when most of this powerful lobby first learned about his dramatic tax-swap idea by skimming through his book, 100 Innovative Ideas for Florida's Future. Idea 96 was his plan to abolish property taxes on primary residences in exchange for a 2.5 percent increase in the state's 6 percent sales tax, making Florida's the highest statewide rate in the nation. Businesses howled, warning the high sales tax would devastate their bottom line while doing nothing to cut property taxes. The idea eventually failed in the Legislature. The speaker, though, still would like to see property taxes go away. "There is no way to fairly and affordably tax home ownership. There's no way to do it," Rubio, R-West Miami, said last week. But he also is a realist. He has staked his still-unclear political future on passage of a proposed constitutional amendment creating a new homestead superexemption and needs the campaign dollars of business groups to rally public support behind it on Jan. 29. Both sides last week appeared ready to deal. Businesses generally shrug at a bigger homestead exemption, since there's nothing in it for them. But they do want to play nice with Rubio, who can help them next year in passing legislation to ease property taxes on businesses. They already have a menu of ideas. "There's so much more to do," Rubio echoed last week. Gov. Charlie Crist and Rubio are often at odds — over gambling, property insurance, even Seminoles versus Gators. But Crist, too, is courting businesses in his own bid to pump up prospects for the January amendment." (Orlando Sentinel, 9/23/07)

<u>Overall – General Criticisms Of Entitlement Programs</u>

In A 2011 Speech At The Reagan Presidential Library, Rubio Argued Entitlement Programs Such As Social Security And Medicare Have "Weakened Us As A People." "Murphy was referring to a speech Rubio gave at the Ronald Reagan presidential library in 2011. The quote is accurate, but it did not come in a speech arguing for such drastic reforms to Social Security and Medicare as Murphy described. During his speech, Rubio said Democrats and Republicans created programs and levels of spending that -- while well intentioned -- were doomed to fail from the start. "These programs actually weakened us as a people. You see, almost in forever, it was institutions and society that assumed the role of taking care of one another. If someone was sick in your family, you took care of them. If a neighbor met misfortune, you took care of them. You saved for your retirement and your future because you had to." "We took these things upon ourselves and our communities and our families and our homes and our churches and our synagogues. But all that changed when the government began to assume those responsibilities. All of the sudden, for an increasing number of people in our nation, it was no longer necessary to worry about saving for security because that was the government's job. ... "The other thing is that we built a government and its programs without any account whatsoever for how we were going to pay for it. There was not thought given into how this was going to be sustained." A Rubio spokesman pointed us to the section in which Rubio said the programs didn't take into account future costs. But Rubio did say that such programs "weakened" Americans. Rubio has long called for reforming Social Security and Medicare. In Florida, about 21 percent of Florida's population -- about 3.9 million people -- receive Social Security benefits. About 4 million Floridians use Medicare for health insurance. The programs face long-term financing shortfalls, leading program trustees and federal budget experts to call for action by Congress. Rubio has said that he favors raising the retirement age for people such as himself in their 40s but not for current retirees or those who will retire soon." (PolitiFact, 10/27/16)



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

In 2015, Dynamic Scoring Of Rubio's Tax Plan, Taking Economic Growth Into Account, Indicated That Rubio Would Need To Cut \$2.4 Trillion In Government Spending For It To Be Revenue Neutral; Rubio Noted He Would Reform Medicare And Social Security To Actually Address The Debt Through His Plan. "Even under dynamic scoring – thus taking into account economic growth it spurs – Trump's would cost \$10.1 trillion, Jindal's \$9 trillion, Rubio's \$2.4 trillion, Bush's \$1.6 trillion, Santorum's \$1.1 trillion and Paul's less than \$1 trillion, according to Tax Foundation analyses. The Tax Foundation also went forward 35 years to show the impact the Rubio plan would have on the national debt. In the long run, the plan raises revenue, it said. But unless the tax cuts are offset elsewhere in the budget, the proposal would increase the debt in the first eight years – and the "cumulative effect . . . would be significant," it wrote in a March report. Bernstein of the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities is more blunt: "The only way to absorb such large revenue losses without incurring significant new debt – debt that would take us way over the ceiling – is to cut spending by the same amount. And that's simply implausible. I certainly haven't heard any cuts of that magnitude – or any magnitude - specified by Rubio." Because of the impact of initial deficits and the extra interest costs they produce, the proposal as offered by Rubio and Lee in March would only return the national debt to its current levels in the year 2040, according to the Tax Foundation analysis. Since introducing the tax plan in March, Rubio has said he plans to attack the broader debt issue by doing two things: Cutting taxes to boost the economy and holding the line on spending. He says that the country needs to change Social Security and Medicare, ensuring that they are protected for the current recipients but acknowledging that the programs will be different for younger generations. On Social Security, for example, he has a list of policy proposals. Some of those would reduce costs, such as one to gradually increase the Social Security retirement age. But the actual cost to the budget or to individual Americans hasn't been specified. Asked whether his tax plan would result in the debt ceiling needing to be raised, campaign spokeswoman Brooke Sammon said Rubio doesn't think it will need to be." (McClatchy, 10/16/15)

While the analyses show how much could be lost in tax revenue, they do not show what budget cuts candidates also say they plan to make to avoid adding to the national debt.

Medicare Reform – Support (Ryan Medicare Proposal And Ryan Budgets)

In 2011, Rubio Noted His Support For The Ryan Medicare Reform Proposal Stating "Rep. Paul Ryan Has Offered A Plan That Would Make No Changes Whatsoever For Anyone Age 55 And Older. I Support It Because, Right Now, It Is The Only Plan Out There That Helps Save Medicare." "For me, Medicare is not a political talking point. My parents immigrated to the United States in the late 1950s. They worked hard for over 40 years to provide their children the chance to do all the things they themselves could not. But they never made much money. As a result, they retired with precious little in savings. Medicare was and is the only way they could access healthcare. When my father got sick, Medicare paid for his numerous hospital stays. And as he reached the end of life, Medicare allowed him to die with dignity by paying for his hospice care. Like most 80-year-olds, my mother has several age-related ailments. Without the access to quality healthcare that Medicare pays for, I cannot imagine what life would be like for her. America needs Medicare. We need it to continue without any benefit reductions for those like my mother currently in the system. And we need it to survive for my generation and my children's generation. But Medicare is going bankrupt. Anyone who says it is not is simply lying. And anyone who is in favor of doing nothing to deal with this fact is in favor of bankrupting it. Medicare will go broke in as little as nine years. No one likes this news, but it is the undeniable truth. And the sooner we begin to deal with it, the better off we are all going to be. My goals are simple. First, I will not support any plan that changes Medicare for people like

my mother who are currently on the plan. We cannot ask seniors to go out and get a job to pay for their healthcare. Second, any solution must solve the problem. We need to save Medicare, not simply delay its bankruptcy. And third, any solution cannot hurt economic growth. At a time of high unemployment, Americans cannot afford to pay more taxes. I will support any serious plan that accomplishes these three things. It does not matter to me if it comes from a Democrat or a Republican. Saving Medicare is more important than partisan politics. Rep. Paul Ryan has offered a plan that would make no changes whatsoever for anyone age 55 and older. I support it because, right now, it is the only plan out there that helps save Medicare. In 2011, Ryan Proposed Implementing A Medicare Premium Support Plan, Oftentimes Described A Privatized Voucher System For Medicare. "If implemented, the government would no longer pay doctors to treat Medicare beneficiaries. Instead, beneficiaries would buy their own private insurance plans, and the government would give people money to pay to buy health plans from an approved list. Everyone over 55 would be grandfathered into the current Medicare system. So if you're of Medicare age right now, nothing would change if Ryan's 2011 plan became law tomorrow. That's the crux of what Ryan proposed in 2011-and it was his 2011 plan that Ryan stamped as the signature policy proposal of his time in Congress. It signified the boldest change in his 2011 "Path to Prosperity" budget outline, and Ryan promoted it and defended it relentlessly against critics, including the president. Since then, Ryan and Wyden made major revisions, including a provision like Democrats' "public option," where seniors could opt out of Ryan's most basic change altogether, enrolling in Medicare as a fee-for-service program that would continue to pay directly for care. The Ryan-Wyden plan of December 2011, the basis for what Ryan included in his 2012 budget plan, differs widely in key areas from the spring-2011 iteration of Ryan's plan-the version for which he became known. Critics have called Ryan's 2011 proposal the "end of Medicare as we know it," and that's true. Until now, Medicare has operated as a "fee-for-service" system; under Ryan's plan, it would operate more like a voucher system, although Ryan and his aides have resisted this term. Medicare would cease to pay for health services directly, instead operating as a board that approves a menu of health plans for public sale and doles out predetermined lumps of money to people enrolled in Medicare, to help them buy those plans." Social Security Reform – Support (Privatization And Retirement Age Increase)

In 2010, Rubio Called For Increasing The Retirement Age For Social Security And Allowing For Partial Privatization Of The System. "MARCO RUBIO (R-FL), NOMINEE FOR U.S. SENATE: I do think that the retirement age issue is going to have to be confronted at some point as part of a measure to reform Social Security. The other is giving people the option of taking some of their Social Security money, at least a portion thereof, and investing in an alternative to the Social Security system itself. UNIDENTIFIED MALE: But you've had people that, you know, have made terrible mistakes and lost everything in their 401(k). Wouldn't they do the same thing with Social Security? RUBIO: Potentially. But it's their money." (NBC News, 10/1/10)

In 2010, Rubio Acknowledged Increasing The Retirement Age As A Potential Measure To Rescue Social Security. "Which leads to Job One: To get spending under control in Washington, Mr. Rubio would support a constitutional amendment to balance the budget, something Florida already has in place. "I don't care whether Republicans or Democrats are in charge," he says. "If you allow politicians to spend money, they'll do it." He also favors freezing discretionary spending. It's a crude device and ducks the hard work of setting priorities, but "some level of discretionary spending freeze" sends "a powerful signal to our economy and the world that America is serious." Entitlement reform is next. "I know . . . people don't like to talk about it," but Mr. Rubio says the country has to look at changing the Social Security system for people who are 10 or more years away from retirement age. "Privatization of the accounts has come and gone," he says. "There are other alternatives, such as [raising] the retirement age, how you adjust payments in the future, 'need' measures, et cetera." Part and parcel is authoring a new tax code "that creates a competitive environment in America." This means lowering rates on capital gains and reducing the corporate tax rate from 35% to at most 25%, which Mr. Rubio notes is the European average. "Even the president admitted the corporate tax rate is too high," he says. What Mr. Rubio is talking about is an economic confidence agenda to convince Americans and the world that this country isn't incapable of dealing with its debts except through inflation and job-killing tax hikes. "The bottom line," he says, "is that jobs in America are created by people who . . . decide to start a business or expand an existing business." They will do so only if allowed to keep what they earn and don't have a "big target on their back for the government to come after them for higher taxes."" (The Wall Street Journal, 3/13/10)

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Child Tax Credit – Expansion

In 2015, Rubio Proposed A Dramatic Expansion Of The Child Tax Credit Estimated To Cost \$1.7 Trillion Over Ten Years. "Rubio's tax plan includes creating a new, partially refundable child tax credit of up to \$2,500 per child. It is meant to offset income and payroll taxes and is considerably larger than the \$1,000 credit that is currently available. Refundable tax credits help people at the lower end of the income scale, in that people who are too poor to pay any income tax can get money back from the government. Paul's campaign referred us to a March 2015 analysis by the nonpartisan Tax Foundation of a tax plan proposed in the Senate by Rubio and U.S. Sen. Mike Lee, R-Utah. That analysis estimated the credit would result in a loss of tax revenue of about \$170 billion per year. That's the equivalent of \$1.7 trillion over 10 years -- 10 years being a common time frame for federal budget planning. But it's worth noting that Paul didn't say 10 years in making his claim. We'll note that, unlike the original Rubio-Lee plan, Rubio as a candidate is proposing that the credit would be phased out at higher income levels -beginning at \$150,000 for an individual and \$300,000 for a family. That would mean the lost revenue would be something less than \$1.7 trillion over 10 years, but still well above \$1 trillion, said Kyle Pomerleau, director of federal projects at the Tax Foundation, a free market-oriented think tank. That's because relatively few people at the higher incomes have children and would be eligible for the tax credits, he told us. In other words, the tax credit is expensive, Pomerlau said, because "it's large and nearly universal for families." The Tax Policy Center, a joint venture of the Urban Institute and Brookings Institution, also did an estimate of the original tax credit proposal and came up with a figure similar to that of the Tax Foundation -- an estimated loss of nearly \$1.58 trillion in tax revenue over 10 years. Roberton Williams, a fellow at the Tax Policy Center, told us the center hasn't analyzed Rubio's current proposal. But he said a loss of \$1 trillion in tax revenue over 10 years is a fair estimate." "Mr. Rubio: Thank you Mr. President and members. We've had this important conversation this week about trade policy in the United States. It's a very important one. Clearly, I think one of the great things that will help us grow our economy in the years to come is further free trade. We have these pending free trade agreements, which mostly everyone I run into says they're in favor of, including the President. The one with South Korea, the one with Panama, the one with Colombia, there's been a prerequisite put in place by those in charge here in this chamber and that is that we deal with the TAA issues. And so that's why we're on this issue today. They have clearly been linked, the issue of free trade and the issue of this TAA law, so that's why we're on that today. And on that line, let me talk a little bit about the free trade agreements for a minute because we're continuing to wait for them to be sent down to us. These agreements would increase U.S. exports by billions of dollars and create jobs here in the United States and about, the numbers that are out there, exports are about \$12 billion annually, for example. Adding about \$14 billion to the U.S. economy. These are real numbers. The South Korea agreement alone, for example, is estimated could add as many as 70,000 American jobs. As I said earlier, these benefits are not being realized because the President has not yet submitted these for approval to this body or to the Congress. And so the debate we're having today is really not a new one. In fact, the Trade Adjustment Agreement, or TAA, has been a policy of the United States, for better or for worse, since the Trade Expansion Act of 1962. Interestingly, this policy was first actually proposed by Senator John F. Kennedy. When he introduced it and aptly titled it the Trade

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Adjustment Act. In fact, the initial goal was to respond to perceived effects of trade policies. In essence, you enter into a trade policy, like a free trade agreement, with another country. American workers may lose their job in the short term, but you create a fund to help them transition to what you hope will be the new jobs being created by free trade. As you create this new relationship with new countries and new economies, the effect of it, and quite frankly it has been the effect, is that while some jobs may be lost those jobs are replaced with new opportunities and new jobs. And in the process of that transition, between the job you once had and the job you hope to have here in the future as a product of free trade, you create this fund to help workers adjust from point a to point b. 

Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) – Support And Flip-Flop

In 2015, Rubio Strongly Backed The TPP Declaring It "Will Further Our Strategic Goals In Asia And Increase Prosperity At Home. It Will Advance Economic Liberty And Unleash Free-Market Forces In The World's Most Dynamic Region." "Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe's visit to the United States this week highlights the potential of a new age of peace and prosperity in Asia. Under his leadership, Japan is revising its defense policies to become a more robust contributor to security in East Asia, working with partners to ensure that territorial disputes are resolved through the rule of law, and attempting to finalize the Trans-Pacific Partnership trade pact. These goals are shared by the United States and should have our full support. This year marks the 70th anniversary of the end of World War II. From a starting point of bitter enemies dealing with the fallout from millions of deaths and immense destruction, the modern U.S.-Japan relationship has blossomed into one of America's strongest alliances in the world. Our alliance with Japan is key to a 21st-century Asia free and at peace. There are three pillars to an Asia policy for a new American century. The first is ensuring that we maintain U.S. and allied defense capabilities that can resist the coercion or domination of Asia by an increasingly assertive and belligerent China. The second is an Asian-Pacific economy governed by free-market principles. And the third is the settling of disputes based on the rule of law, not usurpation of land, military expansionism and conflict. The U.S.-Japan alliance is at the center of all three pillars. On defense, with revised U.S.-Japan defense guidelines and Prime Minister Abe's efforts to allow Japanese forces to participate in "collective self-defense" (coming to the aid of U.S. forces under fire, for example), Japan will be a more equal partner in our alliance. U.S and Japanese forces will work more closely together to build a ballistic-missile-defense system to protect us from threats posed by North Korea's rogue regime and other bad actors. We will also work together to closely monitor and respond to Chinese aggression in the South China Sea, where busy shipping lanes are vital to our security and prosperity. The U.S. will further work with Japan to help our partners in Southeast Asia defend their territorial waters. "Rubio has been hedging for months, saying in January that he would wait for a May report from the International Trade Commission. Then he bought more time. His new comments are the most clear sign yet of a shift. Rubio's Democratic U.S. Senate rival, Patrick Murphy, announced his opposition last October. Participation In A Union Strike

In His 2012 Memoir, Rubio Noted Having Participated In His Dad's Union Strike At Age 13. "In 1984, the Culinary Workers Union went on strike. I went with my father to the union hall. The strike became my new obsession. I never grasped all the issues involved, but understood generally that the strikers were just asking to be treated fairly. They had worked hard to help make the hotels profitable, and were entitled to better compensation and benefits. I was

excited to be part of the cause & join forces with striking workers from many hotels. At the height of the strike, it seemed all the kid at my school had a parent on the picket line. I became a committed union activist. I got to spend time with my father. I thought it was nothing but fun. My father was older than most of the strikers. Eventually, our small savings were gone & the union checks stopped coming. Not long after, he informed me he was going back to work. I accused him of selling out and called him a scab. Hurricane Sandy Aid – Oppose

In 2012, Rubio Voted Against The Larger Proposals For Hurricane Sandy Aid. "Hurrianne Sandy made landfall Oct. 29, 2012, and devastated portions of the East Coast, including New York and New Jersey. The path to passing a relief package was slower than after Hurricane Katrina hit Louisiana and Mississippi in 2005. Following Hurricane Sandy, President Barack Obama had just been elected to a second term and conservative Republicans elected in a tea party wave in 2010, and then in 2012, were looking for ways to curb spending. On Dec. 7, Obama requested \$60.4 billion in emergency appropriations. Three weeks later, the Democraticled Senate voted 62-32 to approve it, with Rubio voting against. Twelve Republicans joined the Democrats in voting for the bill. Republicans then countered with a stripped-down alternative of \$24 billion, which Rubio supported but which failed on a party-line vote. Rubio said he voted against the larger bill because it contained "unrelated pork." ("Pork" or "pork barrel" spending is government spending for localized projects secured primarily or solely for bringing money to political representatives' districts.) There was funding for many things in the \$60.4 billion package, including money for a declared fishery disaster in Alaska, Ellis said. But nearly everything had some relationship to a disaster — not only Sandy — although some were more tenuous than others. "The question is did it have to be funded in an emergency supplemental" meaning it would allow lawmakers to evade budget caps, Ellis said. "And the question for Sen. Rubio and every other senator, is how much is too much extra stuff and what is the alternative." Then-House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, sought to divide the relief funding. FEMA warned that it would run out of money in January if Congress didn't provide additional borrowing authority to pay claims. The first vote, a \$9.7 billion measure, passed the House on Jan. 4. DeSantis, a newly sworn-in congressman, was one of 67 House Republicans who voted against the bill. DeSantis said he sympathized with victims and that those with flood insurance should have their claims paid. But he said that "allowing the program to increase its debt by another \$9.7 billion with no plan to offset the spending with cuts elsewhere is not fiscally responsible." The funding passed the Senate in a voice vote, in which individual senators' votes are not recorded. Rubio spokesman Alex Conant told the Tampa Bay Times that Rubio supported it, calling it a "clean" appropriation. Obama signed the measure into law. The second part of the disaster relief, a bill for \$50.5 billion, passed the Senate Jan. 28, 2013, 62-36 largely along party lines. Rubio voted against the bill and DeSantis voted against the measure that passed in the House. Obama signed it into law." (Politifact, 9/30/22)

Additional Departures From Fiscal Conservatism – Taxes And Spending

During His Early Florida State Legislative Tenure, Rubio "Wasn't Particularly Passionate About Cutting Spending. In His First Three Years, He Supported Adding A \$4 Surcharge To Cruise Tickets To Fund A Marlins Stadium And A \$1.2 Million Earmark To Build New Bike Paths In His District." "Back then, he was hardly the scorching conservative who would later woo Tea Partiers nationwide. Before the year's session, he told the Herald he'd focus on supporting early education and community policing. And he wasn't particularly passionate about cutting spending. In his first three years, he supported adding a \$4 surcharge to cruise tickets to fund a Marlins stadium and a \$1.2 million earmark to build new bike paths in his district. "In his first years, Marco was not this red-meat, Tea Party, let's-abolish-the-government guy you're seeing on the trail now," Sen. Steve Geller says. While Serving In The Florida Legislature, Rubio Is Known To Have Requested Tens Of Millions Of Dollars In Earmarks With Rubio Requesting \$43 Million Worth In 2002 Alone. "Rubio served in the Florida House of Representatives from 2000-2008, the last two years as House speaker. During his U.S. Senate campaign, Rubio was criticized by independent candidate Gov. Charlie Crist for requesting millions of dollars in pork projects, which Crist said he had to veto. We've rated two specific claims when it comes to Rubio and earmarks before -- we called a claim that he supported \$800,000 to replace the turf at a field where he played flag football Half True and a claim that he tried to insert \$1.5 million into the budget for a rowing institute Pants on Fire! Florida's version of the earmark was something called a Community Budget Issue Request -- a budget request legislators made for local projects. Legislators had to file their request ahead of the budget planning process and attach their name to every request. The Legislature stopped the practice in 2009, the year after Rubio left office. In 2002, Rubio's third year, the Florida House requested \$1.5 billion in Community Budget Issue Requests, according to data kept by the state. To put that in perspective, the state budget that Gov. Jeb Bush signed that year totaled \$50 billion, and legislators had been warned of a tight budget. (They actually were summoned back to Tallahassee to slash \$1 billion from the budget in December 2001 to keep the state from going in the red.) Rubio's member budget requests for 2002 remain archived on a state website, which confirms Schale's statement. Rubio requested funding for 37 projects totalling \$43,697,787. "During Rubio's Eight Years In Office — Including The Final Two When He Was House Speaker — He Unofficially Helped Push Loads Of Hometown Spending: \$250 Million, According To A Times/Herald Analysis Of Little-Known Budget Documents." "Republican U.S. Senate front-runner Marco Rubio brags on his Web site that he didn't officially request budget pork in his last four years as a leader in the Florida House. But during Rubio's eight years in office — including the final two when he was House speaker — he unofficially helped push loads of hometown spending: \$250 million, according to a Times/Herald analysis of little-known budget documents. The budget items linked to Rubio from 2000 to 2008 are part of a list compiled yearly by the governor's office to track hometown spending. Most of Rubio's budget items benefited his home county of Miami-Dade — from a \$50,000 grant sought for a Coral Gables park to \$80 million for a University of Miami genomics project. A total of \$25 million in requests were vetoed by the governor. The amount of budget money connected to Rubio attests to his skill as a lawmaker but also contrasts with his campaign image as a tight-fisted spending hawk crusading against "earmarks" that have plagued the budget process in Washington. Rubio wouldn't comment and his campaign referred questions to consultant Albert Martinez, who worked in the House under Rubio. Martinez said Rubio tried to cut taxes and spending, not increase them. "Marco Rubio's a limited-government conservative," Martinez said. "He's not a no-government conservative." The budget items also shed light on times when Rubio's public job as a legislator dovetailed with his private interests. One appropriation for Miami-Dade County was sought by lobbyists who worked at his law firm. Another item aided a friend's fight for a Florida Turnpike contract. Other proposals gave big sums to Florida International University and Jackson Memorial Hospital, where Rubio later worked as a consultant. Martinez said the items linked to Rubio helped the whole county, and he described the spending for the hospital and university as necessary and non-controversial. Martinez said the items weren't "turkeys" — Tallahassee parlance for hometown spending lawmakers obtain for their districts, often with little scrutiny. The governor's office budget spreadsheets are nicknamed "turkey lists," but Martinez said Rubio's projects weren't turkeys as defined by the business group TaxWatch." (Tampa Bay *Times*. 11/9/10)

For Migrant Farmworkers, Rubio "Cosponsored Legislation That Would Have Allowed Workers To Sue Growers In State Court If They Were Cheated On Pay." "Early in his tenure, for instance, he set up a meeting with farmworkers to discuss their working conditions. He addressed a crowd of about 50 one night in the hall of a migrant-labor housing complex in Homestead, a farming community south of Miami; ultimately, he cosponsored legislation that would have allowed workers to sue growers in state court if they were cheated on pay. "The idea that any legislator, let alone a Republican, would reach out to farmworkers was unheard of. We were flabbergasted," says Greg Schell, managing attorney for the Migrant Farmworker Justice Project." (*National Journal*, 7/10/15)

Expiration Of Ethanol Mandate – Support

In 2015, "Republican Presidential Candidate Marco Rubio Says He Supports The So-Called Ethanol Mandate — Now That It's In Place, But He Favors Letting It Expire Seven Years From Now." "Republican presidential candidate Marco Rubio says he supports the socalled ethanol mandate — now that it's in place, but he favors letting it expire seven years from now. "The Renewable Fuels Standard is not something that I would have voted for had I been in the senate, but it is now existing law and I think it would be unfair to simply yank it away from people that have made investments based on its existence," Rubio says. "So my argument is we should allow it to continue until it expires and hopefully by then the industry will be able to sustain itself." The Renewable Fuels Standard is set to end in 2022. The Obama Administration has a November 30th deadline to release the federally-required ethanol production levels not only for 2016, but this year and last year, too, since previous deadlines were missed. Rubio has just wrapped up a five-day tour of the state. During a stop this week in Carroll, Rubio argued expanding overseas trade is important to rural America. Rubio, who is a senator from Florida, says the Trans Pacific Partnership could unlock consumer markets like Japan where some U.S. agricultural products aren't sold. "I've seen the impact that the South Korean deal has had on Florida citrus," Rubio says. "It's been very positive for Florida citrus growers and I would imagine that to open it up to all of the Asia-Pacific region to more export would be more profitable not just to them, but to all agriculture across the country." Rubio isn't commiting to voting for the trade agreement, though. "I support free trade," Rubio says. "I want to support a Trans Pacific Partnership. Whether this specific one they've negotiated is the right one for our country, we're in the process of reviewing that." Congress must vote to either ratify or reject the Trans Pacific Partnership. "Indeed, a major policy shift in Rubio's first six years (it probably cannot be called an accomplishment) was a tweak to the state's school financing formula that resulted in the shift of tens of millions of dollars annually from schools in South Florida—including Rubio's Miami-Dade County—to schools in North and Central Florida. As a future speaker, Rubio had considerable influence in this legislation, but he refused to go to the mat for his hometown schools. Democrats and even some South Florida Republicans attributed this to his needing speakership votes from North and Central Florida Republican members who argued that higher costs of living should not justify higher teacher salaries. Rubio defended his stance, arguing that he had an obligation to look out for the whole state, not just his region, and that, besides, South Florida schools had gotten the best deal they were going to get." The decision to close shop came after years of federal and state investigations into the company. "Given his previous wobbles on immigration, there's a broad consensus that political calculations will help drive Rubio's position on reform but no consensus about where. He has continued to toe the Tea Party line on everything else—opposing the fiscal-cliff deal, refusing to raise the debt ceiling, describing Obamacare as economic suicide—so perhaps immigration gives him a chance to prove he can work across the aisle, get something big done and help save his party. But he could also cement his status as a conservative stalwart by rejecting a deal, especially if he manages to dump the blame on Obama." (*Time*, 2/7/13)

Rubio Was Known To Be Relatively Moderate On Illegal Immigration Matters As A State Legislator But Flip-Flopped To Become A Hardliner During The 2010 Senate Campaign Including Opposing The Dream Act. "Rubio's journey on the issue has been complicated too. As a state legislator from the overwhelmingly Hispanic community of West Miami, he supported legislation that would allow undocumented students to qualify for in-state tuition. After being selected as house speaker in 2005, he scuttled several Republican efforts to crack down on undocumented immigrants. The obscure book he published laying out his agenda, 100 Innovative Ideas for Florida's Future, included three ideas for preventing identity theft and zero about immigration. But when he announced his underdog campaign for the Senate in 2010, Rubio became a hard-liner. He attacked then governor Charlie Crist's support for reform as Obamafriendly liberal amnesty and opposed the Dream Act, which would have given legal status to those sympathetic immigrants brought here as kids. He started out 30 points behind, with the GOP establishment lined up behind the moderate Crist. While immigration wasn't the big issue in the primary—Crist had embraced the Obama stimulus and even literally embraced Obama at a stimulus rally-it helped convince the party's base of older, exurban Tea Partyers that the hiphop-loving Cuban American was one of them. Crist was forced to quit the party to run as an independent. Rubio still buried him in the GOP midterm landslide and captured more than half the Hispanic vote." (Time, 2/7/13)

• During His 2010 U.S. Senate Campaign, Rubio Was Outspoken On His Opposition To Ever Supporting Amnesty For Illegal Immigrants. "Immigration reform was a hot topic in the 2010 Florida Senate race when Rubio ran against Charlie Crist, who ultimately ran as an independent, and Democrat Kendrick Meek. The conservative Shark Tank blogger, Javier Manjarres, asked Rubio in 2009: "Are you pro-amnesty for illegal immigration?" "No, no. Never have been. In fact, I'm strongly against amnesty for a number of different reasons. The first is, I always use the example of the speed limit. If you say the speed limit is 70, but you don't ticket people until they reach 80, well then the speed limit is really 80, it's not 70. Amnesty is the same thing. The most important thing we need to do is enforce our existing laws. We have existing immigration laws that

are not being adequately enforced. Nothing will make it harder to enforce your existing laws if you reward people who broke them." Rubio also said: "I will never support never have and never will support – any effort to grant blanket, legalization, amnesty to folks who have entered or stayed in this country illegally." In October 2009, Rubio said in an interview on WSRE in Pensacola: "You cannot grant amnesty. If you grant amnesty, you will send a message that all you have to do is come into America illegally, stay here long enough, and we will let you stay. No. 2, you will destroy any hopes you have of having a legal immigration system that works. If the American people see us grant amnesty, they will never again believe in legal immigration, they will never again support it. And that's wrong for our country, bad for our future." "In fact in '86 when Reagan created an amnesty program, about 3 million people were granted amnesty. The result was that you had a bunch of people standing in line to enter legally who all claimed to be illegal because it was easier to get through the amnesty program. So we can't have amnesty. "And I think if you have a guest worker program in place that functions, the illegal folks that are here now will go back home through attrition." In a Senate debate on Univision in September 2010, Rubio spoke against the DREAM Act, which Senate Democrats planned to debate the following week. Dreamers are young people brought to the United States illegally as children. "What they're offering now is a bill that would in essence grant amnesty to 2 million people," Rubio said. "It's a cynical way to play politics with the lives of real people . . . This is what always happens with Hispanic voters in this country, they manipulate them come election time." (The DREAM Act didn't pass. In 2012, President Barack Obama announced Deferred Status for Childhood Arrivals to give temporary status, without a path to citizenship.)" (Politifact, 1/29/16)

Romney ended up with a meager 27% of the Hispanic vote; had he matched Bush's 40% share, he might be President today. His thrashing persuaded many Republican elites that as long as they're perceived as unsympathetic obstacles to fixing a dysfunctional immigration system, the fastest-growing sector of the electorate won't listen to anything they say." "Rubio Co-Authored The Gang Of Eight Bill In 2013 That Included A Pathway To Citizenship." "While a senator, Rubio co-authored the Gang of Eight bill in 2013 that included a pathway to citizenship. Ahead of the release of the bill, Rubio said that the proposal "is not amnesty." Rubio argued that the legislation outlining a 13-year pathway to legal status and eventually citizenship is not amnesty. He was right that the bill does not offer blanket legal residency to unauthorized immigrants. The bill mandated fines, background checks and waiting periods, and it was tougher than its 1986 predecessor. But it also offered a measure of clemency to those immigrants, who would not be required to return to their home countries. We rated his statement that the proposal "is not amnesty" Half True. In April 2013, Rubio went on Meet the Press to defend the bill. Host David Gregory asked Rubio about his past and current positions on amnesty: Gregory: "Three years ago in a debate you were clear on this. You said, 'To earn a pathway to citizenship, you have to leave this country if you are here illegally -- go back home. And then you could come back in.' You said an earned pathway was amnesty. Yet you've changed your mind here -- why?" Rubio: "Well, first of all, what I said throughout my campaign was that I was against a blanket amnesty, and this is not blanket amnesty. On the contrary, this is not blanket anything. And, secondly, it's not amnesty because you pay serious consequences for having violated the law. "Third, we need to understand the existing law. The existing law does not prohibit someone -- the law today does not prohibit someone who violated the immigration laws from getting a green card. It simply says you have to leave the United States, and you have to wait 10 years." He then recapped the provisions of the bill that include the waiting period. The bill never reached a vote in the House and died. Rubio now favors a piecemeal approach rather than one comprehensive bill." (Politifact, 1/29/16)

"So he's navigating a borderland of his own. He has endorsed a path to citizenship that he once derided as "code for amnesty," risking a backlash from many loyal supporters who see los pobrecitos as freeloaders. But he has also pushed to make that path more arduous, demanding much tougher enforcement first, insisting he won't get into a who-can-benicest bidding war with Obama and pledging to walk away from reform if the final legislation doesn't reflect conservative principles. In an hour-long Feb. 1 interview with TIME, he emphasized that the undocumented have no right to stay in the U.S., vowed to oppose any bill that rewards them for breaking the law and defended the motives of hard-line "shamnesty" critics who say illegal immigrants are taking taxpayers for a ride. Rubio Crafted The 2013 Senate Immigration Bill And Was The "Chief Spokesman" • For The Bill. "It's a thin, hard line to walk: between the Republican establishment and the base, between compassion and the rule of law, between family and politics. And Rubio is walking it on an issue no politician has cracked in nearly two decades while testing the support of the grassroots Tea Party conservatives he will need if he seeks the White House in 2016. So far, though, he seems to be succeeding. After helping to craft bipartisan reforms in the Senate, he has served as their chief spokesman on right-wing radio and Fox News, getting remarkably sympathetic hearings from Rush Limbaugh, Sean Hannity and other talkers whose antiamnesty crusades helped kill similar efforts in the George W. Bush era. Almost all of them have praised his courage—Limbaugh called his work "admirable," like a Pope granting absolution-and the backlash has yet to materialize. "I don't know anyone else who could have broken through the conservative sound barrier on immigration," says American Conservative Union chairman Al Cardenas, a Miami lawyer who gave Rubio his first job as an attorney. "Marco can do left brain, so you get the logic, and he can do right brain, so you feel it in your heart and soul." This is Rubio's first leadership audition, his chance to show Republicans that he's more than a compelling speaker with boyish good looks, that he's not just geographically, demographically and ideologically correct. Immigration, he says, is tricky. Though he has evolved on the issue-flip-flopped, if you prefer-he says he's still not sure he's got it exactly right. The word he uses most is balance. That was his first thought after he played

that voice mail from his mother on his iPhone. "I have to balance that humanity with reality," he says. "We have immigration laws. They have to be followed. But yeah, she reminded me that there's a human element to this as well. As a policymaker, you have to strike a balance." Under Rubio's 2013 Immigration Reform Bill, A Pathway To Citizenship Would Be Offered To Over 11 Million Illegal Immigrants Provided That The Border Would Be Secured, An Employment Verification Established, And Strengthening Legal Immigration. "Now he wants to reform the system for all immigrants, and his impeccably nuanced positions have become the core of the Senate plan. He agrees that there is no way to round up and deport 11 million people living in the shadows, but he worries that excessive generosity could end up attracting 11 million more. So he backs a path to citizenship—the current situation, he says, amounts to "de facto amnesty"-but only if the borders are secure and an employmentverification system is in place first, and then only if it isn't quicker or easier than the path for applicants who play by the rules. And while he is willing to grant probationary legal status to undocumented immigrants who register and pay fines, he insists they go to the back of the line for green cards and refuses to allow them to collect food stamps or other federal benefits. Obama has announced similar principles, but Rubio has still blasted him for soft-pedaling the need to step up enforcement, among other issues. Some of this is Beltway theater; reform could become toxic for Republicans if it's perceived as Obama-friendly. But there also will be very real differences over details involving guest farmworkers, high-skilled immigrants, same-sex couples and the path to citizenship itself. It's a lot easier to agree that wait times should be reasonable or that the border should be secure than to draft legislation determining what those things mean. This shrewd political operator will have to decide how far he's willing to bend to get a deal done with Obama or whether he's content just to get credit for trying." (Time, 2/7/13)

Notably, Under Rubio's 2013 Bill, He Allowed For A Concession To Democrats To "Allow **Immigrants Who Had Already Been Deported To Return To The United States And Get** On The Road To Citizenship." "Rubio had plenty of leverage. If he walked away at any point, the bill would be doomed. But Rubio and his staff also had to gauge what would be acceptable to the right, so that he wasn't left twisting in the wind when the bill was put to a vote. The other Gang of Eight senators—Republicans John McCain and Jeff Flake of Arizona and Lindsey Graham of South Carolina, and Democrats Dick Durbin of Illinois, Chuck Schumer of New York, Michael Bennet of Colorado, and Robert Menendez of New Jersey-and their aides worked hard to make the bill's provisions palatable to conservatives, even if the changes were largely cosmetic. "He was basically the backstop, [the] vetoer," one Democratic aide recalls. "Nothing could get done without his approval." But when it came to who was eligible for that path to citizenship, both sides initially dug in, according to several Democratic aides who were present at the negotiations. Then Rubio blinked, agreeing to a compromise closer to the Democrats' proposal. And he made an additional and unexpected concession: The bill would allow immigrants who had already been deported to return to the United States and get on the road to citizenship. Rubio "gave up a lot, probably for something he should have still held firm," says one aide. "And it's not clear if that was because he was a bad negotiator or he had a good

heart." For Rubio, now a leading contender for the Republican presidential nomination, his work on the immigration bill—perhaps the most notable effort of his short Senate career—remains a matter that could blow up his candidacy, even though the bill never became the law. (In June 2013, it passed in the Senate with a bipartisan majority, but then-Speaker John Boehner, yielding to right-wing opposition to the measure, would not bring it to a vote in the House.) To conservative Republicans who favor a tough approach to illegal immigration, Rubio's participation in the Gang of Eight is disqualifying. To moderate GOPers, who see the need for their party to expand its appeal among Latinos, a fast-growing and critical voting bloc, Rubio's work on the bill is a selling point for the general election. Rubio's challenge has been to try to win over both sides, a difficult task given that conservatives find him too liberal on immigration and reform advocates view Rubio's subsequent attempt to distance himself from the Gang of Eight bill as a betrayal." Previously, In 2012, Rubio Announced He Was Working To "Craft A Bill That Would Allow Some Illegal Immigrants To Remain And Work In The U.S. But Would Not Help Them Gain A Path To Citizenship." "The revelation about his grandfather's deportation order comes as Rubio's name is increasingly mentioned as a possible GOP vice presidential nominee. The rising Republican star is viewed by his party as key to wooing Hispanic voters in swing states like Florida, Colorado and New Mexico. Yet while he has long supported legal immigration, Rubio has mostly followed his party's line in opposing any proposal that resembles amnesty for illegal immigrants. Rubio recently announced he is working to craft a bill that would allow some illegal immigrants to remain and work in the U.S. but would not help them gain a path to citizenship. A spokesman for Rubio said Garcia was like thousands of other refugees who often don't arrive with all the necessary visas. He added that the U.S. allowed Cubans to stay. "It's clear he left Cuba when he did because of the political situation there," Rubio spokesman Alex Conant said in an email Wednesday. "He may have chosen the US because his family is here, but he was fleeing Castro's Cuba and arrived here as a refugee --- just like thousands of others. Refugees by definition aren't likely to arrive with all the necessary visas, but our nation allowed the Cuban exiles to stay," Conant said. Ultimately, "After Experiencing Excoriating Blowback From His Party's Conservative Base, He Reversed Himself, Then Went To Radio Silence On The Issue." "During his 2010 Senate run, as the Tea Party's influence rose in the GOP, he came out against the DREAM Act, but about a year later, he was a member of the so-called Gang of Eight, the bipartisan group in Congress backing broad, comprehensive immigration reform that included a version of the act Then, after experiencing excoriating blowback from his party's conservative base, he reversed himself, then went to radio silence on the issue. Pressed by Sean Hannity during a September interview, Rubio demurred on his own plan. "The first two things you have to do is stop illegal immigration. Then second you have to modernize our legal immigration system, and then third you can have a debate about how to even legalize people to begin with," Rubio told the Fox News host. "And then, ultimately in 10 or 12 years, you could have a broader debate about how has this worked out and should we allow some of them to apply for green cards and eventually citizenship." Critics immediately pounced that Rubio was ruling out a path to citizenship during his second term, should he be elected." (*Politico*, 11/2015)

"After The Gang Of Eight Bill Stalled In The House And Rubio Lost The Trust Of Many Conservatives, He Immediately Began Moving Away From The Legislation That He Helped Pass." "But just months later, Rubio helped to pass a similar bill to the one he disparaged. He became a member of the "Gang of Eight," a bipartisan group of senators who lead the fight and eventually helped pass comprehensive reform that included a path to citizenship. Conservatives were vehemently opposed to the bill and and felt betrayed by Rubio. "He lied to us first and he went around and repeated that lie from the panhandle to the keys. That's why he got elected," Oliver said of his 2010 promise. "That really angered me. I wasn't raised that way. He didn't keep his word." After the Gang of Eight bill stalled in the House and Rubio lost the trust of many conservatives, he immediately began moving away from the legislation that he helped pass." (NBC News, 1/12/16)

However, In January 2016, "Rubio's Spokesperson Alex Conant Confirmed That Rubio Still Does Back A Path To Citizenship"; Rubio Also Noted His Support For A Pathway To Citizenship Multiple Times In 2015. "While he doesn't often say it, he still supports a path to citizenship. In June when he was asked if he supported a path to citizenship, he said, "I do." And in an interview on Hannity on Fox News in September, Rubio said he supports citizenship at the end of a long, complicated process that could take an immigrant more than ten years to navigate. Instead of being specific when he does talk about the 11 million undocumented immigrants, Rubio uses a loaded term that appeals to many in the Republican base. He recently started saying on the campaign trail that he's "not going to support amnesty," like he did at a Burlington, Iowa town hall Monday. Asked to clarify, Rubio's spokesperson Alex Conant confirmed that Rubio still does back a path to citizenship. And he said he's not signaling a conservative turn by largely staying out of the bipartisan talks, at least for now. Instead, he says he's just acknowledging political reality: That a big bill written by a band of senators from both parties is no longer the way to get a solution before the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program expires in March, though that deadline is murkier because a court has ordered the administration to start taking DACA renewals again. "We don't have a lot of time here to get a result. We have a 40-day period. We don't have a lot of time here for an extended back and forth," Rubio said. "Immigration: Secure the border, then work towards a legal status and possible path to citizenship. More vetting for refugees. Rubio supports a legal status for undocumented immigrants, but only after the U.S. border is secure. To accomplish that, Rubio said he would hire 20,000 new border agents and would complete the 700-mile fence at the border. The Florida Senator said he would not deport all of the undocumented immigrants in the country now. In 2013, Rubio joined the "Gang of Eight," which drafted and pushed a comprehensive immigration reform bill, including a path to citizenship, through the Senate. DACA/ Dream Act

In 2013, Rubio Expressed Sympathy And Compassion For Young Illegal Immigrants (Dreamers) And Compared Them To His Own Grandfather, Who Also Was An Illegal Immigrant. "In another book, The Rise of Marco Rubio, the journalist Manuel Roig-Franzia reveals that Papa was also, for a time, an undocumented immigrant. After fleeing Cuba in 1962, he was detained at the Miami airport and later ordered deported. But he was never sent home, and eventually he qualified for residency under the Cuban Adjustment Act of 1966, which still ensures Cuban refugees special treatment in the U.S. Rubio says he never knew his grandfather had lived in the U.S. illegally. But he told TIME that Papa's situation illustrated the moral quandaries surrounding immigration, which he wrestles with today. "He didn't have a legal right

to be here, but America wasn't going to deport an elderly man to a communist dictatorship," Rubio says. "It equates to these kids who were brought here when they were 5 or 6 and have no memory of the country where they were born. America is a compassionate country that says, 'Let's help these folks.' Temporary Protected Status (TPS): Venezuelans – Support

In 2019, Rubio Was The Only Republican In A Group Of Senators Requesting Trump "To Grant Temporary Protected Status (TPS) To Venezuelan Citizens In The United States, Amid An Ongoing Political And Humanitarian Crisis In The South American Country." "A bipartisan group of senators asked President Trump on Thursday to grant temporary protected

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status (TPS) to Venezuelan citizens in the United States, amid an ongoing political and humanitarian crisis in the South American country. Senate Minority Leader Charles Schumer (D-N.Y.), fellow Democratic Sens. Dick Durbin (Ill.) and Bob Menendez (N.J.), and Republican Marco Rubio (Fla.) wrote to the White House, asking for the administration to designate Venezuela within TPS. In a letter reviewed by The Hill, the senators asked Trump for the designation "in light of the ongoing violence, deteriorating security situation, and humanitarian crisis in Venezuela caused by the illegitimate regime of Nicolás Maduro." Under TPS, foreign nationals of a country undergoing man-made or natural disasters are allowed to live and work in the United States as their home country recovers. Designations are made on a country-by-country basis and apply to foreign nationals already in the United States, and can be renewed indefinitely for periods of up to 18 months. Trump has systematically targeted for termination long-standing TPS designations — including some that have been consistently renewed for decades, such as El Salvador. But the Trump administration has kept at least one newer designation active - for Syrian nationals fleeing the country's civil war — suggesting a potential openness to maintain the program in effect. And the Venezuelan crisis has become a central foreign policy issue and a rare point of accord for Trump and Congress. "The situation in Venezuela is volatile and violent, so it makes all the sense in the world to extend Temporary Protected Status to Venezuelan immigrants who should not be forced to return there while circumstances are so dangerous," said Schumer in a statement. "It is imperative Venezuela, working in concert with our allies throughout Latin America, move past the disastrous and despotic Maduro regime and reestablish order, democracy and human rights. The United States must stand as a beacon of freedom and extend this protection to eligible Venezuelans yearning for a peaceful, prosperous and democratic Venezuela," he added. Durbin, Menendez and Rubio, along with Sens. Patrick Leahy (D-Vt.) and Cory Booker (D-N.J). introduced last week a bill to designate Venezuela for TPS. But the program generally operates by executive action, with the secretary of Homeland Security announcing new designations and terminations. In their letter, the senators ask Trump to mandate a designation for Venezuela, based on the country's political and economic conditions. "Venezuela clearly meets the standard for TPS as it is obviously too dangerous for Venezuelan nationals to return to their country. It is facing simultaneous humanitarian, economic, and political crises of monumental proportions due to Maduro's criminal regime," wrote the senators. The senators added a reminder that TPS designations don't carry any permanent immigration benefits for their beneficiaries, and any recipient must pass a background check. "As the United States and our partners in the international community have condemned the illegitimate Maduro regime's brutal campaign of repression, granting TPS to Venezuela is a concrete measure your Administration can immediately take to alleviate the suffering of innocent Venezuelan civilians and to demonstrate our nation's commitment to supporting a safe democratic transition in Venezuela so that individuals can safely return home soon," they wrote. Wade A "Historically, Egregiously Flawed Decision" That "Has Condoned The Taking Of Innocent Life On A Massive Scale." "Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Fla.) laid out his strong anti-abortion views in a speech on Friday, calling the Supreme Court's landmark abortion rights decision in Roe v. Wade a "historically, egregiously flawed decision" that "has condoned the taking of innocent life on a massive scale." "It is fundamentally impossible for America to reach her destiny as a nation founded on the equal rights of all if our government believes an entire segment of the human population doesn't have a right to exist," the 2016 presidential candidate said at the National Right to Life Convention in New Orleans. The Supreme Court legalized abortion in the 1973 decision, ruling that states cannot prevent women from obtaining the procedure up until the fetus would be viable outside the womb, around 22 to 24 weeks of pregnancy. In the years before abortion was legal, it was common for women to land in the hospital after seeking illegal, "back-alley" abortions or attempting to self-induce. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that in 1972, the year before Roe v. Wade, 130,000 women obtained illegal or self-induced procedures, and 39 of them died. Republicans in Congress are currently trying to chip away at Roe v. Wade by banning abortion at 20 weeks of pregnancy. Rubio and nearly every other Republican presidential candidate has endorsed the legislation. Ten states have enacted similar abortion limits, and anti-abortion advocates hope one of the laws eventually makes its way to the Supreme Court and overturns Roe. Rubio said Friday that the issue of abortion is "more than political or policy-related. It is a definitional issue about the kind of country we want to be." According to a recent Gallup poll, half of Americans consider themselves "prochoice," while 44 percent identify as "pro-life." But Rubio said he believes that nearly every American is personally opposed to the procedure, regardless of whether they think it should be legal. "You can judge a cause by the arguments made on both sides. For example, I rarely meet anyone who's willing to say they're pro-abortion," he said. "They'll say they're pro-choice, but almost everyone I've met says that they personally disagree with abortion. That alone tells us a little about the basic common sense the issue is built on." "I think both of those instances are horrifying and fortunately, they are extremely rare. It happens. And anytime it happens, it's horrifying and it's a tragedy," he said. "But I personally and honestly and deeply believe that all human life is worthy of protection irrespective of the circumstances, in which, that human life was created. I personally believe that you do not correct one tragedy with a second tragedy." The Florida senator has recently been vocal about his desire to see Planned Parenthood defunded following the release of videos accusing the group of illegally selling the organs and tissue of aborted fetuses. "Every single one of us started at that same stage. It can't become anything other than a human being. And it is neither up to you nor I nor any politician to decide that we're going to allow this life to move forward and this life not to," Rubio said. "Do you want to really

have a government in the decision of deciding what a human life is and what's not a human life?" Rubio pushed back on the idea that his abortion positions are radical and said that a high value of human life is a traditional view that resonates with most Americans and that should not change. "The value of life is timeless. The idea that a human life is worthy of the protection of our laws is not something that over time anyone should evolve on," he said." Marco Rubio seemed to compare abortion to vehicular manslaughter "In most states in this country, if a drunk driver runs a red light and kills a pregnant woman, they are charged with two counts of vehicular manslaughter," Rubio told Florida attorney John Stemberger, leader of the Florida Family Policy Council, a Christian advocacy group. "One for the child and one for the mother. So we are already, in other areas of the law, recognize that that is a human life worthy of protection of our laws."" But he does not support the state ballot initiative, which he called a "ruse" to allow people to access the drug to get high. "If there is a

medical condition that can be treated or alleviated through the use of medicinal marijuana, that's something that I'd be open to," Rubio, R-Fla., said Wednesday. Last month, Gov. Rick Scott signed into law a bill that permits Floridians to use a "non-euphoric" strain of marijuana to treat conditions such as severe epilepsy, Lou Gehrig's disease and to alleviate pain from cancer. "What I'm concerned about and I'm not sure how this law in Florida would apply to, is to the ruse of medicinal marijuana for purposes of allowing people to buy a joint and smoke it," Rubio said. Gay Foster Parenting – Oppose

In 2006, Rubio Opposed Proposals To Allow For Gay Foster Parents And Derided The Proposal As A "Social Experiment" On Children. "Marco Rubio is having a moment for some reason. Sure, the Florida senator and Republican presidential hopeful is running a distant third and has only picked up a single point in the polls since October. But an influential pocket of the punditry decided long ago that Rubio is the invisible front-runner, the candidate who will surge when Donald Trump and Ted Cruz do whatever Alien and Predator did to each other at the end of Alien vs. Predator. Since Rubio has been anointed the establishment candidate, able to bridge the rabid base and the moderate moneymen, it is probably worth noting that he is strikingly anti-gay-much more so than Trump, and at least as much as Cruz. The story of Rubio's homophobic misdeeds reaches back to 2006. Florida's foster care system was in crisis. Faced with too many children and too few foster parents, the Department of Children and Family Services allowed a contractor to force abused and neglected children to sleep on the floor of a conference room at a DCF building for several days. These children had suffered severe physical harm and psychological trauma before entering the foster system—and DCF made them live and sleep in a conference room together without beds, bedding, supervision, medical care, sanitary bathrooms, or adequate food. (The children, represented by an attorney, successfully sued DCF shortly thereafter.) Obviously, DCF's actions were inexcusable: The agency essentially permitted children to be imprisoned in inhumane conditions. (I've visited the building where the children

were kept. It is not dissimilar to a minimum-security prison.) But the scandal raised a broader issue: Florida simply didn't have enough foster parents to take in all these abused and abandoned children. What to do? One option frequently floated was to expand the pool of potential fosterers and adopters by allowing same-sex couples to take in children. The Florida legislature banned gay adoption in 1977, but times had changed, and the pressure on the foster care system had grown untenable. Would the legislature reconsider the ban? Rubio, who was then serving as the Florida House majority leader, instantly and emphatically quashed the idea. "Some of these kids are the most disadvantaged in the state," he said. "They shouldn't be forced to be part of a social experiment." Rubio, in other words, would rather see the children languish in the flawed foster care system than allow same-sex couples to take them in. Apology For Slavery

In April 2007, Rubio Noted That An Apology For Slavery Resolution "Would Merit Discussion." "Nearly 142 years after Florida's slaves first tasted freedom, state leaders say the time may soon be right to apologize for Florida's role in their bondage. In 1860, at the outbreak of the Civil War, 44 percent of Florida's population -- or nearly 62,000 out of 140,424 people -were slaves. Florida's miles of uninhabited coast and hidden harbors also were a haven for slavers. Although officially banned by the federal government in 1803, the trans-Atlantic slave trade continued to prosper by landing slaves in Florida and then smuggling them into other states. "There were a lot of atrocities that happened in Florida," said Sen. Tony Hill, D-Jacksonville, chairman of Florida's Legislative Black Caucus. Hill had considered asking fellow state lawmakers to face the issue during the final weeks of their annual session, scheduled to end May 4. But with so little time left, and major issues such as property-tax relief and the budget still to be resolved, he plans to wait until next year. And at least among the Legislature's top leaders, his request is likely to get a warm reception. "Obviously, slavery was one of the darkest periods in American history, one of the saddest and most tragic," said House Speaker Marco Rubio, R-West Miami. "I think it would merit discussion. There aren't a lot of defenders of slavery left." Senate President Ken Pruitt, a Civil War history buff, said he would be "very supportive" of an attempt to address Florida's role in condoning the institution of slavery. "While it is historic, it is repugnant," said Pruitt, R-Port St. Lucie. Through a push by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and black legislators, several Southern and border states this year have publicly begun to face their role in the enslavement of Africans and their descendants, an institution that helped ignite the four-year war between the states. No state has yet issued an apology, but Virginia expressed its "profound regret" in February. Similar bills have passed in Maryland and North Carolina. Legislation is pending in Alabama, Georgia and Missouri. And reparations may be considered in Mississippi. Margaret Newton of Boynton Beach, who directs the African and African-American Studies Office for Palm Beach County

public schools, said it is important for Florida to recognize and acknowledge wrongdoings. "I would hope that once you start to apologize, you come to grips with the past so it won't be repeated, so it won't happen again," she said." (*Orlando Sentinel*, 4/18/07)

In March 2008, Rubio Underscored His Support For The Slavery Apology Resolution Noting "Expressions Of Regret Are Symbolic, But They Are Important." "More than 140 years after slavery thrived in Florida, some lawmakers from both parties believe now is time for the state Legislature to apologize. Democratic Sen. Tony Hill, working since last year with Republican Senate President Ken Pruitt, will propose a resolution in which the Legislature formally apologizes for the history of slavery in this state. "Black folks have come so far in this country, to come from slavery to a Democratic nominee for president," said Sen. Gary Siplin, D-Orlando. He filed legislation seeking a similar apology but vowed to work for Hill's version. "This apology is the right thing to do." Exact language isn't yet available, and it's not clear if the House leadership will sign on to the plan. But Pruitt's spokeswoman confirmed his interest, and House Speaker Marco Rubio said he generally supports the idea. "Expressions of regret are symbolic, but they are important," Rubio said. Whether the proposal will encounter opposition is unclear. None has emerged so far, and politically it's not necessarily prudent to oppose such a measure. The proposal echoes similar moves by other states, including New Jersey, Alabama, North Carolina and Virginia. The New Jersey Assembly in January passed a resolution expressing "profound regret" for the state's role in slavery. Hill's resolution would be the first of its kind in Florida, and the fact that Pruitt has been involved could boost its chances of passing. Hill, a union organizer from Jacksonville, said he was inspired to push the matter in part by the 2006 film Amazing Grace. The movie is based on the life of William Wilberforce, who fought in the British Parliament to end the slave trade in the British Empire. Hill said he and Pruitt, who works in real estate in Port St. Lucie, have discussed the film, which Hill called moving. Slavery in Florida dates back to the late 1500s, when the Spanish used slaves to build forts. Centuries later, slave use moved to the state's agriculture economy. The British imported slaves to Florida between 1763 and 1783, and the coastline was a popular dock for ships carrying slaves intended for other states. The practice grew after Florida became a U.S. territory in the early 1800s and plantation owners from Virginia, the Carolinas and other Southern states moved their operations - and their slaves - to Florida's cheaper land, primarily in the Panhandle. By 1860, there were nearly 62,000 slaves - 44 percent of the state population. "It's time for us to move forward," said Sen. Frederica Wilson, D-Miami, a member of the black caucus. "And the only way for us to do that is to say, 'We made a mistake.' Until we do that, the racial divide in Florida remains strong." Hill's plan was the second race-relations issue to come to the fore as the annual legislative session opened Tuesday. Rubio, in his opening remarks, told lawmakers he wants to address "the tragic tale of what is happening to young African-American males." "It is intolerable and unacceptable that an entire segment of our population has come to believe that the American dream is not available to them," Rubio said. "And we can never be the nation God intended us to be so long as this tragedy persists." Meanwhile, House Rep. Don Brown, R-DeFuniak Springs, wants to create a Confederate flag license plate honoring "Confederate heritage." He told the St. Petersburg Times he just wants to honor a part of history - much like honoring Martin Luther King Jr. by naming a street after him." (Tampa Bay Times, 3/5/08)

In March 2008, While Serving As Florida House Speaker, Rubio Oversaw Passage Of A Resolution "Expressing "Profound Regret For The Involuntary Servitude Of Africans, And Calling For Reconciliation Among All Floridians."" "More than 140 years after a former Florida governor described Africans as "a wild barbarian to be tamed and civilized," the Legislature on Wednesday apologized for the state's role in sanctioning slavery. The House and Senate approved a resolution expressing "profound regret for the involuntary servitude of Africans, and calling for reconciliation among all Floridians." There was no discussion before the unanimous voice votes, but the reading of the resolution — which described how slaves' ears were nailed to posts during whippings — brought some lawmakers, including Tampa Sen. Arthenia Joyner, to tears. "It was painful," said Joyner, a Democrat and black caucus member. "I tried to imagine myself under those circumstances. I mean, I know how incensed I got in the '60s just knowing I couldn't get into a movie!" Gov. Charlie Crist, affectionately dubbed "Florida's first black governor" by some black lawmakers, visited the Senate chamber to watch the vote. In the House, Speaker Marco Rubio, R-West Miami, took the unusual step of ordering all members to their seats. And in a rare appearance, Senate President Ken Pruitt, R-Port St. Lucie, sat at Rubio's side. "This was as sincere and as meaningful an apology as could be given," Pruitt said. "It was important for the words to stand on their own." The resolution did not address reparations. Crist appeared to be open to such efforts if slave descendancy could be established. "Certainly, it's something you'd like to be able to do," he said. But one black lawmaker, Sen. Al Lawson, said reparations are unlikely because they are controversial and they would cost the state so much. "But I appreciate the governor's comment," said Lawson, D-Tallahassee. As news of the vote spread Thursday, public reaction on the St. Petersburg Times' Web site, tampabay.com, varied. Some readers accused lawmakers of "wasting" time and questioned why an apology was needed when all slave owners were dead. Others said it wasn't enough; reparations are in order. Some commended lawmakers, saying they hoped it would help heal society's racial strife. With Wednesday's vote, Florida joins five other states - Alabama, Virginia, Maryland, North Carolina and New Jersey — that have apologized for slavery." (Tampa Bay Times, 3/26/08)

"U.S. Senator Marco Rubio (R-FL) introduced legislation today that would make it harder for suspected terrorists to purchase firearms and easier for law enforcement agencies to go after suspected terrorists, while safeguarding law-abiding citizens' Second Amendment and due process rights. Rubio's bill, the Terror Intelligence Improvement Act, strengthens and improves proposals introduced in the U.S. Senate following the June 12th terrorist attack at Pulse night club in Orlando, Florida. "After the Orlando terrorist attack, I met with Fred and Maria Wright, who shared with me the story of their son Jerry and the unimaginable pain they carry after losing him that night," said Rubio. "The Wrights made a simple request: that we improve our laws so it is more difficult for evil people to get ahold of guns. I told them I would continue working toward consensus on common-sense measures that would help ensure criminals, terrorists and others seeking to take innocent lives are not able to acquire firearms." "Today, I'm taking another step toward fulfilling my promise to the Wright family, by introducing legislation that builds on some of the best ideas that have been proposed, and improves them in ways that I hope will make a bipartisan solution more likely," Rubio continued. Rubio's Terror Intelligence Improvement Act would: Consolidate all federal terrorism investigation intelligence under the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), strengthening the FBI's capabilities and helping ensure dangerous individuals do not fall through the cracks. Require the FBI Director and the Joint Terrorism Task

Force (JTTF) be immediately notified of any request to transfer a firearm to an individual who was the subject of a federal terrorism investigation within the last 10 years. When an individual who was the subject of a federal terrorism investigation within the last 10 years tries to obtain a firearm, allow the U.S. Attorney General to delay the purchase or transfer for up to three business days and file an emergency petition in court to stop it. If the court finds probable cause that the individual is connected to terrorism, the Attorney General may arrest the individual. Protect the due process rights of law-abiding Americans by ensuring emergency petitions filed by the Attorney General are only granted if the transferee receives notice of the hearing and has the opportunity to participate with legal counsel. If the court denies the Attorney General's petition, the federal government is responsible for all reasonable costs and attorney fees. Require the Inspector General of the Intelligence Community (IC IG) to conduct an audit of the federal government's terrorism screening and watch list procedures, and identify any problems in the processes of adding or removing individuals from the system. "Though pitched as a move toward democratizing the House, it had a clear political benefit for Rubio: He could stay above the fray while his lieutenants tended to controversies. In 2007, for instance, the National Rifle Association pushed legislation that would allow employees to keep guns in their cars at work. Business groups opposed the measure. Rubio allowed Rep. Stan Mayfield, a top lieutenant and the chairman of the Environment and Natural Resources committee, to take the lead. Support for the bill had been shaky from the outset, but the measure became toxic after the Virginia Tech shooting, in which a student shot and killed 32 people on the college's campus. Despite intense pressure from the NRA, Mayfield opposed the bill. "Stan made sure the speaker understood where he stood," says Kevin Sweeny, a former Mayfield aide. This week, Rubio will expand on that theme with a speech at the Jesse Helms Center in North Carolina that is intended to be a full-throated defense of American engagement overseas, even at a time of belt tightening at home. Rubio says he believes its important to account to people why it is "essential" for the United States to "spend money and risk lives on foreign policy." In particular, Rubio says he will reinforce the importance of promoting democracy. "We don't always agree with other democracies but very rarely do we find ourselves fighting them," he says This kind of rhetoric on U.S. policy abroad certainly doesn't fit the stereotype of a politician who rode to office in 2010 on the backs of tea party activists -upsetting a popular governor along the way -- and who embodies in many ways the new generation of fiscal conservatives in Congress. But Rubio seems intent on carving out a path distinct from many others in the Class of 2010. Through his high-profile speeches, as well as his legislative collaborations with senior senators and daily work on the Foreign Relations and Select Intelligence panels, he is emerging as a fresh GOP voice on foreign policy. In doing so, he is contradicting the notion that the tea party is synonymous with international isolationism. "Addressing a gathering of conservatives here on Thursday, Mr. Rubio, a potential 2016 presidential candidate, sought to link the right's resolute belief in American exceptionalism with a call for the United States to play a more robust role in confronting bad actors on the world stage. That posture stands in contrast with other members of his party, notably Senator Rand Paul of Kentucky, who argues that the United States should be wary of foreign intervention and retreat from the policies of the George W. Bush era. The divergent national security views of the two ambitious, first-term senators offer an early preview of a debate sure to play out in the Republican presidential primary in 2016. "There is only one nation on earth capable of rallying and bringing together the free people on this planet to stand up to the spread of totalitarianism," Mr. Rubio told attendees of the Conservative Political Action Conference, offering a tour d'horizon of affairs in China, North Korea, Iran, Venezuela and Russia. After suffering a bruising from conservatives over immigration, Mr. Rubio, who devoted over half of his 16-minute address to national security issues, has been

delivering the same message of late in formal speeches to conservative think tanks, in Twitter messages, op-ed pieces, television appearances, on the Senate floor and in private conversations with leaders on trips to Britain, South Korea and Japan. He is not only trying to rehabilitate his image among those conservatives who believe that he was advocating for amnesty for illegal immigrants, he also is seizing an opening to put a potential presidential rival who has enjoyed far better reviews recently on the defensive. For a while, Mr. Paul's views on national security, such as his opposition to the use of drones and the National Security Agency surveillance program, dovetailed with the deep conservative unease toward empowering President Obama. But Ukraine offers a moment for hawks like Mr. Rubio to reassert themselves. 

<u>Overall – Support For The Iraq War</u>

In October 2010, Rubio Defended The Iraq War And Argued That The United States Was Better Off For Having Done So. "SMITH: Mr. Rubio, is -- is America safer and better off for having gone to war in Iraq? RUBIO: I think the answer ultimately is yes. First of all, the world is better off because Saddam Hussein is no longer in charge in Iraq. And I think we have to remind ourselves of that, is that the world is a better and safer place because Saddam Hussein no longer is in charge of that country. Let's understand one thing. Right now, we are worried about Iran possessing a nuclear weapon. Well, if Saddam Hussein was still there, and you know the relationship and the long history between Iraq and Iran, you'd have two nations in a full-blown arms war, the way you've seen, for example, between Pakistan and India. So the world is a better and safer place, and not to mention the Iraqi people are better off than they were under Saddam Hussein. There's no doubt that Iraq has a long way to go. You know, there are a lot of issues that that society and that that nation-state faces. But it is better off today than it was when Saddam Hussein..." (CNN, 10/24/10)

In 2015, Rubio Reiterated That He Did Not Think It Was A Mistake To Go To War In Iraq. "As Rubio moved toward his presidential bid in April, he has tried to establish himself as the hawkish foreign policy expert. Their concerns are only magnified because our failure to do more to stop the jihadis rampaging across Iraq and Syria has allowed Iran to claim the lead role in the anti-Islamic State coalition. Iranian-backed militias are at the forefront of the fight in both Syria and Iraq — a development that leads many Sunnis to conclude that the Islamic State and al-Nusra Front, al Qaeda's official affiliate in Syria, are the lesser evil. We must make clear that the United States does not have a secret plan (as many conspiracy theorists in the Middle East imagine) to trade Islamic State domination of Iraq and Syria for Iranian domination. In Iraq, it is imperative that we use all of the leverage at America's disposal to negotiate a power-sharing deal that will give predominantly Sunni provinces, such as Anbar and Nineveh, assurances that their rights will be respected by Baghdad even after the defeat of the Islamic State. Sunnis do not want to risk a repeat of the fiasco that occurred when

the Obama administration pulled out all U.S. combat troops in 2011. Reaching such a deal will require sending high-level American representatives to Baghdad, on par with the dynamic team of Gen. David Petraeus, now retired, and then-U.S. Ambassador to Iraq Ryan Crocker, both of whom oversaw the "surge" in 2007. Even now, Washington still has leverage in Iraq, as the administration showed by helping to oust the sectarian Nouri al-Maliki as prime minister last year. "They have no standing to say anything about this," Rubio said of the Russians. He said that the move doesn't just send a message, but amounts to a "significant degrading" of Assad's ability to carry out chemical attacks. "This is the area from which those chemical attacks were launched," Rubio said. "It's the place you were going to see future attacks come from, particularly targeting innocent civilians." Earlier in the night, Rubio tweeted a photo of a man holding two babies and wrote, "Something should happen." Rubio also quoted a passage from the Bible ahead of the strikes, writing, "Be sure of this: The wicked will not go unpunished' Proverbs 11:21 #SyriaChemicalAttack" Speaking Friday on CNN's "New Day," Rubio said the strike was in "our national interest" because of American troops in the area whom Assad could potentially target in a similar chemical weapons attack. "If Assad is willing to use that gas against civilians, why would he not be willing to use it against Americans?" Rubio said. Earlier, a deputy Russian UN ambassador had warned of "negative consequences" Thursday if the US decided to use military force in Syria." (CNN, 4/7/17)

Iran

Potential Military Intervention To Prevent Nuclear Weapon – Support

In 2012, "Rubio Made Clear That Military Action Should Be On The Table In Iran."

"Rubio said he believes foreign policy should be "non-partisan as much as possible." But for a war-weary country, further American involvement anywhere in the country can be a contentious issue. The senator said part of the problem in Afghanistan is that the U.S. has not made a long-term commitment to the country, and some Afghans fear the prospects of cooperating with allie forces if Taliban were to rule again after the coalition leaves the country. And Rubio made clear that military action should be on the table in Iran. "We should also be preparing our allies, and the world, for the reality that unfortunately, if all else fails, preventing a nuclear Iran may, tragically, require a military solution," he said. But, the Tea Party favorite did express his desires to building coalitions before beginning any foreign entanglement. "America has acted unilaterally in the past — and I believe it should continue to do so in the future -- when necessity requires," he said. "But our preferred option since the U.S. became a global leader has been to work with others to achieve our goals."" (NBC News, 4/25/12)

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confrontation between the White House and Congress over Libya is both counterproductive and unnecessary. Whatever one thinks about the constitutional questions surrounding the War Powers Resolution, or the wisdom of the original decision to intervene in Libya three months ago, the strategic reality is that our nation is now engaged in a fight. It will either end in the demise of a brutal anti-American dictator, or in his victory over us and our allies. The latter would be an extremely harmful outcome for the U.S. For this reason, we have an unequivocal national interest in ensuring Moammar Gadhafi's regime is defeated as quickly as possible. "The most meaningful support the U.S. could provide at this time is to help Libya care for its many wounded citizens. From our visit to the hospital, it is clear that Libya does not have the capacity to care for such a large number of wounded, many requiring advanced treatment and prosthetics. Indeed, this is such a priority that the TNC told us they would be willing to draw on the more than \$150 billion in Libya's frozen assets to reimburse the U.S. for the costs of this humanitarian assistance. To this end, we should consider deploying a hospital ship, such as the USNS Comfort, to Libya or Malta. Another option could be to transport Libyans in need of advanced care to U.S. medical facilities in Europe. We can also help Libya lay the foundation for sustainable security. This requires safeguarding the immense stockpiles of weapons and dangerous materials that exist across the country. Overall – Defense Of Foreign Aid Spending

Rubio "Is The Rare Republican Who Publicly Defends U.S. Foreign Aid Spending." "One area where Rubio has diverged drastically from his fellow tea party freshmen is on spending on international affairs. Funding for aid to the developing world is a particularly easy target for budget cutters on Capitol Hill these days. The argument offered by many fiscal conservatives is that, given the U.S. debt crisis, America simply can't afford to spend billions of dollars on programs to combat world hunger, food shortages or direct aid to foreign countries. Rubio, however, is the rare Republican who publicly defends U.S. foreign aid spending. In an online video response to a constituent question, Rubio laid out his case. In 2015, Rubio Has Underscored His Support For NATO And Indicated He Would Be Willing To Commit The United States To War With Russia In Order To Defend NATO Members Such AS Turkey. "Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Florida) argued that the US must take a hawkish response to any Russian aggression against Turkey after the country downed a Russian warplane Tuesday. The Republican presidential candidate discussed what he would do to confront Russian President Vladimir Putin during a Fox news interview. "Although Vladimir Putin is a gangster and a criminal, he is also geopolitical actor who makes decisions on a costbenefit analysis," Rubio said. Earlier in the day, Turkish fighter jets shot down a Russian warplane near the Syrian border for allegedly violating Turkish airspace and ignoring repeated warnings. Putin responded by saying his country's plane was actually in Syrian airspace, where Russia is supposedly conducting airstrikes against the Islamic State group. Putin warned of "serious consequences" for Turkey. But Rubio argued that the US should make clear that it would go to war to defend Turkey, which is a member of the NATO alliance. Increasing Defense Spending – Support

Rubio Has Backed Proposals To Increase Defense Spending Over 10 Years By \$1 Trillion. "Rubio has backed more defense spending since at least March 2015, when he and U.S. Sen. Tom Cotton, R-Ark., introduced a budget amendment to increase the Pentagon's budget. At the time, Rubio argued that adjusted for inflation, defense spending had declined by 21 percent since 2010 -- a claim PolitiFact National rated Mostly True. Rubio's amendment proposed restoring defense spending levels to what had been proposed in the spring of 2011, for fiscal 2012 going forward, by then-Defense Secretary Robert Gates. Gates' proposal was prior to spending limits that were imposed by the Budget Control Act of 2011, which became law in the summer of 2011. Returning to the so-called 2012 proposed spending levels would add \$1 trillion in defense spending over 10 years, Benjamin Friedman, a defense research fellow at the liberatrian Cato Institute, told us. That is also the estimate made in a July 2015 report from the nonpartisan Congressional Research Service. The morning after the Milwaukee debate, Rubio was asked in a Fox News interview: "So, where are you going to get the trillion dollars from that Rand Paul says we shouldn't be spending?" Rubio didn't address the figure, saying: "First of all, before we fund anything, the federal government should be fully funding national security." But he has made references to the \$1 trillion cost in the past. In a September 2014 speech, Rubio said he agreed with a recommendation by the bipartisan National Defense Panel to return to the 2012level spending, "which we are on track to be around \$1 trillion short of through fiscal year 2022." And on his campaign website, Rubio says he would restore defense spending to the 2012 level, "and begin to undo the damage caused by \$1 trillion in indiscriminate defense cuts."" Rubio, who sits on the Senate Intelligence Committee that is leading its own probe into possible ties to Russia within Trump's campaign team, has previously said that Trump firing Mueller would be a "mistake" and that the president should allow the special counsel to conclude his investigation despite the president's belief that the search for collusion is a "witch hunt." Trump allies ramped up demands for the probes to be shut down after Congress received a report that a top FBI counterintelligence agent who was fired from Mueller's team had sent anti-Trump texts between August 2015 and December 2016. The House Intelligence Committee is now seeking answers into possible bias on Mueller's team, while Republicans on the conservative House Freedom Caucus have publicly demanded that Mueller recuse himself from the investigation over his friendship with former FBI Director James Comey, who Trump fired. The White House has in the past raised concerns over the integrity of the probe but has not said Mueller should resign or suggested that the president would fire him." (The Hill, 12/29/17)

In 2018, Rubio Defended The FBI's Investigation Regarding Possible Ties Between Trump Campaign Officials And Russia. "Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Fla.) defended the FBI in comments on ABC on Sunday, saying he believes law enforcement was right to investigate "certain individuals" with suspicious histories connected to Russia. Rubio argued the FBI was not investigating President Trump's campaign, but was looking into these individuals, something he said was appropriate. "As far as what I have seen to date, it appears that there was an investigation not of the campaign but of certain individuals who have a history that we should be suspicious of that predate the presidential campaign of 2015, 2016." Rubio said on ABC's "This Week." "When individuals like that are in the orbit of a major political campaign in America, the FBI, who is in charge of counterintelligence investigations, should look at people like that," Rubio added. "But they're not investigating the campaign, they're investigating those people." Rubio made the remarks in response to Trump's argument that the FBI improperly spied on his presidential campaign through the use of the informant. "The Democrats are now alluding to the the concept that having an Informant placed in an opposing party's campaign is different than having a Spy, as illegal as that may be," he tweeted on Friday. "But what about an 'Informant' who is paid a fortune and who 'sets up' way earlier than the Russian Hoax?" It's not clear whether the FBI paid the informant. Rubio did not give a direct answer to questions on ABC about whether Trump's claims were wrong. "I have no evidence that those people were part of an investigation on the campaign. If that exists, I would want to know about it, we should all know about and that — that would be wrong and we should — we should do something about it," he said. "But up to now, what I have seen is evidence that they were investigating individuals with a history of links to Russia that were concerning." Rubio during a separate interview on CBS's "Face the Nation" also said he has seen no evidence of a spy in Trump's campaign. "Former President Donald Trump is scheduled to appear in a Miami courtroom on Tuesday where he will address an indictment consisting of 37 felony charges related to his handling of classified documents after he left the White House. Trump vehemently denies any wrongdoing in connection with the case. In an interview with "CBS Mornings," Florida Sen. Marco Rubio, vice chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee and author of the new book "Decades of Decadence: How Our Spoiled Elites Blew America's Inheritance of Liberty, Security, and Prosperity," expressed concern about the impact of the indictment on the country — and said it is "political in nature." "When you bring an indictment like this, it's not done in isolation. It's not done in a vacuum. You gotta take a lot of things into account. There's no allegation that there was harm done to the, to the national security. There's no allegation that he sold it to a foreign power or that it was trafficked to somebody else or that anybody got access to it," said Rubio. "You have to weigh the harm of that, or lack thereof, on the harm that this indictment does to the country. This is deeply divisive," he said. He said prosecuting the likely GOP presidential nominee, who will run against an incumbent president, is alone "political in nature," and said there will be "certain harm." This will put institutions into "tremendous crisis," he said. "The judge will be attacked. The process will be attacked. The Department of Justice will be attacked. The prosecutor will be attacked," said Rubio. While the senator said the classified documents found at Mar-a-Lago "should not have been there," he said the indictment "is a separate thing." "You're bringing an indictment that basically alleges no real damage to national security — not that it excuses it — versus what we're going to see now. We're going to subject this country to a divisive spectacle" at a time when we're dealing with major issues. When asked about Trump's leadership qualities, Rubio expressed his belief that Trump could "do a better job" than President Biden as the next leader of the country. He also said he would personally choose Trump over Biden "in a heartbeat." However, he emphasized that the ultimate decision on leadership lies with the voters. "People can debate about who they think it shouldn't be. Voters are going to make that decision. Okay,

bottom line is that our republic will produce a president. Your policies are what we need to hold them to," Rubio said." (<u>CBS News</u>, 6/12/23)

The Florida Republican explained that he didn't believe the presidential pardon power was created to use for these types of purposes. "I think it would be the wrong thing to do and I think it would be a huge political mistake as well," Rubio said on "State of the Union." "I hope that doesn't happen." In an Oval Office sit-down with The Post late last month, the president said a pardon for Manafort was "not off the table." "It was never discussed, but I wouldn't take it off the table. Why would I take it off the table?" Trump said. Manafort has been jailed since June and in August was convicted of eight felonies, including bank and tax fraud. He escaped a second trial by filing a guilty plea in September. But on Friday, Special Counsel Robert Mueller's office accused Manafort of violating that plea deal by lying to federal prosecutors about his contacts with the Trump administration. Mueller also accused Manafort of lying about his contact with Konstantin Kilimnik, a former employee who's suspected of having Russian intelligence ties. "Four GOP senators joined a growing list of Republicans calling out Donald Trump for his recent remarks that a judge involved in one of his lawsuits could not be impartial because of his ethnicity. Trump, the presumptive GOP presidential nominee, said the federal judge overseeing a lawsuit relating to Trump University should recuse himself from the case because he is of Mexican descent. Judge Gonzalo Curiel, who was born in Indiana, is the son of Mexican immigrants. "Donald Trump's comments on the ethnic heritage and religion of judges are absolutely unacceptable," Sen. Susan Collins said in a statement Monday. "His statement that Judge Curiel could not rule fairly because of his Mexican heritage does not represent our American values." Florida Sen. Marco Rubio, the son of Cuban immigrants, also criticized the remarks in a television interview. "Quite frankly, I'm very disturbed by the way he's talking about this judge. He's an American." Texas Sen. Ted Cruz, another Republican of Cuban descent, said, "Of course, it is inappropriate to be attacking a federal judge's race or ethnicity." On Sunday, Trump also said it is "possible" that a Muslim judge would also be biased against him, during an interview on ABC's "This Week." "I think his parents are heroes and they have a First Amendment right to speak out on their politics, as all Americans do. Their son died for the Constitution, and I honor that," the Florida Republican, a former Trump rival, said Monday in Clearwater, Florida. Khizr Khan, whose son Humayun was killed by a car bomb in 2004 while serving in Iraq, spoke at the Democratic National Convention in Philadelphia last week, where he criticized Trump for his invective against Muslims and asked if he had ever read the U.S. Constitution. In what's become a widely ridiculed statement, Trump said over the weekend, "Mr. Khan who has never met me, has no right to stand in front of millions of people and claim I have never read the Constitution, (which is false) and say many other inaccurate things." The real estate mogul also questioned why Khan's wife, Ghazala Khan, remained silent on stage in Philadelphia, suggesting she wasn't allowed to speak because of her Muslim faith. But as with other Republicans, Rubio's repudiation of Trump's comments came without him withdrawing support for the Republican nominee's White House bid. Earlier in the day, Arizona Sen. John McCain issued a blistering critique of Trump as did the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Sen. Majority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky and House Speaker Paul D. Ryan of Wisconsin also rejected Trump's comments but did not take back their support for his campaign for president. According to a transcript circulated by his office, Rubio said that on the broader question of Muslim immigration to the United States, the government should know exactly who is entering the country. "We have Americans who are Muslims who are patriotic and love this country, as evidenced by the Khan family. We also know that there are parts of this world, where there are terrorists that are trying to get into the United States, and it's not that we don't want to allow people in, it's that in many cases we can't because we don't have a way to vet them," the senator said. Criticisms Of Trump's Border Security Policy – National Emergency

In 2019, Rubo Criticized Trump's Efforts To Declare A National Emergency To Build His Proposed Southern Border Wall Noting "We Have A Crisis At Our Southern Border, But No Crisis Justifies Violating The Constitution." "President Donald Trump announced Friday that he is declaring a national emergency, circumventing the legislative branch to secure border wall funding. "We're going to confront the national security crisis on our southern border, and we're going to do it one way or the other, we have to do it," Trump said in a speech from the White House Rose Garden. "I'm going to be signing a national emergency, and it's been signed many times before. It's been signed by other presidents. From 1977 or so, it gave the presidents the power. There's rarely been a problem. They signed it, nobody cares, I guess they weren't very exciting." Trump's declaration comes as he failed to secure congressional support for more than \$5 billion he wanted for border security in a broader spending bill that funds a variety of federal agencies. His unilateral move to declare a national emergency is based on the 1976 National Emergencies Act. It's been used 60 times since the law was passed, including after the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks, when President George W. Bush sought additional powers to organize the military. But Trump's critics assailed the move, accusing the president of manufacturing a crisis and vowing a fight in the courts. "President Trump's personal political predicament does not qualify as a national emergency," said Tampa Democratic Rep Kathy Castor. "He manufactured a national emergency to unlawfully divert funds to his pet project instead of focusing on what matters to American families like lowering health care costs, creating jobs through infrastructure and tackling the climate crisis." House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.) and Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.) said Friday in a joint statement that Trump's actions "clearly violate the Congress's exclusive power of the purse, which our Founders enshrined in the Constitution. The Congress will defend our constitutional authorities in the Congress, in the Courts, and in the public, using every remedy available." Trump fueled his critics by suggesting during his press conference that he didn't "need" to issue the declaration, as he also emphasized that the wall is necessary to block drugs, criminals and gang members from entering the United States. "I could do the wall over a longer period of time, I didn't need to do this, but I'd rather do it much faster," Trump said. Congress does have the

power to end a national emergency declaration from a president, but it would likely mean mustering a veto-proof majority in both chambers, a steep climb in the Republican-controlled Senate. Many Republicans are supportive of Trump's plans, including Florida U.S. Senator Rick Scott, who said he applauded the decision to put "country first" and use his authority to secure the border. "This is a reasoned, measured approach to fulfill his duty as Commander in Chief and keep our country safe, and I appreciate that he kept his word to not repurpose funds designated for disaster relief funding for Florida or Puerto Rico, which I've discussed with him at length. I look forwarding to working with him as Florida continues to rebuild following multiple devastating hurricanes," Scott said. However, Florida's senior U.S. Senator, Marco Rubio, took a dissenting view of Trump's action. He warned that the move could lead future presidents to pursue their own agendas by using emergency declarations. "We have a crisis at our southern border, but no crisis justifies violating the Constitution," Rubio said in a statement. Another president "may use this exact same tactic to impose the Green New Deal," he said, referring to Democrats' proposal to combat climate change." (Florida Phoenix, 2/15/19)

Criticisms Of Trump's Foreign Policy – China

In May 2018, Rubio Issued A Series Of Social Media Posts Contending The Trump Administration Was "Losing" In Its Negotiations With China. "The Florida senator has long tried to distinguish himself from other Republicans on the basis of his foreign policy and national security expertise. A member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Rubio has embraced traditionally hawkish GOP views on China, Russia and the position of the United States on the world stage. He also witnessed firsthand in the 2016 presidential campaign the power of a protectionist trade message, on which Trump ran successfully. Rubio tweeted Tuesday that China was "out-negotiating the administration & winning the trade talks right now." He added: "This is #NotWinning." On Monday, Rubio wrote that China "is winning the negotiations," using the hashtag "#Losing." He's warned that releasing restrictions on the Chinese firm, which is partly owned by the government, could put U.S. national security and intellectual property at risk. Rubio's allies say the tweets enable him to potentially grab Trump's attention. "That's how you get things done with this administration. When Marco tweets, Fox picks it up, and that's how the president sees it," said one informal adviser to Rubio, who spoke on the condition of anonymity to be more candid. But a Republican consultant close to the White House called the tweets "shortsighted." "What does Rubio get out of it? It will definitely get Trump's attention, and Trump will choose to smack him down. What's Rubio's endgame?" asked the consultant, who also spoke on the condition of anonymity to openly share an assessment. The White House did not respond to a request for comment on Rubio. Rebutting the criticism that he was being too soft on China, Trump said Tuesday, "For those who say maybe Trump is getting a little bit easy - ZTE, we closed it." Rubio is far from the only lawmaker who has been issuing rebukes or caution on China and ZTE. But the Florida senator has been one of the sharpest critics. "In the case of ZTE, I believe it's not so much a trade or economic issue as it is a national security issue," said Sen. Roy Blunt (R-Mo.), vice chairman of the Senate Republican Conference, offering a more measured take than Rubio has this week, but making the same general argument that the Floridian offered earlier this month. "And I'm sure we'll continue to have conversations about that." Where Rubio goes from here is not completely clear. He said Tuesday he plans to

"begin working on veto-proof congressional action." In the past, Rubio has moved back from a contentious position after first leaning in." (*The Washington Post*, 5/23/18)

Marco Rubio said Thursday that he disagrees with Donald Trump's suggestion that the United States shouldn't automatically come to the defense of fellow NATO members if they are attacked. "My hope is that if Donald is elected president, we can convince him to change his mind on that," Rubio said. "And, if he doesn't, we'll obviously have to oppose that because if Article 5 is in doubt, then the whole NATO alliance could collapse." Article 5 of the NATO Treaty lays out that an attack on one member amounts to an attack on all members, and that fellow NATO states must help the one that was struck. Trump's comments about NATO, delivered in a lengthy interview with The New York Times, were just his latest bombshell on the foreign policy front. The Republican presidential nominee has offered a radically different view

of U.S. engagement with the world than many in his own party hold — one that is defined primarily in economic terms and which does not hold treaties sacrosanct. In the Times interview, which came ahead of his speech Thursday night at the Republican National Convention, Trump also said he would not chide authoritarian leaders for cracking down on civil liberties or purging their political rivals; that he'd pull the U.S. out of the North American Free Trade Agreement if Canada and Mexico didn't agree to better terms; and that he may pull back U.S. troops deployed around the world, even from highly sensitive areas such as the Korean peninsula. "A bipartisan group of senators on Thursday reintroduced a bill that would prevent the president from withdrawing from the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) without Senate approval. The bill, introduced by four Democrats and four Republicans, would require two-thirds approval from the Senate for a president to suspend, terminate or withdraw the United States from NATO. "President Trump's repeated threats to withdraw from NATO are dangerous," Sen. Tim Kaine (D-Va.) said in a statement announcing the bill's reintroduction. "Our NATO allies have fought alongside our troops since World War II, yet President Trump disparages these nations and cozies up to our adversaries." The other co-sponsors are Sens. Cory Gardner (R-Colo.), Jack Reed (D-R.I.), Lindsey Graham (R-S.C.), Chris Coons (D-Del.), Marco Rubio (R-Fla.), Richard Blumenthal (D-Conn.) and Susan Collins (R-Maine). The same bill was introduced last year after Trump rattled NATO allies at a July summit in Brussels. The sponsors last time were Kaine, Gardner, Reed and the late Sen. John McCain (R-Ariz.). The reintroduction comes after a New York Times report that Trump told aides several times last year that he wants to withdraw from NATO. One of the occasions when Trump reportedly raised the issue of withdrawal was the lead-up to the NATO summit in July, when he told his top national security officials he did not see the point of the alliance and thought it was a drain on the United States. Right now, presidents are required to get the consent of the Senate to enter into treaties. Article 13 of the NATO treaty requires a country give a one-year "notice of denunciation" before it can exit NATO. In addition to requiring Senate approval for Trump to withdraw, the bill reintroduced Thursday would authorize the Senate Legal Counsel and the General Counsel of the House to challenge in court any attempt by the administration to withdraw from NATO without the Senate's consent. In statements touting the resolution, the co-sponsors stressed the importance of a strong NATO alliance. "NATO is more important than ever with Russia's growing subversive activities in the region and beyond," Rubio said. "It is critical to our national security and the security of our allies in Europe that the United States remain engaged and play an active role in NATO." (The Hill, 1/17/19)

Many believe Russia used hacking to meddle in the US election. Indeed, the president declared: "I strongly pressed President Putin twice about Russian meddling in our election. He vehemently denied it. I've already given my opinion...." It's not always been clear what that opinion is. Still, Trump added these words on the alleged hacking in another tweet: "Why did Obama do NOTHING when he had info before election?" It might seem discordant, therefore, that he also tweeted: "Putin & I discussed forming an impenetrable Cyber Security unit so that election hacking, & many other negative things, will be guarded..." The US security services seem to agree that Russia was responsible for the hacking. Why, then, would the US band together with Russia in order to create something "impenetrable" to prevent further hacking? Some might worry that Russia might find a way around that claimed impenetrability. Within minutes of Trump's tweetstorm, GOP Sen. Marco Rubio took to Twitter to express his opposition. "While reality & pragmatism requires that we engage Vladimir Putin, he will never be a trusted ally or a reliable constructive partner," he began. In 2018, Rubio Did Not Criticize Trump For Meeting With Putin In Finland But Was Critical Of How The Meeting Had Left "The Impression That My Intelligence Community Says One Thing, Putin Says Another, I'm Siding With Putin, And That Was A Bad Impression To Leave Behind." "Florida GOP Sen. Marco Rubio said Sunday that he supports President Donald Trump interacting with Russian President Vladimir Putin, but said Trump should be aware of Putin's human rights record and zero-sum approach to the US-Russia relationship. "I don't have a problem with the President of the United States interacting with the president of the Russian Federation," Rubio said. "They've got a lot of nuclear weapons, and so we do need to interact with them. That is separate from the question of whether or not we should be clear-eyed about who Putin is." Rubio, who made his comments in an interview on CNN's "State of the Union," said he regretted Trump's handling of his meeting with Putin in Helsinki, Finland, last week, where he appeared to side with Putin over the US intelligence community on alleged Russian efforts to influence the 2016 election. Trump clarified his remarks after returning to the United States, saying that after reviewing a transcript and video of his statements, he realized he had misspoken in a key sentence about Russian interference in the 2016 US election. "The sentence should have been: 'I don't see any reason why it wouldn't be Russia,' " he said. "Sort of a double negative." Referring to Trump's claim later that he meant to say "wouldn't" instead of "would" at the summit, Rubio said, "I'm glad he came back the next day and sort of walked that back." Rubio said he did not "know what to believe" about Trump's "would" versus "wouldn't" remarks, but he reiterated that he was glad Trump tried to walk back the remark. "I don't think it was a good moment for this administration, and I disagreed with it," Rubio said. "I know he came back the next day and said something to clean that up. And I'm glad that he did it, you know? I'm glad that he cleaned that up because it left, if you watched that video, it leaves the impression that my intelligence community says one thing, Putin says another, I'm siding with Putin, and that was a bad impression to leave behind." "The Senate voted to advance legislation blocking President Trump's plan to lift sanctions against three Russian companies despite an eleventh-hour effort by the administration to kill the bill. Senators voted 57-42 to begin debating the resolution, with only a simple majority needed to get over the initial hurdle. Though only a procedural vote, it's the latest foreign policy break between the Trump administration and Senate Republicans, who have been wary of his warmer rhetoric toward Moscow. It comes amid reports that the president has discussed pulling the United States out of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). "I do disapprove of the easing of the sanctions because I think it sends the wrong message to Russia and to the oligarch and close ally of Mr. Putin, Oleg Deripaska, who will in my judgement continue to maintain considerable [ownership] under the Treasury's plan," Sen. Susan Collins (R-Maine) told reporters. {mosads}In addition to Collins, GOP Sens. John Boozman (Ark.), Tom Cotton (Ark.), Steve Daines (Mont.) Cory Gardner (Colo.), Josh Hawley (Mo.), John Kennedy (La.), Martha McSally (Ariz.), Jerry Moran (Kan.), Marco Rubio (Fla.) and Ben Sasse (Neb.) voted to proceed to the resolution on Tuesday. The same senators also helped block a separate effort from Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) to pigeonhole the measure. The setback for the administration comes after it announced plans late last month to relax sanctions on the three businesses - Rusal, EN+ and EuroSibEnerg — connected to Oleg Deripaska, an oligarch with ties to Russian President Vladimir Putin. Under the 2017 sanctions bill, Democrats are able to force a vote on a resolution to block the administration from lifting the financial penalties. Treasury Secretary Steve Mnuchin led a lobbying effort to try to squelch concerns on Capitol Hill about the decision. He met with House Democrats last week and pitched Senate Republicans during a closed-door lunch Tuesday, hours before the vote. Mnuchin declined to say if he believed the administration had the votes to prevent the Senate from passing the resolution of disapproval but argued it shouldn't be a "political issue." But he added that the administration believed the sanctions against the three companies should be lifted because Deripaska's ownership in the entities has fallen below 50 percent. "We put together an agreement that we think meets the requirements of the laws and the regulations to do this," Mnuchin said. {mossecondads}Sen. Mike Crapo (R-Idaho) echoed Mnuchin in opposing the resolution to block the sanctions from being lifted. "I will vote 'no' today because this was a hard-fought negotiation resulting in one of the strongest agreements ever, which supports long-standing U.S. sanctions policy and foreign policy toward Russia," he

said. GOP leadership had been tight-lipped about whether they would be able to pull together the simple majority needed to sink the Democratic resolution, noting a swath of their members wanted to hear from Mnuchin. Sen. John Thune (R-S.D.) said "a lot of our members are anxious to ask questions" of the Trump administration before the vote. "Whether we get on it, is still kind of an open question, I think," Thune said. McConnell separately knocked Democrats for forcing the Russia vote even as they are blocking a GOP foreign policy bill as part of their shutdown strategy. "It was all just a farce. The Democratic leader doesn't actually mind doing other business because he now intends to bring a privileged and political stunt of a motion relating to the administration's use of sanctions against Russia," McConnell said. Democrats needed to win over at least four Republicans to advance the resolution, provided they could also unite their own caucus. They could still face a 60-vote threshold filibuster of the measure before a final passage vote, which would require them to get 13 GOP senators. Gardner, a member of the Foreign Relations Committee and a vulnerable 2020 incumbent, said on Tuesday that he would support the resolution. "I anticipate voting to overturn the decision by the administration," Gardner told reporters. Rubio added that while he "appreciated" the Treasury Department's effort, "for all intents and purposes between his shares, the independent shares that the Russian state owned bank control, and various other individual shareholders I still think he retains operational control ... In 2022, Rubio Said It Was "Unfortunate" Trump Was Using Language In Seeming Praise Of Putin And Called On Trump To Be More "Careful" With His Wording. "Donald Trump may have called Vladimir Putin "savvy" and a "genius," but to U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio those controversial comments are just sarcasm. Rubio, who continues to do multiple interviews a day on the Ukraine crisis, was asked Tuesday about Trump's comments made last week on a conservative talk radio program, where the former President seemed to extol the Russian leader and possible war criminal for smart moves in invading Ukraine last week. "I heard that interview, OK? I'm not going off the press reports. I heard the interview. I didn't hear him say that. I heard what I heard. A guy who was being sarcastic. He was saying, 'Oh, look at this guy, he's a genius, this, that and the other," Rubio said on CNBC's Squawk Box Tuesday. "The problem is people think Donald Trump is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. He doesn't talk like that! He doesn't talk like some analyst at a think tank. He doesn't talk like most people in Washington," Rubio added. "But right after he said that stuff — and I don't agree with all the stuff he's said about Russia — right after he said all that stuff that people are pointing to, he talked about how we need to impose crushing sanctions," Rubio continued. Despite advocating said crushing sanctions, the fact remains Trump offered a singularly dichotomous comparison of the American and Russian leaders in extended comments last week. "Well, what went wrong was a rigged election, and what went wrong is a candidate that shouldn't be there and a man that has no concept of what he's doing. I went in yesterday and there was a television screen, and I said, 'This is genius.' Putin declares a big portion of the Ukraine — of Ukraine — Putin declares it as independent. Oh, that's wonderful," Trump said on the Clay Travis and Buck Sexton program. Though the transcript includes the descriptor "(sarcastic)" after Trump's "Oh, that's wonderful," the sarcasm did not apply to the preceding statements. Trump has been very

clear in his position that the 2020 election was not legitimate, and he has routinely bashed Biden's competency as well. The former President continued in tones of admiration that didn't seem especially sarcastic. "So, Putin is now saying it's independent, a large section of Ukraine. I said, 'How smart is that?' And he's gonna go in and be a peacekeeper. That's the strongest peace force, we could use that on our southern border. That's the strongest peace force I've ever seen. There were more army tanks than I've ever seen. They're gonna keep peace all right. No, but think of it. Here's a guy who's very savvy. I know him very well. Very, very well," Trump said. "You gotta say that's pretty savvy. And you know what the response was from Biden? There was no response. They didn't have one for that. No, it's very sad. Very sad," Trump added. Rubio said it was "unfortunate" that Trump used that language, arguing that other Republicans used language praising Putin's savvy that was "twisted." Trump's Friday tweet set off widespread confusion when he appeared to announce that he would undo recently imposed sanctions on North Korea. "I have today ordered the withdrawal of those additional Sanctions!" After hours of uncertainty, administration officials insisted Trump had not been referring to the new sanctions on North Korea that his administration rolled out a day before. Instead, the officials claimed, the president was saying he was opposing not-yet-announced sanctions on Pyongyang. "We write today to express our concern regarding your Administration's consideration to withdraw U.S. forces from Syria," the senators wrote. "We believe that such action at this time is a premature and costly mistake that not only threatens the safety and security of the United States, but also emboldens ISIS, Bashar al Assad, Iran, and Russia." {mosads}"If you decide to follow through with your decision to pull our troops out of Syria, any remnants of ISIS in Syria will surely renew and embolden their efforts in the region," they continued. "However, ISIS is not the only threat. The brutal dictatorship of Bashar al Assad continues to weigh heavily upon the Syrian people, and we fear that a withdrawal of our troops may embolden Bashar al Assad to take further actions to solidify his power," they added. The senators also said they believed removing American presence from Syria would give a boost to "two other adversaries," Iran and Russia. "As you are aware, both Iran and Russia have used the Syrian conflict as a stage to magnify their influence in the region," the senators wrote. "Any sign of weakness perceived by Iran or Russia will only result in their increased presence in the region and a decrease in the trust of our partners and allies." The senators urged the president not to "repeat the same mistakes" made by administrations before his. "Your administration must not repeat the same mistakes that previous administrations have made and concede to these bad actors," they wrote. Trump declared victory against ISIS in Syria on Wednesday morning in a tweet after The Wall Street Journal, followed by The Washington Post, reported that he was preparing an immediate withdrawal of U.S. troops from Syria. "We have defeated ISIS in Syria, my only reason for being there during the Trump Presidency," the president tweeted. The White House confirmed in a statement Wednesday that the administration has "started returning United States troops home" but emphasized that coalition efforts in Syria would continue. It also doubled down on Trump's claim that "the United States has defeated the territorial caliphate." "The United States and our allies stand ready to re-engage at all levels to

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defend American interests whenever necessary, and we will continue to work together to deny radical Islamist terrorists territory, funding, support, and any means of infiltrating our borders," White House press secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders said in a statement. Senate Republicans, in a rare move, lashed out at Trump over the decision, with several lawmakers saying Congress received no warning of Trump's announcement. "It's a terrible decision," Rubio said earlier Wednesday. "I hope it can be entirely or at least partially reversed, or we're going to pay a big price for it in the years to come." Some Republican foreign policy hawks, like Rubio, have expressed discomfort with Tillerson's ties to Russia. Rubio sits on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, the panel that will have to approve the nominee before the full Senate can vote on Tillerson. Republicans will likely only hold a one-seat advantage on the committee, meaning that Democrats along with any single Republicans can possibly scuttle the nomination. "While Rex Tillerson is a respected businessman, I have serious concerns about his nomination," Rubio said in a statement. "The next secretary of state must be someone who views the world with moral clarity, is free of potential conflicts of interest, has a clear sense of America's interests, and will be a forceful advocate for America's foreign policy goals to the president, within the administration, and on the world stage. I look forward to learning more about his record and his views." Meanwhile, Trump critics and allies raced to define the international business executive. Sen. Amy Klobuchar, a Democrat from Minnesota, said the Republicans' initial reaction to Tillerson indicated there was "bipartisan concern" about his Russia ties. "I'm sure he has excellent business credential, but Donald Trump has chosen to put someone in as the nominee who does not have foreign policy or diplomatic experience and has these ties to Russia," she told CNN's Poppy Harlow on "New Day." And Rudy Giuliani, the close Trump associate who was passed over for the secretary of state posting, told CNN's Chris Cuomo that while he did not know Tillerson well, he was confident in him and would not say that he would be a better State candidate than

The bill, backed by the White House and a coalition of Republicans and Democrats, would retroactively reduce the disparity in prison sentences for people arrested for crack vs cocaine, gives judges more discretion at sentencing and eases the so-called "three strike rule" so repeat offenders are guaranteed 25 years of prison, not life. It also included more money for post-prison rehabilitation programs and halfway houses, and to study methods for reducing recidivism rates. Advocates for the bill, mainly criminal justice reform groups, lobbied hard for Rubio's support. But in a brief statement Tuesday night, Rubio vaguely said the bill "did not address serious concerns raised by local law enforcement, federal prosecutors and constituents in Florida about the sentencing reforms in this bill." "As I've said before, reforms to our criminal justice system are needed because 95 percent of federal inmates will be released at some point," he added. "Preparing them to integrate into society and find meaningful work is in our best interests, but we must always err on the side of public safety." He elaborated his opposition somewhat on Fox News radio yesterday. Here's what he said: "Let me just tell you that I think everyone is in favor of the first part of that bill which I've long supported as a separate bill and that is the idea that if someone is going to get out of jail anyway, they're scheduled to be out of jail in 10 years, 5 years or 15 years it behooves us, it's in our interest, to make sure that those people have training and those people have skills acquisition and the kinds of things that you need in order to be successful so you don't go back to jail. The second part of it is what's troubling and that is the incentive that they want to use to get these people to take these services is a reduction on the back end, a credit time, credit for the back end where they're able to serve part of the sentence in a halfway house or even in non-detention home probation. Whatever it might be. And then on the front end also reducing some mandatory sentences for certain cases. That's the part that I get nervous about because ultimately you're talking about some very bad people that have done some horrible things. We have to be very careful when we start walking in that direction. I think mandatory minimum sentences can sometimes have impacts that you look at it and say aren't fair, but we also have to recognize mandatory and minimum sentences have taken really terrible human beings off the streets for long periods of time. The best way to prevent a criminal from committing another crime is to not let them get out there...I'm not sure given the Amendments that are out there that they could ever get to the point where I'm 100% confident. I don't understand why we didn't just do this for a small select group of crimes and start from there and build it up as oppose to the reverse, but they've decided to take a huge bite of the apple. If I'm uncomfortable in the end I'm going to air on the side of public safety and vote against it."" (*Tampa Bay Times*, 12/19/18)


In The Aftermath Of The 2020 Election, Despite Initially Supporting Trump's Challenges, Rubio Shifted His Rhetoric And "Mostly Stopped Talking About The Election." "Rubio did both. When Trump first started to allege irregularities in the election and his legal team filed lawsuits aimed at overturning the results, Rubio huffily defended the then-president's right to raise such questions. After President Biden was declared the winner of the election, Rubio continued to defend Trump's assertions that something untoward had happened. By the evening of Nov. 7, when the race was called, Trump's team and his allies were already 0 for 9 in their legal challenges. A few days later, Rubio's approach to the issue shifted. The issue was less that there were perhaps "irregularities" to be uncovered but, instead, that concern over potential irregularities from Republican voters demanded redress. This was a clever rhetorical shift eventually used by his colleague, Sen. Ted Cruz (R-Tex.), in opposing the counting of electoral votes from several states. But it's also a hedge, allowing Rubio to stand alongside Trump while pointing in a slightly different direction. Rubio, like Cruz, is smart enough to know that by mid-November, there was no real evidence of fraud and that Trump's path to a second term in office had dried up. By Nov. 23, he'd referred to Biden as president-elect. But he's a politician and Trump had (and has) the enormous power of the Republican base. So Rubio tried to find a middle path. Over time, Rubio mostly stopped talking about the election. Trump was still tweeting out nonsensical claims about fraud, claims no more derived from reality than Greene's assertions about spacecraft starting wildfires in California. Rubio's response was not, as his tweet about Greene might suggest, to forcefully confront Trump's claims and expose them as false. His response instead was silence." (*Washington Post*, 2/3/21)

They're interrelated. I don't know why the Senate can't do Watergate style, Titanic style hearings. We could take testimony, subpoena records. It wouldn't change the outcome of this race, but it would give people the clarity, the answer. And by the way, the changes that we need to make. When I was in Florida in the legislature, I served on a task force after 2000 that made a bunch of changes to the mechanics of our elections, and I think we could do that for the country. I am really despised by an awful lot of people. And every once in a while I think to myself, they have good reason to despise me. Maybe I can communicate differently. First, we have to firmly say that this stuff's not acceptable. It just can't happen. I mean, I TUCKER CARLSON (02:54): Couldn't agree more. MARCO RUBIO (02:55): We look like the third world. I mean honestly, we look like the third. I mean, this is stuff that you see in another country. We've got 10 pot dictators out there lecturing us and mocking us in their Twitter feeds and online. So that stuff can't happen. The second thing I would make is at some point everyone's got to step back here and realize that this has been brewing and building for a while and it's all across the board. And there are real factors out there that are contributing not just to an erosion of confidence and trust in America, but some of the, you made a point and I caught the tail end of it, and it's absolutely right. There is no such thing as a country in which half of us are very happy and the other half is very unhappy. It can't work. None of us is going anywhere. So we're going to have to figure out a way to coexist. That's always been the challenge in America. A country that covers this vast continent such, so diverse. And that's what our system is about and that's what law and order is about, is allowing us to have those disputes without violence, but through passionate debate. TUCKER CARLSON (03:49): We are in it together whether we want to be or not, a lot of us don't want to be, but it's kind of not up to us. So I agree with that. Senator, great to see you. Rubio: "Some Of Them Unfortunately Were Adherence To A Conspiracy Theory And Others Got Caught Up In The Moment. The Result Was A National Embarrassment." "Sen. Marco Rubio is claiming some of the Trump supporters who barged into the Capitol building "got caught up in the moment." Rubio, whose staff told CBS4 News wasn't available for an interview, spoke about the assault on the Capitol on Fox News Thursday night. He condemned the violence, but also spoke about other President Trump supporters. "Ninety-nine percent of the people that went vesterday to Washington, DC, to protest and have their voices heard did not barge into the Capitol. But 1% of thousands of people is a lot of people," the senator said. "Some of them unfortunately were adherence to a conspiracy theory and others got caught up in the moment. The result was a national embarrassment." Wednesday night, the senator did not object to election results from certain states. "The senators who filed it said we know we are not going to win but we are making this point. People were led to believe that these challenges would prevail," Rubio said. The riot was fueled by conspiracy theories and false claims about the election. Even though Rubio didn't formally object, he believes there are still problems. "The practice of states going to court to friendly judges, changing the laws so they can get an advantage for Democrats and circumventing the legislature. All that needs to be addressed," he said. In another interview, Rubio compared the siege to that of unstable countries. "This is stuff you see in another country. We got tin pot dictators out there lecturing us and mocking us in their Twitter feeds and online. So that stuff can't happen," said Rubio. In a video message on Twitter, Rubio also called Wednesday's siege "one of the saddest days in our history," and a "national embarrassment."" (CBS News, 1/7/21)

In January 2021, Rubio Voted To Certify The 2020 Election Results For Arizona And Pennsylvania. "The Senate overwhelmingly turned aside challenges to President-elect Joe Biden's victory in the presidential election, guaranteeing the result will stand. The objection to the results in Arizona -- spearheaded by Rep. Paul Gosar and Sen. Ted Cruz -- was rejected 93-6 on Wednesday night. Among those voting against the challenge were Republican Florida Sens.

Marco Rubio and Rick Scott. The Republicans -- both allies of outgoing President Donald Trump, split, however, on a later vote over a legal challenge to Pennsylvania's election. After lawmakers reconvened following a siege on the US Capitol that stalled the proceedings, Scott was among the seven senators who voted to reject Pennsylvania's electors. Rubio, however, voted not to sustain any objections to states' electors. The legal challenge to Pennsylvania's election, ultimately rejected by the U.S. Supreme Court, hinged in part on a Pennsylvania Supreme Court ruling in favor of expanding allowable vote-by-mail ballots. Scott contends the move was "in defiance of (Pennsylvania) state law." "We simply cannot tolerate partisan political attempts to change the rules and tip the scales in our elections," Scott wrote in a statement Wednesday. Rubio and Scott were among a myriad of Florida Republicans who rushed to condemn Wednesday's violence in the halls of Congress. During his floor remarks, Rubio said the display made a mockery of U.S. politics and delighted of foreign adversaries. "China's laughing. They're loving this tonight. In Beijing, they're high-fiving because they point to this and say, 'This is proof that the future belongs to China. America's in decline.' Vladimir Putin? There's nothing that Vladimir Putin could come up with better than what happened here," Rubio said. "Makes us look like we're in total chaos and collapse." (News 4 Jax, 1/6/21)

Rubio Has Continued To Condemn January 6th Protestors And Support Their Prosecution: He Has Not Offered His Support For Trump's Call To Pardon Them. "Rubio has been sharply critical of the Democratic-led investigation into the Capitol Hill insurrection, and when asked if he believes Trump was responsible for the Capitol attack, he instead pinned the blame on those who broke into the building. "I think the people responsible for January 6 are ultimately the people that entered this building and broke the law," Rubio said in an interview. Rubio wouldn't say whether he agreed with Trump's call to pardon the rioters. "We have too many real problems for me to focus on hypothetical ones," he said. The Florida Republican also turned the screws on his opponent, even as he conceded there is "no doubt" she would raise more money than him in the highly expensive state. "She's a Pelosi puppet, votes with Pelosi 100% of the time, that's why she wants her in the Senate," Rubio said of Demings, referring to Speaker Nancy Pelosi. It's part of an effort by Rubio to position himself as the anti-Trump candidate in the GOP field, in hopes of consolidating the majority of Republican voters that national polling has shown oppose Trump as the GOP nominee. And the energetic crowds he saw as he campaigned across the South on Saturday and Sunday cheering at every Trump knock seemed to suggest Rubio was making some progress in that effort. Ken Hawley, a small businessman from Roanoke, Virginia who attended Rubio's rally Sunday, said while the attacks on Trump "probably should've been done sooner," he felt like it was resonating. "I hate it had to go that route [of attacking Trump], but I guess evidently he had to stand up for what's right, so I'm for it," he said. 



During the campaign, Rubio said that Trump was "dangerous" and that we must not hand "the nuclear codes of the United States to an erratic individual." Rubio doesn't seem to understand why this posture is untenable. Perhaps I can help. Stepping back, one of the challenges for Republicans with the controversy surrounding Judge Gonzalo Curiel is that the entire story is a trap of sorts from which there is no easy escape. If GOP officials acknowledge Trump's racism, they're effectively saying they want a racist in the White House. If they deny Trump's racism, they look like cowards. Some Republicans have criticized Rubio for "damaging the image of the Republican Party," as major Republican donor Fred Malek put it on MSNBC this week. Rubio's comments Wednesday were an implicit acknowledgment that the strategy didn't work, and he has since shifted away from personal attacks on Trump in favor of more policy-focused fare. But he insisted that it was "appropriate" to point out that Trump is "portraying himself as something he's not," a central focus of his argument against the GOP frontrunner." (NBC News, 3/9/16)

"If Donald is embarrassed about his tax returns, it's up to the voters to assess the facts." When asked about why only summaries were released, Cruz offered to disclose more information if other candidates did. "If Marco wants to release the complete thing for the recent years, I'm happy to do so as well and I would certainly encourage Donald Trump to do it, but we just did it to match what the other candidates are doing," Cruz told reporters. Rubio promised to release additional tax information in the future, but wanted to get the summaries out for the sake of time. "We'll do the rest too," Rubio told reporters. Criticisms Of Trump's Rhetoric On Race And Immigration

In 2015, Rubio Condemned Trump's Comments On Mexican Immigrants Noting "Trump's Comments Are Not Just Offensive And Inaccurate, But Also Divisive." "As controversy over his remarks about Mexican immigrants to the US continued to attract international condemnation and damage his commercial relationships, the White House hopeful Donald Trump drew heavy fire from Marco Rubio, a Hispanic member of the 14-strong GOP presidential field. On Friday, Rubio released a strongly worded statement which said: "Trump's comments are not just offensive and inaccurate, but also divisive." At the launch of his presidential campaign two weeks ago, Trump said: "[Mexico is] sending people that have lots of problems, and they are bringing those problems to us. They are bringing drugs, and bringing crime, and their rapists." The government of Mexico called the comments "prejudiced" and "absurd"; the Venezuelan president, Nicolás Maduro, said Trump was "mentally ill". Hispanic leaders in the US called on Republicans to condemn Trump's remarks. Many candidates have been cautious and relatively mild. The former Florida governor Jeb Bush, the frontrunner whose wife was born in Mexico and who speaks fluent Spanish, said Trump was "wrong" and added: "Maybe we'll have a chance to have an honest discussion about it onstage.' Trump, running second in some polls, is on course to appear onstage in the first Republican debate, which will be hosted in Cleveland by Fox on 6 August. Only the top 10 in the currently 14-strong GOP field will be allowed to participate. Rubio's statement continued: "Our next president needs to be someone who brings Americans together – not someone who continues to divide. Our broken

immigration system is something that needs to be solved, and comments like this move us further from – not closer to – a solution. We need leaders who offer serious solutions to secure our border and fix our broken immigration system." On Saturday, speaking on the Fox & Friends morning show, Trump attacked Rubio for being "very weak on immigration". He also said the former New York governor George Pataki, who has criticised his remarks, was "a sad figure" and "a terrible governor of New York" who had "zero numbers in the polls". Trump said he "respected" the Texas senator Ted Cruz, who has defended his remarks on immigration. On Friday, Trump lost the support of another US institution when the chairman of Nascar said the auto-racing series would not host its season-end awards at his Trump National Doral resort in Miami." 

Marco Rubio says his opponent Donald Trump is wrong to suggest President George W. Bush bears responsibility for the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks, arguing that the majority of the failures that led to the deadly attacks should be attributed to President Bill Clinton's administration instead. "It's just not true, it's wrong. What he said is just not true," Rubio told NewsMaxTV The Hard Line with Ed Berliner on Wednesday about Trump. "The truth is that President George W. Bush inherited all sorts of things from the Clinton administration, including intelligence agencies and others who weren't doing a very good job that were not sharing information across agencies. Including a government that under President Clinton had not taken seriously al-Qaeda and the threat that they posed," Rubio continued, citing the attack on the U.S.S. Cole, the first World Trade Center bombing, and other terrorist attacks. For the past week. Trump has discussed the Sept. 11, 2001 attacks, specifically noting Bush was president during the attacks and had responsibility for them. Trump went as far saying the Bush administration was warned by the CIA director the attack was coming and did nothing. Rubio noted Bush had been in office for less than a year when the attacks happened. "As a result, President Bush was only in office nine months when this happened, but that plot to conduct 9/11 and the steps that it took to bring it about --- those began well before he was even sworn into office," Rubio said. "It happened under the watch of President Clinton, in fact, the 9/11 Commission says that. If you look, all of their recommendations, many of them were about reversing mistakes that were made during the Clinton presidency." 

"Donald Trump made a drastic call on Monday for "a total and complete shutdown of Muslims entering the United States until our country's representatives can figure out what is going on." Trump's call comes one day after President Obama's address from the Oval Office in the aftermath of the San Bernardino, Calif., shootings that were carried out by an apparently self-radicalized married couple. The male shooter was an American citizen, born in the United States. His wife was born in Pakistan but was in the U.S. legally on a visa for fiancees. At a rally in Mount Pleasant, S.C., Monday evening, Trump read the statement to loud cheers from the crowd. He repeated claims that Muslims around the world believe violence against Americans is justified and that they believe American Muslims should be allowed to live under sharia law. Trump also addressed how people can be radicalized online, suggesting "maybe in certain areas closing that Internet up in some way." He also repeated calls for surveillance on mosques in the U.S. "Yes, we have to look at mosques, and we have to respect mosques," he said. "Because something is happening in there. Man, there's anger, and we have to know about it." His appearance was interrupted by protesters several times, including when he was explaining his latest proposal on keeping Muslims from entering the country. At that point, Trump referred to the person interrupting his rally by saying, "That's alright. He sounds like he's very exhausted." Trump, the wealthy real estate magnate who remains atop the GOP presidential field, has faced backlash for previous statements against Muslims and, before that, Hispanics. Following terrorist attacks in Paris, Trump endorsed the idea of a database to register Muslims in the U.S., saying he would "strongly consider" shutting down some mosques." (NPR, 12/7/15)



Skipping 2016 Republican National Convention Despite Endorsement

In May 2016, Rubio "Told Reporters He'll Not Only Vote For Trump, He'd Be Willing To Speak On His Behalf At The Republican National Convention In Cleveland." "In March, Marco Rubio dismissed Donald Trump as a "con artist" and "the most vulgar person ever to aspire to the presidency." This past week, the Florida senator told reporters he'll not only vote for Trump, he'd be willing to speak on his behalf at the Republican National Convention in Cleveland this summer. And he didn't rule out the possibility of serving in a Trump administration. Rubio said his apparent shift isn't that hard to understand. Supporting Trump as the presumptive GOP presidential nominee is an easy choice, he said, compared to the prospect of a Hillary Clinton victory at the polls in November. "Donald Trump will sign the repeal of Obamacare. She won't," Rubio told reporters Thursday. "I want the successor to Antonin Scalia on the Supreme Court to be a conservative. I believe that's the kind of judge that he'll appoint, and I know she won't. I want someone that will defend life. I know he will and she won't." Rubio said Trump earned his status as the GOP presumptive nominee at the ballot box. "He campaigned and the voters chose him," he said. "I respect that process. And so I'm going to support him. I'm going to vote for him." Social media, of course, won't let him off the hook that easily. "Rubio is truly a politician with no ideas, just a jumble of crap, ready to support any position, person, anything to help him get ahead," progressive radio talk show host Mike Signorile tweeted. "Stop Excusing Republicans Like Rubio For Supporting Trump Because Of A Stupid, Worthless Pledge," tweeted the conservative blog Red State, referring to Rubio's frequent promise during the campaign to get behind the eventual nominee. While Rubio was still a presidential contender, his rivalry with Trump featured highly charged, personal attacks. Trump, mocked the Florida senator as "Little Marco" and poked fun at his tendency to sweat on the

debate stage and drink lots of water. Rubio said Trump was unfit for the Oval Office, citing his inflammatory rhetoric, his past support for Democratic policies and his call for deporting undocumented immigrants. He also criticized Trump's physical features: "You know what they say about men with small hands ... You can't trust them." But Rubio also consistently said he would support whomever Republican voters nominated. And on Thursday, the Associated Press announced that Trump had captured the 1,237 delegates necessary to lock up the nomination. Despite the heated campaign, Rubio said it's time to move on. "We were competitors," he said of Trump. "I don't dislike him. I don't have any negative feelings about him personally. I disagree with a lot of his positions. That was well established during the campaign. (But) I also think he happens to be substantially better than Hillary Clinton." Al Cardenas, former head of the Florida Republicans will support Trump is a "work in progress." But he's not willing to judge Rubio. "It's a fairly quick turnaround in his conversion to becoming a supporter, but so be it," said Cardenas, former chairman of the American Conservative Union. "I'm still not there. I guess Marco figured out a way to get there."" (*USA Today*, 5/27/16)

• Previously, Rubio Had Been Reluctant To Endorse Trump In April 2016 And Had Been Signaling His Support For Ted Cruz After Dropping Out. "Florida Sen. Marco Rubio Tuesday endorsed Texas senator and Republican presidential candidate Ted Cruz for president, sort of. In one of his first interviews since dropping out of the presidential race, Rubio sat down with conservative host Mark Levin for a video podcast to discuss a wide range of issues, including who he believes should be president. "I hope that they'll nominate a conservative," Rubio said. "The only one [presidential candidate] that fits that criteria is Ted Cruz." Rubio also slammed the Republican debates and the way they were promoted as reality TV. "Who is going to get voted off the island this week?" Rubio said. Despite Rubio's half-hearted endorsement of the Texas senator, he has not completely withdrawn from the race. By suspending his campaign, the delegates he collected during the primary will still be bound to him on the first ballot of an open convention. Rubio also shouted down any speculation that he could be Donald Trump's vice presidential pick, after the billionaire said he would consider Rubio to be on his ticket "I'm not going to be the vice president," the Florida senator said." In July 2016, Rubio Noted He Would Not Be Attending The 2016 RNC Citing Campaign Events. "Marco Rubio, former rival to presumptive GOP nominee Donald Trump, will skip the Republican National Convention. "Marco had planned to go to the convention before he decided to seek re-election," Rubio Senate campaign spokeswoman Olivia Perez-Cubas said in a statement. "Since Marco got into the race late, he will be in Florida campaigning and meeting with voters instead of going to Ohio." Rubio has not distanced himself from his rebukes of Trump, including saying that he could not trust him with the nuclear codes. But he has reluctantly endorsed him, heralding him as better than the alternative, Hillary Clinton. Rubio had suggested when he entered the Senate race that this decision was coming. "I'll have to re-examine that now that I have a campaign to run in Florida. I'll have to spend a lot more time there and a lot less time -- I'll have a lot less free time," he told CNN's Manu Raju." If you're building a highway ... and you're going to be blocked by a hold-out - I think eminent domain for massive projects — for instance you're going to create massive jobs and you have somebody that's in the way, and you pay that person far more ... is fine," Trump told Fox News' Bret Baier Tuesday. Rubio "Double-Billed Taxpayers For Flights Paid For By A Political Group, In His Case The Republican Party Of Florida. When The Matter Was Brought To Rubio's Attention During His 2010 Senate Race, Rubio Told The Miami Herald And St. Petersburg Times That It Was An Error, And He Agreed To Pay Back The Party \$2,400." "Throughout the investigations, Rivera denied to reporters that he was the subject of the probes — even while a defense lawyer was negotiating with investigators on his behalf. A Florida judge in the civil ethics case concerning Rivera's finances determined that he "corruptly" failed to disclose his income and double-billed taxpayers for travel paid by a political committee associated with him. On March 5, the judge recommended a nearly \$58,000 fine against Rivera. The ethics commission will take up the case April 17, just as Rubio might be running for president. Like Rivera, Rubio also double-billed taxpayers for flights paid for by a political group, in his case the Republican Party of Florida. When the matter was brought to Rubio's attention during his 2010 Senate race, Rubio told The Miami Herald and St. Petersburg Times that it was an error, and he agreed to pay back the party \$2,400." In 2006, Rubio Was Reported To Have "Spent About \$400,000 In Tax Dollars To Remodel Offices And Build A Members-Only Dining Room So Lawmakers Rushing To Meetings Or In The Throes Of Negotiations Would Not Have To Leave The Capitol To Eat." "In August 2006, before he was officially sworn in as speaker, Rubio did order some renovations to the House. The Times/Herald story the Democrats linked to noted, "When Rubio became speaker, he spent about \$400,000 in tax dollars to remodel offices and build a members-only dining room so lawmakers rushing to meetings or in the throes of negotiations would not have to leave the Capitol to eat." The story was written before renovations were complete. The West Miami Republican said he sought to "decentralize the power of the speakership from being some imperial position to being more of a manager of the process." That involved moving some offices around inside the Capitol. He wanted the clerk and sergeant-at-arms moved from the fourth floor to the fifth floor, which pushed the House rules and calendar council to the 12th floor. Rubio also wanted the budget and policy committees together, and did have a members-only dining room built. A dining area just for lawmakers raised some eyebrows at the time. While the Capitol had a public cafeteria and separate snack bar, some critics wondered if a

private room was an excuse for lawmakers to meet away from where public records laws could find them. (The dining room was built, and is still there.)" (Politifact, 11/9/15)

- "In All, Rubio Ordered Almost \$560,000 In Renovations, According To Records From The Speaker's Office." "In all, Rubio ordered almost \$560,000 in renovations, according to records from the Speaker's Office. There were some rumblings that a state representative so opposed to taxes and government waste — in 2006 he published his book 100 Innovative Ideas for Florida's Future — shouldn't have been spending that kind of money. But is that a lot? Consider that his predecessor Allan Bense only spent \$1,500, according to the Times/Herald. On the high end, John Thrasher spent almost \$7 million in 1999 to renovate the House chamber, the speaker's office and the House office building. Former Speaker Daniel Webster spent about \$100,000 in 1997 to build a spiral staircase between the Speaker's Office and the Republican Majority Office. Rubio closed the staircase. The leader of the House Democrats at the time, Rep. Dan Gelber of Miami Beach, acknowledged the spending but didn't make it an issue, instead praising Rubio for including Democrats in new committee suites. Controversy - Misuse Of Florida GOP Credit Card

NOTE: In 2015, Trump Slammed Rubio Describing Him As A "A Disaster With His Credit Cards." "When asked about his numerous money woes at the last Republican debate, Marco Rubio dismissed them as "discredited attacks from Democrats and my political opponents." He then pivoted to discussing his humble upbringing and solidarity with middle-class Americans, which was enough to shake off moderator Becky Quick. Yet, the controversy surrounding Rubio's financial background — including his misuse of a Republican Party credit card, problems with his homes, and the liquidation of his retirement account — has only intensified in the past week. Donald Trump, who's yet to settle on the perfect Rubio insult, tried calling his rival "a disaster with his credit cards," and journalists from across the political spectrum noted that the criticism of Rubio's finances is far from "discredited." The pressure grew so intense that Rubio promised to release records from his time in Florida's House of Representatives "in the next few weeks." A Rubio campaign aide claimed, "our plan has always been to release these," but that's dubious since journalists have been trying to obtain the files for a decade." (New York Magazine, 11/6/15)

Rubio said at the time that most of the charges were for party-building reasons and that any personal charges rung up on the cards — such as the Georgia trip — were paid directly to the credit-card company by him. "For example, I pulled the wrong card from my wallet to pay for pavers," he disclosed for the first time two years ago in his autobiography, "American Son." Still, Rubio did acknowledge in his book that it was a book-keeping "disaster" for him and his wife to manage two political committees that raised about \$600,000 to help his bid for speaker." (His relatives sent checks that covered most of the reunion expenses, but the party wound up paying \$714.) "Surging Republican presidential candidate Marco Rubio sought to tamp down an escalating controversy Saturday, releasing previously secret records that detailed his use of a Florida Republican Party credit card for personal expenses. The records, which cover a 22-month period in 2005 and 2006, combined with previously disclosed credit card statements, show that Rubio charged more than \$22,000 in

personal expenses to the card while the account incurred more than \$1,700 in delinquency and late fees over a four-year period while he was in the Florida legislature. Rubio has maintained that he paid out of his pocket for any personal expenses on the American Express card, which he used from 2005 to 2008. But he has been beset with questions from political rivals about his spending, and been criticized by opponents for his years-long refusal to detail personal spending and release statements for most of the first two years he had the card. Rubio's handling of the card gained renewed attention this past week after attacks by his 2016 presidential rival Donald Trump, who accused the Florida senator of being a "disaster" with his card and living beyond his means. The attack underscored the extent to which the credit card issue, and, more broadly, Rubio's history of amassing high amounts of personal debt, stand out as potential political liabilities as his presidential campaign gains traction. In a news release Saturday, Rubio's campaign portrayed the issue as resolved, listing eight personal expenses from the newly released statements that it said Rubio had paid. Rubio Has Acknowledged That He Made A Mistake Using His Family's Personal Credit Cards For Political Expenses. "Rubio's management of campaign cash also seemed chaotic. He named his wife, Jeanette, as treasurer of one of the committees. "That decision proved to be a disaster," Rubio wrote. When I received my statement I would spend hours trying to figure out which were political, and which were personal." Controversy – Failure To Make Proper Filings For PACSs

Rubio And His Wife Are Known To Have Established Two Nonprofit PAC Entities FCLC And FCLG, Which Were Both Dissolved By Florida Officials For Failure To File Annual Report Despite Having Collected Thousands Of Dollars In Contributions. "During its brief existence, FCLC raised \$228,350, of which roughly \$35,000 disappeared into thin air, according to the entity's own tax returns. Its largest donor by far was a scandal-plagued PAC called OPH (\$50,000) but Democratic super-lobbyist Ron Book also gave generously. Bridget Nocco, Mr.

Rubio's lobbyist pal, was paid nearly \$26,000 by the PAC for salary and consulting services, according to its nonprofit tax filings with the IRS. Shortly before its demise FCLC made two payments to a super PAC (which are known as 527s, based on the IRS rule that allows them) with a similar name, Floridians for Conservative Leadership in Government (FCLG). The latter was formed in 2004 with Marco Rubio as its president and registered agent, his wife as the VP and Urquiola as its treasurer. In any event, the State of Florida dissolved Mr. Rubio's 527 in 2006 because—you guessed it—it failed to file an annual report. Many of the companies and individuals that donated to the two groups had major business interests before the Florida Legislature and the two entities had overlapping donors, such as super-lobbyist Mr. Book, and payees, such as Bridget Nocco, who netted \$90,062 from the 527 for salary and consulting services. Another notable recipient of cash from Mr. Rubio's 527 was a company called Servicarga, which in 2004 received \$3,500, which it billed for "courier services." What's curious here is that Mr. Rubio's wife owned Servicarga and that, according to IRS returns and other documents, the company stopped operating in 1997." (Observer, 1/18/16)

Rubio Is Known To Have Owned A House With Disgraced Former Congressman David Rivera That Was Later Subjected To Foreclosure Proceedings; The House, Purchased In 2005, Was Put Up For Sale In 2015. "The brick-fronted tract house with a satellite dish and a yellow fire hydrant in front looks like many middle-class homes in Florida's capital, except for the two names on the deed. Marco Rubio: U.S. senator and would-be presidential candidate. David Rivera: Scandal-plagued former congressman under investigation in a federal campaignfinance probe. In many ways, it has been a house of horrors for Rubio, a financial and political liability heading into the 2016 election. While he and Rivera were state legislators, they paid way too much for it in 2005, only to see foreclosure proceedings embarrassingly initiated against them during Rubio's 2010 Senate race. At another point, a tropical storm flooded the entire neighborhood so badly that neighbors used canoes to get around. Now, the three-bedroom property stands as a stubborn symbol of both a politically problematic friendship and lingering questions about Rubio's personal finances, which dogged him on the campaign trail in 2010 and may do so again. The friendship has frayed in recent years, friends say, as the fortunes of Rubio, 43, and Rivera, 49, have diverged. Last week, they put the 1,228-square-foot house up for sale. The list price is \$125,000 - \$10,000 less than what the two men paid for it a decade ago. But chances are the home won't sell before April, when Rubio says he'll decide whether to seek the presidency. Rubio's critics are waiting to make hay of any revelations that may come of the federal investigation of Rivera and to point to their status as roommates during the years when Rivera allegedly engaged in illegal campaign activities. "This will be an issue," declared Craig Smith, a top adviser for the Ready for Hillary super PAC, echoing the views of many supporters and detractors alike. "When you run for president, voters and the press have an insatiable appetite for people's histories, what they've done, who they are. ... The two men characterized the dispute as a disagreement with the bank over the interest-only mortgage they had on the property. News of the foreclosure rocked Rubio on the campaign trail. Rivera, running for his first and only successful congressional bid, quickly hand-delivered a \$9,525 cashier's check to cover missed payments and fees. "There is no foreclosure," Rivera told the St. Petersburg Times then. "The mortgage is paid and up to date." Rubio was infuriated, friends say. Rubio has handled paying the mortgage ever since. He and Rivera got a mutual friend to help manage the property and find a tenant later that year, a single mother who recently moved out. The tenant declined to speak with POLITICO, but she said in a written statement that Rubio and his wife "have been very gracious and understanding of my circumstances." She called them "extraordinary landlords" and expressed her "deep appreciation ... for all that you've done." Neighbors say they had little idea about the drama surrounding the house or the ambitions of Rubio. Caridad Tamayo, who has lived in the neighborhood for five years, said she didn't recognize Rubio's name. Neighbor Richard Linck said he knew about Rubio but had "no idea" he was planning to run for president. "The reality is Marco wants to sell this house because it's horrible," one friend said. "It's been nothing but trouble for him. There was the foreclosure. There was a flood that made it tough to get to without a canoe at one point. And there's David. Marco won't turn his back on David. But we all wish he would." Rubio has kept his distance more and more from Rivera as Rubio became a serious, national figure while Rivera lost his congressional seat and reeled from multiple scandals." (Politico, 3/16/15)



"When Marco was hired at Broad and Cassel, he was in line to become the first Cuban American House speaker in Florida history," Harris added. "That gave him an enormous profile, along with some very marketable experiences and qualifications." Although the annual session plus year-round committee meet-ings and constituent work often add up to full-time work, many state lawmakers maintain private careers as lawyers or business owners or in other jobs." • Rubio "Was Brought On Board Largely To Help The Firm Diversify Its Mostly White, Male Miami Office." "Broad and Cassel was known for its real estate, litigation and government relations practice. But Rubio's role, aides said, was non-political. He was prevented by law from lobbying. The firm's offer letter to Rubio, dated June 18, 2004, forbade him to introduce legislation that would affect the firm or its clients. The letter also mandated, in accordance with state laws, that Rubio's salary would not include any money the firm received from lobbying. Instead, the son of Cuban immigrants was brought on board largely to help the firm diversify its mostly white, male Miami office. "Because of my political obligations it was understood that my primary responsibility would not be to handle individual clients," Rubio said in a written response to questions from The Post. Previously, Rubio Is Known To Have Worked At The Firm Becker & Poliakoff Earning \$93,000 A Year While Serving In The Florida House. "Marco Rubio was 28 when he was elected to the Florida legislature. He was about to become a father and was struggling to balance the financial demands of a growing family with his political aspirations. About a year and a half after taking his seat in Florida's part-time legislature, Rubio got a financial boost, accepting a job at the Miami law firm Becker & Poliakoff for \$93,000 a year. Although Rubio was a lawyer by training, his colleagues quickly recognized the advantage of having a charismatic, high-energy politician in the office. "It was as simple as saying, 'Marco, who should I call in this place about this issue?' " recalled Perry Adair, a real estate lawyer in charge of the firm's Miami office, where Rubio worked from 2001 to 2004. "Marco knew the staff everywhere. He had been in politics all his life.'" Former Florida Republican Party Chair Jim Greer Claimed Emails Acquired By An Opposition Researcher Showed "An Indication That Rubio Had An Affair" With "A Woman Who Had Worked In His Legislative Office When He Was Speaker Of The House." "A book about Greer called The Chairman: The Rise and Betrayal of Jim Greer has some juicy anecdotes about Mr. Rubio and David Rivera, Mr. Rubio's one-time best friend and roommate as well as a noted womanizer and former Florida State House member and federal congressman. (A number of other top officials at the U.S. Century Bank were major political supporters of Mr. Rubio's.) A passage from the book reads: "There was an indication that Rubio had an affair," said Greer. A woman who had worked in his legislative office when he was Speaker of the House abruptly left and got a job at Florida International University as a part-time professor. Emails she had sent him through her college account had become public record. Our opposition research specialist said the emails included things like, "I have to talk to you right now. I can't take this anymore. Why aren't you returning my calls?" David Rivera Is Known To Have Been One Of Rubio's "Closest Friends And Allies." "Rubio says he has no idea what he'll do in 2016—run for re-election, "run for something else" or return to the private sector. Some insiders remain dubious that he'll seek the "something else" route so early in his career. He's had some awkward personal-finance issues. One of his closest friends and allies, former Congressman David Rivera, is embroiled in a corruption scandal. And his political mentor, Jeb Bush, might seek the White House himself. Their friends assume Rubio would defer in that case, though it was curious that when I asked him whether he had discussed his immigration work with Bush, who has a book coming out on the subject, he said he sent a text message." "The brick-fronted tract house with a satellite dish and a yellow fire hydrant in front looks like many middle-class homes in Florida's capital, except for the two names on the deed. Marco Rubio: U.S. senator and would-be presidential candidate. David Rivera: Scandal-plagued former congressman under investigation in a federal campaign-finance probe. In many ways, it has been a house of horrors for Rubio, a financial and political liability heading into the 2016 election. While he and Rivera were state legislators, they paid way too much for it in 2005, only to see foreclosure proceedings embarrassingly initiated against them during Rubio's 2010 Senate race. At another point, a tropical storm flooded the entire neighborhood so badly that neighbors used canoes to get around. Now, the three-bedroom property stands as a stubborn symbol of both a

politically problematic friendship and lingering questions about Rubio's personal finances, which dogged him on the campaign trail in 2010 and may do so again. The friendship has frayed in recent years, friends say, as the fortunes of Rubio, 43, and Rivera, 49, have diverged. Last week, they put the 1,228-square-foot house up for sale. The list price is \$125,000 — \$10,000 less than what the two men paid for it a decade ago. But chances are the home won't sell before April, when Rubio says he'll decide whether to seek the presidency. Rubio's critics are waiting to make hay of any revelations that may come of the federal investigation of Rivera and to point to their status as roommates during the years when Rivera allegedly engaged in illegal campaign activities. "This will be an issue," declared Craig Smith, a top adviser for the Ready for Hillary super PAC, echoing the views of many supporters and detractors alike. "When you run for president, voters and the press have an insatiable appetite for people's histories, what they've done, who they are. ... It raises questions about his judgment, about the kind of people he would bring with him into government, into a campaign."" (*Politico*, 3/16/15)

Rubio, A Friend Of Rivera's Since 1992, "Bought The Tallahassee Home For • Lodging When The Two Up-And-Coming Legislators Served Together In The Florida House." "Rubio declined to comment for this story or about his relationship with Rivera, with whom he bought the Tallahassee home for lodging when the two up-andcoming legislators served together in the Florida House. A Rubio spokesman and Rivera both denied that the sale of the house had any political motivations. The home's tenant since 2010 recently moved out, and they've been trying to sell the house, unsuccessfully, for years. Asked about the status of Rubio's relationship with Rivera, which dates to 1992, when both men worked for the congressional campaign of Lincoln Diaz-Balart, spokesman Alex Burgos said in a written statement: "David Rivera is an old friend of Senator Rubio's. His hope is that Mr. Rivera can put his recent troubles behind him and go on with his life." But interviews with more than a dozen friends and political insiders who have known the two for years suggest that the story is more complicated, and that Rubio is stuck between his sense of loyalty to his friend and his need to move on with his life and political career. Three people close to Rubio say he has referred to Rivera on multiple occasions as "Nixonian." And yet others describe a brotherly closeness that became strained only as Rivera weathered state and federal investigations into his finances, a related state ethics case that recently resulted in a proposed \$58,000 fine, and the more serious campaign-finance scandal that erupted in 2012. At the time, Rubio and Rivera shared a rental home in Washington for the two years they both served in Congress. "Marco wants little to do with David, and you can't blame him - who would want that guy by their side as they're running for president?" said Ana Alliegro, Rivera's former girlfriend, who pleaded guilty last year to campaign-finance violations and making false statements in the most recent federal case involving Rivera. She recently gave grand-jury testimony against Rivera." (Politico, 3/16/15)

Rubio Supported Rivera's 2012 Reelection Campaign, Which Was Marred By Later Allegations Of Impropriety. "Alliegro confirmed she told prosecutors that Rivera was the source of about \$81,000 in unreported cash that was used to fund the 2012 campaign of a political unknown who was running in the Democratic primary against Joe Garcia, a formidable contender preparing to square off against the Republican Rivera in the general election. Garcia prevailed against the candidate to whom Rivera allegedly funneled the money, Justin Sternad, who later pleaded guilty to federal charges of breaking campaign finance laws and filing false campaign reports. That November, Garcia beat Rivera. Days before the election, Rubio recorded a robocall touting Rivera. Rubio also, however, made similar calls for other Republican candidates. In open court and at the urging of a judge, a federal prosecutor has twice labeled Rivera as an alleged criminal conspirator in the case. But Rivera doesn't just deny wrongdoing — he claims he's not the subject of a probe." (*Politico*, 3/16/15)

- Rubio Decided To Support Rivera's 2012 Reelection Despite Rivera Having **Recently Been Investigated By Federal And State Authorities For Ethics And Legal Violations.** "In Rivera's ethics case, investigators with the Florida Commission on Ethics and the Florida Department of Law Enforcement testified before an administrative law judge at a hearing that records showed Rivera was essentially living off political committee funds and failing to disclose the money as income. Rivera also arranged a contract worth \$1 million between a Miami dog track and a company owned by his mother to lead a 2008 election campaign to legalize slot machine gambling in Miami-Dade County. Rivera later acknowledged accepting at least \$132,000 as part of the arrangement. But he didn't list the money on his state financial disclosure forms. At the time, Rivera told reporters he wasn't making "a penny" off the gambling referendum. And as Rivera was getting money from the company that became Magic City Casino in 2008, Rubio opposed expanding gambling while serving as House speaker. Later, after the casino deal came to light, Rivera claimed in his ethics case defense that the gambling money was a "contingent liability loan" that wasn't reportable "income." The Internal Revenue Service, which examined the payments and his finances along with the FBI, opted not to charge him after interviewing a handful of witnesses. The Florida Department of Law Enforcement also examined his finances and drafted a 52-count complaint. But the Miami-Dade State Attorney's Office decided in late 2011 not to charge Rivera because of ambiguities in the state's ethics laws and, in some matters, the statute of limitations. Throughout the investigations, Rivera denied to reporters that he was the subject of the probes — even while a defense lawyer was negotiating with investigators on his behalf." (Politico, 3/16/15)

"Former Republican Congressman David Rivera has gone to a federal appeals court after being hit with a \$456,000 fine in a case involving allegations he secretly funneled money to try to undermine a Democratic rival. Rivera, of Miami, filed a notice last week that is a first step in asking the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to take up the case. The move came after U.S. District Judge Marcia Cooke sided with the Federal Election Commission and ordered the \$456,000 fine. The long-running case stems from Rivera's 2012 campaign for re-election to Congress. Rivera faced a challenge from Democrat Joe Garcia and was alleged to have provided money to help Justin Sternad, a candidate in the Democratic primary. Garcia ultimately won the primary and defeated Rivera. The Federal Election Commission alleged that Rivera, who also is a former member of the Florida House, violated a law that bars contributions made in the names of other people. "The FEC alleges that during the Democratic primary, Rivera executed a scheme to secretly provide funds to Sternad's campaign to weaken Garcia, who was likely to be Rivera's general election opponent," Cooke wrote in a Feb. 23 summary judgment in favor of the federal agency. "In April 2012, Rivera initiated the scheme when he met with his associate, Ana Sol Alliegro and directed her to approach Sternad with an offer to provide financial support to his primary campaign. Alliegro did so, and Sternad accepted the offer. At Rivera's supposed direction, Alliegro then spent the next few months acting as an intermediary, transmitting funds to Sternad, the Sternad (political) committee and the vendors providing services to that committee." In granting summary judgment, Cooke refuted Rivera's arguments that testimony by Alliegro should be rejected. The South Florida federal judge pointed, in part, to testimony from other people, including Sternad." (CBS News, 5/5/22)

In December 2022, Rivera Was Arrested "By Federal Authorities In Connection With An Ongoing Probe Into His Work With Venezuela's Authoritarian Regime." "Former Florida Rep. David Rivera, who had successfully outflanked a series of investigations during his lengthy political and consulting career, was arrested Monday by federal authorities in connection with an ongoing probe into his work with Venezuela's authoritarian regime. Rivera, who represented a Miami-area district from 2011 to 2013, was detained in Georgia on Wednesday in connection with a Miami grand jury indictment issued last month. "It was the purpose of the conspiracy for the defendants to unlawfully enrich themselves by engaging in political activities in the United States on behalf of the government of Venezuela, and by representing the interests of the government of Venezuela before officials of the of the United States government and in an effort to influence United States foreign policy," states the 34-page indictment. Before his brief stint in Congress, Rivera served as powerful budget chief while in the Legislature. He was an ally of Sen. Marco Rubio (R- Fla.), who once shared a house with him in Tallahassee. Rivera maintained his ties with various GOP officials after he left office and attended the recent one-day session where the Florida Legislature picked new leaders. Rivera's defense attorney Simon Ferro did not return a call requesting comment." (*Politico*, 12/5/22)

Any work Rivera did for the Petróleos de Venezuela, S.A. would require him to register as a foreign agent. The indictment states that beginning in 2017 — shortly after former President Donald Trump took office — Rivera and Nuhfer were sought out to help lobby politicians on behalf of Venezuela and gain political support to normalize relations between the U.S. and the country led by strongman Nicolas Maduro. As part of the effort to curry favor on behalf of Venezuela, the indictment references meetings that were arranged with a U.S. congressman from Texas as well as a U.S. senator from Florida. Previous reports have already identified the congressman as former Rep. Pete Sessions. The indictment does not state the name of the senator, but Rubio played a pivotal role in advising the Trump administration over its dealings with Latin American countries." (Politico, 12/5/22)

In December 2022, "Sen. Marco Rubio Acknowledged On Tuesday Through A Spokesperson That He Met With Indicted Ex-Rep. David Rivera To Discuss A Potential Deal To Normalize Relations Between The United States And Venezuela — But Didn't Know That His One-Time Friend And Long-Time Political Ally Was Working On Behalf Of Strongman Nicolás Maduro." "Sen. Marco Rubio acknowledged on Tuesday through a spokesperson that he met with indicted ex-Rep. David Rivera to discuss a potential deal to normalize relations between the United States and Venezuela - but didn't know that his onetime friend and long-time political ally was working on behalf of strongman Nicolás Maduro. Rubio's dealings with Rivera emerged Monday night after federal authorities arrested and charged the former Miami lawmaker with eight criminal counts, including money laundering, conspiracy and failing to register as a foreign agent for work allegedly connected to the Maduro regime. An unsealed indictment states that Rivera and an unnamed U.S. senator from Florida met in July 2017 in Washington to discuss a possible deal with Maduro in which the Venezuelan leader would agree to "hold free and fair elections in Venezuela." The senator was not identified by name, but Rivera and Rubio have known each other for years and once owned a house together in Tallahassee. Rivera and the senator first met to discuss Venezuela on July 9, 2017 at a private residence in D.C., according to the indictment The pair gathered three days later at a Washington hotel with several others, including an unidentified Venezuelan politician who attended the meeting by telephone, according to the indictment. Rubio has been a harsh critic of Venezuela and Maduro and was seen as influential in pressing the Trump administration to keep

sanctions in place. Federal authorities have not accused Rubio of any wrongdoing and he was not identified by name in the indictment. In an emailed statement, however, a spokesperson for Rubio said that "during a July 2017 meeting, Mr. Rivera told Senator Rubio that close Maduro associate Raul Gorrín wanted to personally deliver a letter from the dictator to the President outlining an agreement to hold free and fair elections and exit power. A few days later Gorrin came to a brief meeting in Washington, but produced no such letter and failed to even mention the possibility of any such deal." (*Politico*, 12/6/22)

Rubio Has Been Linked To Alan Mendelsohn, a GOP lobbyist and fundraiser, Who Donated \$50,000 To Rubio's Campaign In 2003; Mendelsohn Had Raised \$1.5 Million From Businessman Joel Steinger, Founder And CEO Of Mutual Benefits Corp. – A \$1.2 Billion Ponzi Scheme That Targeted Elderly South Florida Retirees And Helped Launder South American Drug Cartel Money. "Mr. Rivera and Mr. Rubio were also involved in another dubious deal in the mid-2000s that is breathtakingly brazen even by Florida's promiscuous standards and which was partially unraveled over many years by a joint FBI/DEA task force. One of the key figures in the scam was Alan Mendelsohn, a GOP lobbyist and fundraiser who raised about \$2 million that he funneled to numerous Florida politicians or used for his personal benefit, according to his subsequent indictment. Of that amount about \$1.5 million came from a crooked businessman named Joel Steinger. Steinger was the founder and CEO of a private company called Mutual Benefits Corp., through which he pulled off a \$1.2 billion Ponzi scheme that targeted elderly South Florida retirees and members of the state's gay community. Mutual Benefits Corp. also helped a South American drug cartel launder money, evidence compiled by a the FBI/DEA task force showed. Mendelsohn funneled money to politicians through various political entities, including a political committee he set up called The Ophthalmology PAC. Steinger gave him money in the hopes of winning political support for a bill that would exempt Mutual Benefits Corp. from state regulation. Mendelsohn also got money to pass along to politicians from a few other dubious players, including a credit counseling firm and gambling companies. Mr. Rubio and Mr. Rivera each got \$50,000, easily ranking them among the biggest recipients of Ophthalmology PAC cash. Mr. Rubio received his payout from Mendelsohn in December of 2003 through a PAC he set up called Floridians for Conservative Leadership. The Ophthalmology PAC was by far the biggest donor to Floridians for Conservative Leadership. Mr. Rubio used the latter to pay for, among other things, courier services performed by his wife, sister and nephews; to cover the costs of meals and lodging that were allegedly campaign-related; and to pay a close friend and lobbyist who raised money for him for what was described as political consulting work." A PAC associated with Kim Berfield, then Republican chairwoman of the House insurance committee got \$10,000 and a PAC for future Senate leader Ken Pruitt received \$2,500. All told, Mendelsohn, his family and his major political committee contributed at least \$708,000 to more than 275 legislators, legislative candidates and state causes, according to the The Tampa Bay Times. The senator, Democrat Skip Campbell, later said that legislators overwhelmingly voted for the bill for one reason only: political contributions. "It was clear to me that this was a big Ponzi scheme and would bite a lot of people," he told the Sun-Sentinel. "In the 1980s, Joel Steinger and several relatives ran Tara Securities Group, a boiler room that ripped off a boatload of naive investors. (Martin Scorcese's film The Wolf of Wall Street perfectly captures the boiler room, a term used to describe a fraud by which a scammer rents an impressive-looking office, lines up employees to cold call potential investors, and suckers them into putting their savings into financial schemes promising big returns that never materialize.) The Securities and Exchange Commission shut down Tara Securities Group, banned Steinger from commodities trading and, hit him with a paltry civil fine of \$30,000. Steinger had a sleazy past even before Tara Securities. Back in 1979, the Commodities Futures Trading Commission barred him from acting as a commodity trading professional for his role in another scam that involved a company called Crown Colony Commodity Options Ltd., according to his indictment and several news accounts. Steinger's colorful career, convictions and mob connections, can be reviewed in this article. But Steinger still had to make a living so in 1994 he started a new private company, Mutual Benefits Corp., which was in the Viaticals business. That's the term — derived from a Latin word meaning "provisions for a long journey" — for the practice of buying life insurance policies at a steeply discounted price from desperate people who are about to die. Steiner quickly figured out that a great place to find dying people who would sell their life insurance policies cheap was the AIDS-plagued gay community in South Florida. So he hooked up with some clinics and doctors and used them to pitch terminally ill HIV patients who were desperate for quick money and would sell their life insurance policies for pennies on the dollar. To ratchet up profits even more Steinger retained a doctor, Clark Mitchell, to diagnose people as being terminally ill when they were in fact perfectly healthy. Of course, the investors in Mutual Benefits Corp. started getting angry when people who sold the firm their life insurance policies didn't die because that meant they didn't get the huge returns Steinger promised them (up to 72 percent, according to this story). Investors complained to the Florida Attorney General, who began looking into the situation, which alarmed Steinger." (Observer, 2/25/16)

Rubio Continued To Be Associated With Mendelsohn, Who Helped Kick Off Rubio's Senate Campaign, Through 2009; "In 2011 Mendelsohn Was Sentenced To Three Years In Prison For Using "His Political Connections To Assist Clients In Obtaining And Defeating Legislation," According To His Indictment." "As late as 2009, Mendelsohn was one of Mr. Rubio's leading fundraisers and that year hosted an event at his home to kick off Mr. Rubio's run for a U.S. Senate seat. That May the Broward Palm Beach New Times reported that Mendelsohn had resigned from his post as treasurer of yet another PAC he had created amid "rampant speculation" about the extent of his ties to Steinger. Mr. Rubio "doesn't seem very concerned about any political fallout that may come as more facts emerge about Mr. Mendelsohn in the Steinger case," the newspaper reported. "Either Rubio knows something the rest of us don't or he doesn't mind risking his reputation for some serious campaign dough." In 2011 Mendelsohn was sentenced to three years in prison for using "his political connections to assist clients in obtaining and defeating legislation," according to his indictment. During his sentencing, Judge William Zloch, said the disgraced lobbyist's misconduct was like a "cancer" with "tentacles" that hindered good government across the state, according to the Tampa Bay Times. In 2007, Rubio Netted A \$205,000 Profit On A Florida Home He Sold To Nora Cereceda, Whose Son Mark Cereceda Was A Chiropractor With A Lengthy Criminal Record; "Shortly After Mr. Rubio Sold The House, He Did A 180-Degree Rotation On A Key Insurance Bill For Which Dr. Cereceda Had Been Lobbying." "Meanwhile, Mr. Rubio was making more money on two highly suspicious real estate deals. In the first, Mr. Rubio had a little help from Mark Cereceda, a chiropractor with a lengthy rap sheet. I should note here that after Dr. Cereceda lent a financial hand, Mr. Rubio flipped his position on a key issue of great import to the chiropractor. Here are the key details: In 2003, Mr. Rubio bought his first house (at 6247 14th Street SW in West Miami) for \$175,000, putting zero money down. He put it up for sale in 2005 but had difficulty selling it because of a weak local real estate market. But gracias a Dios, Dr. Cereceda's mama, Nora Cereceda (now deceased), bought Mr. Rubio's house in 2007 for \$380,000 cash, netting Mr. Rubio a profit of about \$205,000. Que suerte! Shortly after Mr. Rubio sold the house, he did a 180-degree rotation on a key insurance bill for which Dr. Cereceda had been lobbying. Whereas he had previously been an outspoken opponent of the measure-indeed, he was described in one local press item at the time as "the main holdout"-he ended up voting for the legislation, which required Florida drivers to purchase \$10,000 worth of personal injury Insurance." Two Years Later, He Was Arrested For Felony Battery And Also For Disorderly Conduct, And Then In 2013 He Was Busted For Running An Illegal Political **Contribution Scheme By Which He Ordered His Employees To Contribute To Political** Campaigns In Their Names And Then He And His Relatives Reimbursed Them." "Dr. Cereceda has a lengthy arrest record both prior to and after his mama bought Mr. Rubio's house. In 2003, he was arrested on charges of Aggravated Assault With A Deadly Weapon. Two years later, he was arrested for Felony Battery and also for Disorderly Conduct, and then in 2013 he was busted for running an illegal political contribution scheme by which he ordered his employees to contribute to political campaigns in their names and then he and his relatives reimbursed them. The doctor got off light. He was sentenced to house arrest and given probation. Dr. Cereceda has been a big donor to Ana Maria Pando, a disgraced former Hialeah branch county court judge, who wrote a letter to state authorities—on official letterhead—asking that Dr. Cereceda's company be reinstated after it got into some legal trouble. Pando was later convicted for taking a bribe from Dr. Cereceda, who ratted her out." (Observer, 1/18/16)

Controversial Associations – Esteban Bovo

"Last year Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Washington (CREW) filed a complaint with the IRS against Conservative Solutions Project, a political organization spending millions of dollars on pro-Rubio ads while masquerading as a "social welfare" non-profit. It also filed a criminal complaint against Mr. Rubio's national finance chairman, Wayne Berman, accusing him of lying to investigators and apparently taking more than a million dollars from a non-profit. And in 2012, CREW named David Rivera as one of the "Most Corrupt Members of Congress." "Senator Rubio and his circle are no strangers to ethics issues," the group's spokesman, Jordan Libowitz, told me. Mr. Rubio's presidential campaign, Mr. Rivera's attorney, Michael Band, and the FBI declined comment for this story." (Observer, 2/25/16)

Berman Is "A Prominent Republican Donor And Senior Executive At The Blackstone Group." "Sen. Marco Rubio will raise money later this month at the Washington home of Wayne Berman, a prominent Republican donor and senior executive at the Blackstone Group. Guests attending the April 30 dinner will pay \$10,000 to be a co-chairman; \$5,400 to be a cohost; and \$2,700 to be a regular attendee at the reception, according to an invitation obtained by CNN and confirmed by Berman. The eight co-chairs listed on the invite include well-known figures in Washington circles, such as Rob Chamberlin of McBee Strategic; Joe Wall of Goldman Sachs; Jennifer Larkin Lukawski of the BGR Group; and Scott Weaver of Wiley Rein. Rubio kicked off his campaign for president earlier this week, joining his Senate colleagues, Ted Cruz of Texas and Rand Paul of Kentucky, in the Republican field. Assembling a prominent list of K Street supporters is a show of force for Rubio, who is competing for Washington support with the two other senators, as well as Jeb Bush, who has deep connections to the D.C. influence world. Berman is one of Rubio's top supporters and estimates he has hosted around a dozen or so events for the Florida senator in recent years. Reached on the phone Wednesday morning, Berman said the list of heavy-hitter co-chairs listed on the invitation for the April 30 dinner demonstrates the level of enthusiasm for the senator's White House bid. "Sen. Rubio has attracted a well-known group of highly effective Republican fundraisers to chair the event, and I'm honored to be hosting it at my house," Berman said. Rubio's Major Financial Backer Norman Braman Was Also Known To Employ Rubio's Wife Through The Braman Family's Philanthropic Foundation - "Making Theirs A Unique Donor-Politician Relationship." "When Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Fla.) announces his plans to run for president next week — as expected — he'll launch his formal campaign and be limited in how much money he can raise. But he'll have the help of a new super PAC, Conservative Solutions, which formally launched Thursday under the leadership of J. Warren Tompkins, a veteran South Carolina Republican operative. One of the biggest financial backers of the PAC is expected to be Norman Braman, a billionaire businessman and philanthropist who runs auto dealerships across South Florida and in the Denver area. He's the former owner of the Philadelphia Eagles and a major history buff — his Miami office, on the second floor of one of his downtown dealerships, is adorned with framed letters written by Colonial and Civil War-era generals and lawmakers. He keeps a treasure trove of Abraham Lincoln swag at his home, he said. Braman is not only a Rubio backer and donor, but his family's philanthropic foundation also employs Jeanette Rubio, the senator's wife, on a part-time basis — making theirs a unique donorpolitician relationship. In a recent interview with The Washington Post, Braman, 82, discussed his relationship with Rubio — including the time they traveled to Israel in 2010, and why he's not supporting former Florida governor Jeb Bush — and, why he doesn't regret giving up his team." Rubio's relationship with Norman Braman, a billionaire South Florida auto dealer and former owner of the Philadelphia Eagles, has come under scrutiny - notably in the pages of The New York Times this weekend — as the freshman Florida senator has mounted a presidential bid. "Norm Braman is a great man, a pillar of the South Florida community and someone who I'm personally close to. I'm very proud to be associated with him," Rubio said in an interview early Saturday evening, after he walked up and down Greenville's Main Street shaking hands with voters. He repeated past assertions that there's no ethical conflicts in the relationship because Braman has never asked him for political favors. "I'm proud that he's a donor, I'm proud that he's a friend. And I'm proud that he was a client," Rubio said. "The only thing Norman Braman's ever asked my help on is charities, whether it's a cancer center, or a genomics center at the University of Miami." Rubio and his family have benefited both personally and politically from Braman since the start of the senator's political career. Braman donated money to Rubio's campaigns and would likely be a major backer for the super PAC that's been formed to help support Rubio's presidential run. Braman also employed Rubio as a

lawyer during the latter's 2010 campaign for the Senate — and now employs his wife, Jeannette Rubio, an arrangement that began shortly after her husband was elected." (<u>MSNBC</u>, 5/9/15)

Controversial Associations – Fanjul Family

Rubio Is Known To Have A Close, Longstanding Political Leadership With The Fanjul Family, Which Owns Sugar Conglomerate Florida Crystals And Prominently Supports Continued Sugar Industry Subsidies That Rubio Also Backs. "After talking about being the son of a bartender during his announcement to run for president last year, Marco Rubio walked off stage in Miami and hugged a middle-age man in a tan suit. That man was Jose "Pepe" Fanjul, the patriarch of the family that owns sugar giant Florida Crystals and whom Rubio has credited for helping him win the U.S. Senate seat he's defending this year. The Fanjuls and their company have supported Rubio since his first election to the Florida House in 2000 and stood by him as he became the speaker, a senator and a presidential candidate. And Rubio has stood by many of the company's positions, in particular related to the environment and Lake Okeechobee discharges. In addition to the \$504,000 the Fanjuls and their company have given to support the Republican, they have organized dozens of fundraisers and introduced him to key political players. The sugar industry, including Florida Crystals competitor U.S. Sugar Corp., has invested \$632,000 on Rubio since 2000. Rubio and the Fanjuls share a common personal background. Pepe and his brother, Alfonso, were born into a prominent Cuban sugar family that fled the island after Fidel Castro seized power in 1959. They created one of the nation's largest sugar productions in South Florida, with operations in the Dominican Republic as well. Rubio's parents left the island in 1956. "The Fanjuls believed in me early on, when few others did, and I'm grateful for that," Rubio said in an emailed statement. He declined to be interviewed for this story. Despite winning the Senate in 2010 on an anti-big government platform, Rubio is a staunch defender of a federal program that artificially inflates sugar prices. The Great Depression-era program sets quotas on imports and gives growers loans they can repay with surplus sugar if prices fall near of below the loan rate. The program has many opponents: environmentalists; manufacturers that use sugar in their products, like candy makers; and the corn industry, which produces corn syrup, a sugar substitute. Congress has voted to continue the program several times with support from several Florida lawmakers. The sugar industry employs 14,000 to 15,000 people in Florida, and Rubio is prepared to eliminate the program once other countries end their sugar subsidies, he said in a 2015 "Meet the Press" interview. "If the American sugar industry is wiped out because, for example, the Brazilians heavily subsidize theirs," Rubio said, "once we are out of the picture, the Brazilians now hold a disproportionate share of the sugar industry and at that point they can charge whatever they want for it." Rubio's Democratic opponent, U.S. Rep. Patrick Murphy, voted against a 2013 amendment to reform the federal sugar program. Murphy, who represents the Treasure Coast and northern Palm Beach County, "supports working with our trading partners to remove subsidies and barriers so that all sides can compete on a level playing field," his campaign said." Controversial Associations – Floridians For Conservative Leadership Committee (FCLC)

In 2002, Rubio's Wife Incorporated A Nonprofit PAC Called Floridians For Conservative Leadership Committee (FCLC); The PAC Received Assistance From Alexander Heckler

(A Prominent Democratic Attorney Known For His Support For Hillary Clinton And Links To Straw Donations) And Joaquin Urquiola (Linked To A Bank Tied To Money Laundering For South American Cartels). "I mentioned above a PAC and a bribe so let me turn to that story now, which actually involved a few of Mr. Rubio's PACs and assorted businesses. Pay particular attention here to three key figures who were all intimate, longtime friends of Mr. Rubio's: -Alexander Heckler, an attorney who in 2011 was found to have set up PACs that shuffled illegal straw donations to political candidates for his clients. Heckler, a lawyer and leading Florida lobbyist as well as a "Hillraiser," the term for then-Senator Hillary Clinton's top fundraisers, performed legal and accounting services for the treasurer of a Rubioaffiliated PAC, but only disclosed that several years afterwards, apparently to obscure his role. Heckler is also the stepson of Franklin Sands, who for many years-including the period when the story below took place-was the most powerful Democrat in the Florida House. -Joaquin Urquiola, the treasurer for the two Rubio-affiliated PACs who Heckler did work for, who at the same time was being questioned by federal regulators about his role at an Ecuadorian bank with Miami offices that was suspected of violating anti-money laundering laws by taking in cash from several South American drug cartels. Urquiola was an accountant and director of the bank, Pacific National Bank, and he and Pacific were in fact subsequently hit with fines for violating anti-money laundering laws and the Bank Secrecy Act. According to a 2011 story about the case in the South Florida Business Journal, the bank and its directors had previously been sanctioned for similar crimes and allowed "the violations to continue for years." -Bridget Nocco, the lobbyist friend of Mr. Rubio's whom I mentioned above. The story begins in late 2002 when Jeanette Dousdebes, Mr. Rubio's wife, incorporated a nonprofit PAC called Floridians for Conservative Leadership Committee (FCLC). She was the registered agent and only director for this short-lived entity, which the State of Florida dissolved three years later because it had failed to file an annual report. Urquiola, the executive at the bank that allowed a drug cartel to launder money, was the group's treasurer, and Heckler quietly helped him out, according to information provided to me by the National Legal and Policy Center, a Virginia-based watchdog group that provided key research for this section of the story. During its brief existence, FCLC raised \$228,350, of which roughly \$35,000 disappeared into thin air, according to the entity's own tax returns. Its largest donor by far was a scandal-plagued PAC called OPH (\$50,000) but Democratic super-lobbyist Ron Book also gave generously. Bridget Nocco, Mr. Rubio's lobbyist pal, was paid nearly \$26,000 by the PAC for salary and consulting services, according to its nonprofit tax filings with the IRS." (Observer, 1/18/16)

The biggest donors to the group, called Floridians for Conservative Leadership, included a who's who of big businesses Rubio later supported as speaker, according to a recent review of the committee's records by the St. Petersburg Times, which reported on the leaked documents. There was U.S. Sugar, Florida Crystals, and AT&T.; (There was also \$50,000 from Alan Mendelsohn, a Broward ophthalmologist arrested last year by the FBI on corruption charges.)" For some reason Heckler failed to disclose to Florida election authorities that Urquiola was the PAC's treasurer, but he was listed as filling that role in the group's federal tax returns, which Heckler filed. What's also odd is that the federal tax identification number Urquiola used for Floridians for Real Family Values' tax return was actually the same used by the FCLG, the 527 that Mr. Rubio created and was president of, which suggests that the two entities were essentially identical. Between October 24 and November 2 of 2006, Floridians for Real Family Values raised \$244,000. Also in 2006, Urquiola incorporated a company called Florida Media Productions Group Inc., which operated out of the same address as the FCLG. Florida Media Productions Group was established to work on behalf of political campaigns, but there's not much evidence that the company did any work at all. It never bothered to set up a website nor did it ever create a single TV, print or online campaign ad. The only income it ever received—about \$150,000 came from two Heckler's controlled PACs, one being Floridians for Real Family Values. All that money was paid for "consulting" services, though the payments were made long after the election year was over. Most of the money raised by Floridians for Real Family Values that didn't go to Florida Media Productions Group-about \$33,000-simply disappeared when the former was shut down." (Observer, 1/18/16)

In His 2012 Memoir, Rubio Acknowledges That The Miami Herald Accused Him Of Rigging The Turnpike Bidding Process For Concessions In Favor Of A Close Friend – An Accusation Denied By Rubio Even Though He Noted He Acted On His Friend's Concern And Supported Legislation "That Required The Concessions For Food And Gas To Be Bid Separately." "I was accused by the Miami Herald of trying to rig the state bidding process for concessions on Florida's turnpike on behalf of a close, personal friend, Max Alvarez. Max owns dozens of gas stations in Miami. He was concerned that the Florida Department of Transportation had made it impossible for all but the biggest companies to operate gas stations on the turnpike by insisting that companies bid for both gas and food concessions together. I'd seen this kind of fix before on the local level when a bid's specifications are written in such a way that only 1 or 2 companies have a shot at a contract. I agreed to support legislation that required the concessions for food and gas to be bid separately. The Miami Herald claimed that I had intervened in the bidding process to give an advantage to a friend. Of course, the legislature couldn't award or deny a contract. Character Issues – Ambition, Opportunism, And Self-Promotion

"Rubio's Detractors, And Even Some Admirers, Suggest That His Career So Far Has Been Less About Good Government Than Politics And Self-Promotion"; Rubio Has Also Been Accused Of Making Deals That Harm His Own Constituents. "Rubio's detractors, and even some admirers, suggest that his career so far has been less about good government than politics and self-promotion. His autobiography recounts virtually no substantive achievements beyond a hometown tree-planting project. In the class, he devoted much of his time to recounting the machinations that persuaded his colleagues to elect him speaker: "You raise money for them. You befriend them. You make sure your kids are friends with their kids. And then you cut the best deal you can." He didn't mention that the deal he reportedly cut to secure North Florida support for his candidacy revised funding formulas at the expense of his South Florida constituents. "Marco Rubio's going to do whatever's good for Marco Rubio," says former Hialeah mayor Raul Martinez, a Democratic rival in Florida's rough-and-tumble exile politics." (*Time*, 2/7/13)

Fueled by a steady diet of Mountain Dew and Cuban coffee, Rubio pored over the legislative maps. He broke the state into five regions and met one-on-one with lawmakers to help draw boundaries. "The most personal thing a legislator ever has to deal with is their own district." Byrd says, "and he was able to make them reasonably happy. ... Imagine a freshman legislator in an organization driven by seniority and he captivates all of them, on both sides of the aisle, and brings it in for a landing." Rubio's hustle endeared him to leadership, and in late 2002, he was appointed majority leader. At some level, it was a natural stepping stone to House speaker. Yet Rubio's supporters discouraged the move, saying it would kill his speakership ambitions before they left the cradle. "I would be in the vote-counting business, and would have to twist arms on difficult votes, making as many enemies as friends in the process," he wrote in his memoir. His solution? He persuaded Byrd, the speaker, to restructure the jobmaking him primarily the chief spokesman for the House GOP while transferring the more difficult legislative wrangling to the whip's office." "In the meantime, as he advocated slashing state spending, Rubio spent like mad on an American Express credit card issued to the Florida Republican Party and paid for by donors. Between 2007 and 2009, he charged about \$100,000 on the card — including almost \$16,000 in personal expenses such as a \$135 haircut and \$1,000 in repairs to his family's minivan, according to a Herald investigation. In 2016, Rubio Was Mocked And Scrutinized For Wearing Made In China Zip Up Boots That Some Alleged Were Worn To Make Him Appear Taller. "Florida Sen. Marco Rubio is trying to stamp out criticism from other presidential candidates about his slick, zip-up boots by saying he's giving American business a leg up. Rubio's ankle boots became the subject of Internet scrutiny after he was photographed wearing them in New Hampshire on Jan. 3, 2016. Pundits and fashion columnists commented on them ad nauseam. Rubio drew fire from his GOP rivals for being perhaps a bit too chic for the campaign trail. Some speculated they were to make the 5-foot-10 senator appear taller. Kentucky Sen. Rand Paul called the boots "cute" and former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush's Right to Rise super PAC made a commercial mocking them. While Rubio initially called the focus on his footwear "craziness," he's worked at thinking on his feet. At a Jan. 18 campaign event in Waverly, Iowa, a voter jokingly asked about the boots. Rubio declared his boots, appropriately outfitted with a Cuban heel, are a patriotic choice. "They sold out of those boots online," Rubio said. "They're made in Wisconsin. Florsheim! You know what that means? That means I did more for American business in one week than Barack Obama did in seven years!" He's right that Florsheim's website says some sizes of their \$135 Duke boots are out of stock, but they should be available by Feb. 1. A Florsheim spokesman told us sales of that style have "increased significantly" since Rubio was shown wearing them. As for the part about being made in Wisconsin, well, Rubio probably should have watched his step. Like all of the Glendale, Wis., company's shoes, Rubio's boots aren't made in the United States. The company did recently collaborate with designer George Esquivel to create a luxury shoe line that is made in California, but Florsheim said their products are made in Asia, mostly from China." Prior To Becoming Florida House Speaker, Rubio Was Relatively Moderate And "Was Hardly The Scorching Conservative Who Would Later Woo Tea Partiers Nationwide." "Back then, he was hardly the scorching conservative who would later woo Tea Partiers nationwide. Before the year's session, he told the Herald he'd focus on supporting early education and community policing. And he wasn't particularly passionate about cutting spending. In his first three years, he supported adding a \$4 surcharge to cruise tickets to fund a Marlins stadium and a \$1.2 million earmark to build new bike paths in his district. "In his first years, Marco was not this red-meat, Tea Party, let's-abolish-the-government guy you're seeing on the trail now," Sen. Steve Geller says. "His politics didn't shift that way until he became the speaker-designate."" (Miami New Times, 7/22/10)

In 2000, Rubio "Campaigned As A Moderate Republican, Preaching Tax Cuts And Early-Childhood Education While Leaving Social Issues Off The Table." Rubio Is A Career Politician, Who Has Held Office Or Worked In Government Consulting Roles Continuously Since His First Election In 1998 At The Age Of 26. "After Dole lost, Rubio went to work for Cardenas's law firm, Tew Cardenas. At that time, he met a former Dolphins cheerleader named Jeanette Dousdebes, a gorgeous Colombian-American with long blond hair. They married in 1998. That same year, he decided to run for city commission in West Miami, a hamlet of 5,800 people tucked south of Tamiami Trail and west of Red Road. Though the race drew only a few hundred voters, Rubio's gift for forging connections paid off. Rebeca Sosa, then the commission chair, was tending flowers in her front lawn on a spring day in 1998 when the candidate walked up to introduce himself. "I couldn't believe how young he looked. I said, 'You're too young. Why would you run?'" Sosa says. "But he started talking about everything he learned from his grandfather, and I was just blown away." The next week, Rubio began knocking on every door in West Miami. His opponent, incumbent Tania Rozio, was a community activist. She couldn't believe this 26-year-old kid had the backing of Sosa and a bigleague manager like Lorenzo. "I'm not a politician, and I never have been. He was 20-something, and he was already a professional politician," Rozio says. "It was no contest." On election night, Rubio and the other commissioners gathered at West Miami's small city hall, a squat building tucked behind Tropical Supermarket on Calle Ocho. A half-hour after Rubio won by a convincing 744 to 244, the phone rang. "It was Jeb Bush himself, calling to congratulate Marco

for winning our little race," recalls Enrique Gonzalez, who also won a seat that year. "He was the anointed golden child, even then."" (<u>Miami New Times</u>, 7/22/10)

He even recounts how he asked one speaker to restructure the House majority leader job he wanted so that it did not involve whipping votes—a task he knew would alienate members whose support he needed later to win the speakership. Rubio Failed To Achieve More Than One Third Of The Legislative Goals He Set Out To Accomplish As Florida Speaker And During The 2016 Presidential Campaign Only Offered A Stock Answer Of Seven Specific Topic Areas When Asked About U.S. Senate Accomplishments. "When asked, Marco Rubio insists that his record is lengthy and substantive. In a race where his rivals have suggested that he is far too inexperienced for the presidency, it's no surprise that the first-term Florida senator gets asked the question -- what, exactly, has he done? -- a lot. It's a question his campaign can't seem to escape, especially since Rubio's rivals have targeted it relentlessly. Sen. Rick Santorum made headlines last week not for endorsing Rubio upon his departure from the race, something he did do, but for being unable to name a single one of Rubio's accomplishments. During Saturday night's debate, the senator was asked to explain his record, which offered Gov. Chris Christie the opportunity to slam it as nonexistent. This morning, at a small, employer-sponsored town hall at BAE Systems in Nashua, an employee asked Rubio to name "the single accomplishment of which you're most proud of and the leadership that you employed achieving it." Rubio answered with no less than seven specific bills, taking military contractors on a meandering review of nearly every elected office he's held in the last two decades. "As part of the debate the other night, there was a big discussion about eminent domain and Governor Bush referred to what we did in Florida to protect against eminent domain abuse," he said. "That was my law. I wrote...we helped craft that law from a committee that I chaired, we passed it into the law of Florida. I was the one that placed it on the ballot." ("Governor Bush always appreciated when State Representative Rubio supported his agenda," a Bush spokesman told MSNBC.) Rubio also touted curriculum reform in Florida -- another thing Bush has touted before -- and said that when he became House Speaker in the state legislature, he'd written a book of 100 legislative goals, more than half of which are now law or policy.

PolitiFact found this claim to be just half true way back in 2010. About a third of his 100 legislative goals were enacted or partially enacted into law, far less than the more than half he touted today. As for the Senate achievements he was asked about, Rubio offered up his stock answer: sanctions on Hezbollah and Venezuela, the Veterans Affairs Accountability Act, defunding the Obamacare bailout fund, the Girls Count Act. He concluded by arguing that to really achieve his agenda, he'll need to be president." (MSNBC, 2/8/16)

- Rubio's Tenure As Speaker Was Marked By "His Mismanagement And Refusal To Compromise" Which Handicapped His Ability To Secure Accomplishments. "Rage flashes through Marco Rubio's hazel eyes. His gavel echoes like a gunshot through the chamber. Legislators freeze. Rep. Franklin Sands, a Democrat from Weston, stops midstride on his way back to his desk. "The clerk will stop reading until Representative Sands takes his seat," Rubio intones icily. Through months of partisan bickering, the speaker had never cracked. But that day, his caffeinated drive melted into anger and frustration. "He just exploded," recalls Dan Gelber, then the House minority leader and now a candidate for state attorney general. "He was angry, very angry, and it was worse because he knew he'd lost his cool." "Rubio's relationship with Rivera was emblematic of the new speaker's general style: a tendency to delegate many of the toughest parts of politics. Bob Levy, a longtime lobbyist, says he rarely visited Rubio when he wanted something for his clients. It was Rivera who took the meetings. "When you talked to David, you knew you were talking to Marco," Levy told me. "Rivera got things done," Gelber says, "sort of like a fighter pilot might plow the horizon for the guys behind himwith a similar amount of damage, I might add." "There were times when David did things that Marco wouldn't necessarily sanction, but he considered that David's choiceas long as they didn't involve Marco directly," Jill Chamberlin, Rubio's former press secretary, told me." • Rubio Has A Well-Known "Reluctance To Be A Top-Down Manager." "Indeed, probably the biggest consensus to emerge from my conversations had to do with Rubio's reluctance to be a top-down manager. "There are organizations where it's all about one strong dynamic player, and I saw him as more of the team-builder, someone who empowered other people," says Baxley. Gelber, the Democrat, puts it this way: "Marco, unlike Jeb, is not afraid of a collaborative process. He understands the notion of achieving what you can." In this respect, a Rubio presidency might prove to be a close managerial cousin of the administration of George W. Bush, who was famously comfortable delegating. Where opinion splits is on whether Rubio's tendency toward delegation is a virtue or a problem. In 2016, Rubio-Backer Rick "Santorum Struggled To Name One Accomplishment Rubio Has Had In The Senate" And Failed To Push Back Against Arguments From MSNBC's Morning Joe Hosts That He Had Not Accomplished Anything. "Rick Santorum had one job to do in his appearance on MSNBC's "Morning Joe" on Thursday. He failed. The former Pennsylvania senator, who dropped his presidential bid Wednesday, told co-hosts Joe Scarborough and Mika Brzezinski he is supporting Marco Rubio's presidential campaign because the Florida senator is someone "who can work together with people." But Santorum struggled to name one accomplishment Rubio has had in the Senate. "He's been in the Senate for four years," Scarborough noted. "Can you name his top accomplishment in the Senate ---actually working in the Senate doing something that tilted your decision to Marco Rubio?" "If you look at being in the minority in the United States Senate in a year when nothing got — four years where nothing got done, I guess it's hard to say there are accomplishments," Santorum said. "I mean, tell me what happened during that four years that was an accomplishment for anybody? It was complete gridlock." Scarborough shot back that Republicans have been in the majority for the past two years and asked what Rubio has accomplished there since being part of the majority. "Joe, look, the Republicans have been in the majority for one year and one month, of which, as you know, he was running for president primarily," Santorum said. "The first four years he was in the minority, and nothing got done. And by the way, what happened this year under the Republicans?" Scarborough insisted he wasn't defending Congress or being difficult in his questioning. "I'm just asking you to name one accomplishment that Marco Rubio ----" Scarborough said as Santorum tried to interrupt. "But list one accomplishment. Just one. Just one that Marco achieved. Maybe a bill that he wrote. Maybe a moment in a committee." Brzezinski then jumped in to make it easier on Santorum, offering a fill-in-the-blank question. "Jeb Bush ran Florida. Donald Trump built a company," she began. "Marco Rubio... — finish the sentence." "OK, Marco Rubio was, No. 1, the speaker of the Florida House, which is not something that's a minor deal," Santorum answered. "I mean, he was elected by his colleagues to be the speaker of the House. No. 2, yeah, he spent four years in the United States Senate being frustrated like everybody else that nothing got done, and then you can't point to him and say well nothing got done and therefore he has no accomplishments." Rubio Has Been Criticized For Claiming Credit On Killing An Obamacare Provision Due To Other Senate Negotiators Actually Achieving The Feat. "Asked later why Santorum couldn't name a legislative accomplishment, Rubio then pointed to a veterans affairs measure, sanctions on Hezbollah, killing an Obamacare provision and a measure to prevent human trafficking. The veterans measure was slipped into a larger bill that passed Congress in 2014; the Hezbollah sanctions bill and human trafficking measure each passed with no opposition in the Senate. And his role in pushing to kill the Obamacare provision, which let the government provide a key backstop for insurance companies, has been the subject of sharp dispute. On the campaign trail, Rubio takes credit for legislation that was included in a 2015 spending bill gutting the so-called risk corridors provision. While Rubio was on the forefront calling for changes to the provision in the past, it was ultimately other GOP negotiators who slipped the measure into the spending bill – not Rubio himself. Asked by CNN Thursday how he could take credit for that, Rubio said, "I led the effort to put that in. I was the first one to bring it up. I was the one who pushed forward for two and a half years. ... Did I type it on my computer? No. But did I actually get it done? Absolutely."" (CNN, 2/4/16)

Leadership Issues – Worst Missed Voting Record

In 2022, Politifact Concluded That Claiming Rubio Had "One Of The Worst Attendance Records In The Senate" Was A "Mostly True" Statement – With Rubio Having Missed More Than 9 Percent Of Roll Call Votes Throughout His Career. "Since taking office in 2011, Rubio has missed 346, or 9.2%, of 3,744 roll call votes, according to GovTrack, a nonpartisan website that collects congressional data. On average, members of the Senate miss around 2.3% of votes during their tenure. Most of Rubio's career absences occurred during his bid for the Republican presidential nomination in 2016. From April 2015 through March 2016, Rubio missed 129 votes. That's not unusual for a presidential candidate. For example, former President Barack Obama missed 314, or about 24%, of 1,300 roll call votes in his three-year Senate career. Independent Sen. Bernie Sanders of Vermont and Republican Sen. Ted Cruz of Texas, who both vied for the White House, have worse attendance than Rubio. Sanders has missed more than 14% of votes since 2007; Cruz missed 9.4% since he joined the Senate in 2013. Still, Rubio's attendance record did not immediately improve after his presidential campaign. According to ProPublica, in the 115th Congress, which ran from January 2017 to 2018, Rubio was the eighth most absent member in the Senate, out of 99 senators. (There was one vacancy.) In 2020, Rubio ranked 12th most absent among senators who have served more than 10 years. When looking at the current 117th Congress, however, Rubio's attendance has improved. The 117th Congress began in 2021 and goes through January 2023. So far, he's missed 41 votes, making him the 27th most absent member of the Senate. He cited "travel difficulties" for three absences, per ProPublica. It's also worth noting that none of the votes Rubio missed in the 117th Congress had a specific impact on Florida. The most absent member of the Senate recently is Republican Sen. Mike Rounds of South Dakota. So far, Rounds missed more than 25% of votes. Rubio's campaign did not answer specific questions about his record. Instead, a spokesperson pointed to a list of his achievements in the Senate, including coauthoring the Paycheck Protection Program, or PPP. Demings said Rubio has "one of the worst attendance records in the Senate. " Looking at the percentage of roll call votes Rubio missed throughout his decade as a senator, the statement is accurate. Overall, Rubio missed more than 9% of votes since 2011 — well above the average of 2.3% among members of the Senate. One of the reasons for this is his unsuccessful run for the presidency in 2016. Rubio's attendance record in the 117th Congress is a bit better. So far, he has missed 41 votes, making him the 27th most absent member of the Senate. We rate Demings' claim Mostly True." Earlier In 2015, Rubio Was Known To Have Had The Worst Record For Missed Votes In The Senate. "If there were a perfect attendance award for Congress, Sen. Susan Collins would get it. Since taking office in 1997, the Maine Republican hasn't missed a vote in 5,788 opportunities. But some of her colleagues have missed quite a few over the years. Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Fla.) and Rep. John Convers (D-Mich.) have been absent from the most votes in their respective chambers, according to a new analysis by Vocativ in partnership with GovTrack.us. Of 1,198 total votes, Rubio has missed 99, or 8.3 percent, since taking office in January 2011. "He is one of the only senators with young children who has not moved his family to D.C., and tries to spend as much time in Florida with them as possible," Rubio spokesman Alex Conant told POLITICO. "In addition to his parental responsibilities, in recent years he's also had to return to Florida and miss votes due to his mother's health and civic responsibilities like jury duty." On Rubio's voting record over the last few years, Conant said there will be no doubt where the Florida senator stands as he travels around the country talking to potential voters for a possible presidential run. "Senator Rubio has not made a final decision about 2016, but he's seriously considering running for president and taking the necessary steps to prepare a competitive campaign," he said. Convers, who is currently the longest-serving member in either chamber, has missed 16.3 percent of 27,195 votes since January 1965. Republicans make up nine of the 10 spots on Vocativ's Senate list, with Hawaii

Democrat Brian Schatz missing the third-most votes after his appointment to the seat following the death of Sen. Daniel Inouye in December 2012. He was subsequently reelected last November. Other names on top 10 list include Jerry Moran (R-Kan.), John Boozman (R-Ark.), Ted Cruz (R-Texas), David Vitter (R-La.), Lisa Murkowski (R-Alaska), Lindsey Graham (R-S.C.), Jim Inhofe (R-Okla.) and Roy Blunt (R-Mo.)." In 2018, Rubio Fired His Chief Of Staff Clint Reed "After Determining He Violated Office Policies Regarding Proper Relations Between A Supervisor And Subordinates." "Sen.

Marco Rubio has fired his chief of staff after determining he violated office policies regarding proper relations between a supervisor and subordinates. Rubio said in a statement that an investigation concluded his chief of staff Clint Reed engaged in behavior that "in my judgement amounted to threats to withhold employment benefits." Rubio announced the decision to fire Reed just before midnight on Saturday. The Florida Republican said he became aware "for the first time" on Friday "of allegations of improper conduct by my Chief of Staff while under the employment of my office." Rubio said the allegations were reported directly to him and that he then immediately began an investigation with his general counsel. "By early this afternoon, I had sufficient evidence to conclude that while employed by this office, my Chief of Staff had violated office policies regarding proper relations between a supervisor and their subordinates," Rubio said. Rubio said he traveled from Florida to Washington on Saturday night to terminate Reed's employment effective immediately. His office has also "taken steps to ensure that those impacted by this conduct have access to any services they may require now or in the future," he said." (*Politico*, 1/28/18)

Neither man trusted Crist to continue Bush's policies in education, taxes and other areas. (The suspicion was well-founded. Crist tried to undo a number of what Bush considered his signature, conservative achievements.) So when Bush's office proposed that many of his top-level policy aides could go work in Rubio's House, Rubio was eager to help. Bush, in turn, offered to let Rubio place some of his prospective hires in governor's office jobs prior to his officially taking over. "We can also offer Speaker Rubio the chance to provide jobs in the executive as early as now for people he is recruiting," Bush wrote a top aide just days after the sword ceremony." From 1980 forward, there were only three November elections when he did not have a personal interest in the outcome, whether as the campaign chairman (Gov. Bob Martinez, 1990), the son of a vice presidential or presidential candidate (1980, 1984, 1988, 1992), the brother of a presidential candidate (2000, 2004) or the gubernatorial candidate himself (1994, 1998, 2002). But in the election to replace him, it was clear that whether Democrat Jim Davis or Republican Charlie Crist won, Bush's successor would not feel at all committed to preserving his legacy. And so Rubio's role in 2007 was in part as a vessel for keeping Bush's people at some of the levers of power, even after his own departure. Jeb Bush Has Noted That Rubio "Followed [His] Lead" While He Was Governor. "From the start, Rubio made crucial alliances with politically powerful Cuban exiles. Rubio scored his first electoral victory in 1998, a seat on the West Miami City Commission, with a gamechanging assist from a local power broker, Mayor Rebeca Sosa. Sosa, today a commissioner with Miami-Dade County, pointed out that she had been born in Camaguey, the same province as Rubio's mother, Oria. "I first met Oria, who was always active in the [West Miami] community at meetings here," Sosa tells me. "Then her son Marco introduced himself to me. I knew from the start that he was ready for bigger things." Two years later, having astutely worked Miami's Cuban politics, Rubio was seated in the Florida House, representing a lopsided district that included blue-collar Cuban Hialeah, the largely African-American and Dominican neighborhood of Allapattah and tony Coral Gables. That same year, Jeb Bush assumed office as governor, marking the first time since Reconstruction that the GOP controlled the governor's mansion, the Florida House and its Senate. "At that point, Jeb Bush was a god," says Dan Gelber, who served eight years in the Florida House, including as the Democratic leader, working amicably with Rubio. And Rubio, Gelber says, went from "being a foot soldier for Jeb Bush to becoming a lieutenant in Jeb's army." The Rubio-Jeb pecking order of those years is something Bush has been making clear of late. "Marco was a member of the House of Representatives when I was governor," Bush pointedly remarked in early October, as his mentee passed him in the polls, "and he followed my lead." These days, Gelber says he thinks of Jeb Bush not only as Rubio's political commander-in-chief but what he calls a "frenenmentor-friend, enemy and mentor." (*Politico*, 11/2015)

On Thursday evening, U.S. News published a 112-page document that the Bush campaign provided to donors at a retreat earlier this month in Houston. The document highlights the campaign's plans to target Rubio, calling him a "risky bet." At one point, the document says that "Those who have looked into Marco's background in the past have been concerned with what they have found." U.S. News, citing an anonymous Bush aide, said the reference was to "concerns Mitt Romney's team unearthed when they vetted Rubio for vice president in 2012." Rubio was among those considered for the VP slot, which ultimately went to now-House Speaker Paul Ryan. Yet, in an email to POLITICO, Beth Myers, a longtime Romney political adviser who in 2012 oversaw his vice presidential search, pushed back on the assertion. "As the senior Romney advisor who handled VP vetting and had access to all the vetting documents, I can say that Senator Rubio 'passed' our vetting and we found nothing that disqualified him from serving as VP," wrote Myers, who counts herself a Bush supporter. Mr. Rubio's willingness to follow that plan puts him at odds with conservative groups who've demanded that any Zika funding be offset by cuts elsewhere in the budget. "We can do that, we should do that, I'm in favor of doing that," he said of finding the cuts. But he said it would be "short-sighted" to wait any longer or "low-ball" the U.S. response to Zika, which is causing birth defects in Latin America. Florida accounts for about one in five of the 500 travelrelated cases of Zika recorded in the U.S. so far, and the mosquito-borne virus could swirl on its own once temperatures climb. Mr. Rubio also supports a bipartisan plan to pony up \$1.1 billion for the Zika fight, although he argued it is a less attractive approach. "Why are we taking this chance? It makes absolutely no sense," he said. Mr. Rubio's break with fellow Republicans comes just two months after he ran as a conservative candidate for president. The Floridian lobbied to pay for the Zika package down the road, saying \$2 billion for an emergency — unlike entitlement spending — is hardly a major driver for the nation's \$18 trillion debt, so it shouldn't be hard to find the money. He also urged lawmakers to divorce the administration from the actual funding request. "Fine, it came from the White House," he said. "That's the first thing-when you can demonstrate a real interest in people and empower them to be successful," Baxley told me. 2016 Campaign Flip-Flop

In June 2016, Rubio Announced That He Would "Seek Reelection To The Senate, Reversing A Pledge He Made A Year Ago To Either Assume The Presidency Or Return To Private Life In Florida." "Sen. Marco Rubio said Wednesday he will seek reelection to the Senate, reversing a pledge he made a year ago to either assume the presidency or return to private life in Florida. The decision instantly transforms an already competitive race and improves Republicans' chances of maintaining the Senate majority. Rubio (R-Fla.) issued a

lengthy statement explaining his decision to reverse course, citing the Senate's power to "act as a check and balance on the excesses of a president" as a central reason. "Control of the Senate may very well come down to the race in Florida," he said. "That means the future of the Supreme Court will be determined by the Florida Senate seat. It means the future of the disastrous Iran nuclear deal will be determined by the Florida Senate seat. It means the direction of our country's fiscal and economic policies will be determined by this Senate seat. The stakes for our nation could not be higher." His entry into the race comes shortly before a Friday deadline for candidate filings and after weeks of pressure from national GOP figures who urged Rubio to reconsider his frequently repeated intention to either become president or a "private citizen" come 2017. Those entreaties were rooted in blunt political reality: Rubio, with his near-universal name recognition and proven fundraising capacity, would give Republicans their best chance of winning the swing-state seat and, perhaps, retaining the Senate majority. "I think it moves Florida from a likely loss to an almost certain pickup, and so it's not only important to Florida, it has a huge impact on our ability to hold the majority," Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.), who played a leading role in persuading Rubio to run, said on Wednesday. Josh Holmes, a political consultant who is close to McConnell, said Rubio's decision will allow national Republican groups to shift resources to other competitive races across the country. "It is hard to overstate how important this development is for every Republican-held seat, given that this could take the most expensive state to defend entirely off the map," Holmes said. "This is a massive win for Florida, America and the Grand Old Party." The decision to continue his career in elective politics comes barely three months after Rubio, 45, ended his presidential campaign after an embarrassing loss in his home-state primary, finishing nearly 20 points behind Donald Trump and winning only one county outright — his home base of Miami-Dade. But the handful of candidates seeking to succeed him in the Senate each struggled to break out as Rubio sent a series of signals that he might be willing to seek reelection." Controversy – Rubio's Embellishment Of Family Emigration From Cuba

In 2011, An Analysis Of Documents Indicated That Rubio Had Been Embellishing His Family's Emigration Story From Cuba; Rather Than Being The "Son Of Exiles" From Castro's Cuba, Rubio Was A Son Of More Conventional Immigrants Seeking A Better Life Who Arrived Years Before Castro's Rise. "During his rise to political prominence, Sen. Marco Rubio frequently repeated a compelling version of his family's history that had special resonance in South Florida. He was the "son of exiles," he told audiences, Cuban Americans forced off their beloved island after "a thug," Fidel Castro, took power. But a review of documents including naturalization papers and other official records — reveals that the Florida Republican's account embellishes the facts. The documents show that Rubio's parents came to the United States and were admitted for permanent residence more than two-and-a-half years before Castro's forces overthrew the Cuban government and took power on New Year's Day 1959. Rubio's Recounting Of His Family's Background Has Shifted Overtime; Documents Indicate A More Conventional Immigration Story Due To Economic And Not Political Reasons. "When Rubio's parents left the island, Cuban migration to the United States was a trickle compared with what it would become in the years after Castro's victory. "The vast majority of people who emigrated in the '50s went for economic reasons, not for political reasons," said Maria Cristina Garcia, an expert on Cuban migration at Cornell University. Multiple documents signed by Rubio's parents, including their petitions for naturalization, show that Mario and Oriales Rubio arrived in the United States on May 27, 1956, with their son Mario, 6. Maternal grandfather Pedro Victor Garcia also came to the United States around the same time. Marco Rubio has said that his father left Cuba after enduring hardships, including the loss of his mother when he was young. Rubio has described the death in moving terms, although details have changed in his accounts. The Washington Post wants to criticize me for getting a few dates wrong, I accept that. But to call into question the central and defining event of my parents' young lives – the fact that a brutal communist dictator took control of their homeland and they were never able to return - is something I will not tolerate. My understanding of my parents' journey has always been based on what they told me about events that took place more than 50 years ago — more than a decade before I was born. What they described was not a timeline, or specific dates. They talked about their desire to find a better life, and the pain of being separated from the nation of their birth. What they described was the struggle they faced growing up, and their obsession with giving their children the chance to do the things they never could. But the Post story misses the point completely. The real essence of my family's story is not about the date my parents first entered the United States. Or whether they traveled back and forth between the two nations. Or even the date they left Fidel Castro's Cuba forever and permanently settled here. The essence of my family story is why they came to America in the first place; and why they had to stay. I now know that they entered the U.S. legally on an immigration visa in May of 1956. Not, as some have said before, as part of some special privilege reserved only for Cubans. They came because they wanted to achieve things they could not achieve in their native land. And they stayed because, after January 1959, the Cuba they knew disappeared. They wanted to go back — and in fact they did. Like many Cubans, they initially held out hope that Castro's revolution would bring about positive change. So after 1959, they traveled back several times — to assess the prospect of returning home. In February 1961, my mother took my older siblings to Cuba with the intention of moving back. My father was wrapping up family matters in Miami and was set to join them. But after just a few weeks, it became clear that the change happening in Cuba was not for the better. It was communism. So in late March 1961, just weeks before the Bay of Pigs invasion, my mother and siblings left Cuba and my family settled permanently in the United States. Soon after, Castro officially declared Cuba a Marxist state. My family has never been able to return. I am the son of immigrants and exiles, raised by people who know all too well that you can lose your country. By people who know firsthand that America is a very special place. My father spent the last 50 years of his life separated from the nation of his birth. Separated from his two brothers, who died in Cuba in the 1980s. Unable to show us where he played baseball as a boy. Where he met my mother. Unable to visit his parents' grave. My mother has spent the last 50 years separated from her native land as well. Unable to take us to her family's farm, to her schools or to the notary office where she married my father. A few years ago, using Google Earth, I attempted to take my parents back to Cuba. We found the rooftop of the house where my father was born. What I wouldn't give to visit these places where my story really began, before I was born. One day, when Cuba is free, I will. But I wish I could have done it with my parents. The Post story misses the entire point about my family and why their story is relevant. In 1962, Rubio's Grandfather, Fleeing Castro's Cuba After Having Left The United States In 1959, Attempted To Enter The United States Without Proper Credentials And Was Ordered To Be Deported Before Being Granted Status As A Parolee. "Marco Rubio's grandfather was a man without a country. Pedro Victor Garcia had left behind a home and a job with the government in communist Cuba, intent on never returning. But after his flight, Pan Am 2422 from Havana, touched down in Miami on Aug. 31, 1962, immigration officials stopped him. It had been almost three years since he had last set foot in the United States, and he no longer had the proper credentials to enter. They told him he could stay for the time being, but if he wanted to avoid deportation, he would have to plead his case. "I always thought of being here in the United States as a resident, living permanently here," the slight 62-year-old grandfather, speaking through an interpreter, said at a hearing five weeks later. He said that he had previously returned to Cuba because he did not want to be a burden on his family in the United States, but that the Cuban government had grown too oppressive and he feared what might happen if he stayed. The immigration officer was unmoved. He did not see an exiled family man — just someone who had no visa, worked for the Castro government and could pose a security risk. "It is ordered that the applicant be excluded and deported from the United States," he said matter-offactly, according to an audio recording of the proceedings stored by the National Archives. He stopped to ask if Mr. Garcia understood. "Yes, I do," Mr. Garcia said plaintively. That easily could have been the end of his American story. But someone in the immigration office on Biscayne Boulevard that day — the paperwork does not make clear exactly who or why — had a change of heart. Mr. Garcia was granted status as a parolee, a gray area of the law that meant he would not get a green card but could remain in the United States." (*The New York Times*, 3/6/16)

The U.S. Government Argued Rubio's Grandfather Was Not A Refugee But An Immigrant Who Gave Up His Status And Therefore In Violation Of Immigration Laws. "Yet Pedro Victor still believes. "I wish to say that I want to be a resident because by this status I will be able to work, get a job and get some money from here and there, and not be depending on my daughters." A court official halts the proceedings to place a new disc on the Voicewriter. Less than a minute into the new recording, Milich gives Pedro Victor cause for optimism. "I take official notice the U.S. consulates in Cuba were closed in January 1961, and from that time on no person in Cuba could procure a visa to come to this country." But then Milich pivots. Because Pedro Victor is trying to come into the country as a returning resident, "he must be considered an immigrant," Milich says. In the eyes of the United States government, he is not a political exile. He is a man who has broken immigration laws. Without a refugee status, Pedro Victor has no chance. He is in an immigration catch-22 — unable to get an immigrant visa because the U.S. consulate in Havana is closed and unable to enter the United States legally because he doesn't have a visa. "The applicant is subject to exclusion . . . as an immigrant not in possession of a valid, unexpired immigrant visa." At that point, Pedro Victor is officially an undocumented immigrant, a man standing on American soil without permission to be there. Then comes the crushing blow. Milich orders "that the applicant be excluded and deported from the United States." How could a Cuban be deported under those conditions in that era? A little more than a year and a half after the Bay of Pigs invasion? After Castro's

Rubio's Grandfather Had Returned To Cuba From The U.S. To Live Independently And Was Employed As A Castro Government Official Before Fleeing. "Pedro Victor emigrated to the United States in 1956, the same year as his daughter and son-in-law, Oriales and Mario Rubio. The Rubios touched down at Miami International Airport in a National Airlines jet six months before Castro set sail for Cuba in a leaky yacht called the Granma. Pedro Victor, Oriales's father, followed a few months later. The years between Pedro Victor's arrival on U.S. soil and Castro's victory were not easy on him or his pride. He went to New York, where he found little more than odd jobs, then made his way to Florida where steady work also eluded him. He repaired shoes at his home and sometimes picked up a few extra dollars as a money collector in a parking lot. He was 60 years old and dependent on his daughters. But in Cuba, Pedro Victor thought, he could be his own man. So two years and two months after being admitted to the United States as a legal immigrant, Pedro Víctor reacheda difficult conclusion. "I had to go back to Cuba to work there because I did not want to be supported by my daughters, my sons- in-law," he later explained. On January 15, 1959, two weeks after Batista abdicated, Pedro Victor flew back to the island of his birth. For the first three months he operated a small shoe store he owned, but in March he started selling off all his stock and materials. One of his daughters' husbands offered a better option: he could get Pedro Victor a real job, a job with a salary, vacation time, reliability. Pedro Victor decided to take it. His new employer was the Castro government. The job was with Cuba's Treasury ministry. Pedro Victor later described what sounds like a low-level bureaucratic or blue-collar position. He would say that he was tasked with recording payments owed to the Treasury by bus and truck drivers. Castro's government was beginning to insinuate itself into all aspects of daily life. In 1960, it unveiled the Urban Reform Law, under which the government seized rental properties throughout the country. The law was part of a series of sweeping moves designed to impose a socialist economic structure on the nation. He asked for vacation time, and when his bosses granted it, he fled to Miami. During Mr. Garcia's hearing, immigration officials pressed him for clues about whether he was a Cuban agent. Was he a member of any political party? What did he do for the Castro government? And why did he want to leave when it seemed he had a comfortable life? "You were quite content then to remain in Cuba, is that correct?" a lawyer for the government asks him. No, no," Mr. Garcia tries to assure him, explaining that the creeping oppression of the government made him desperate to get out. "They're watching you every day, and they want to know if you're trying to go out of the country, if you want to come to the United States." He says at the hearing that what made him decide he wanted to leave for the United States to join his wife and seven daughters, one of whom was Oria, Mr. Rubio's now 85-year-old mother, was when Castro confirmed suspicions that he was a Marxist. In November of that year the Cuban Adjustment Act was put in place, allowing Cubans who had been admitted into the United States since January 1, 1959, to be granted permanent residency after being in the United States for one year. The next summer Pedro Victor returned to the immigration bureaucracy to ask, once again, to become a permanent resident. The photograph that accompanied his application is a tipoff that he was more upbeat about his prospects. His mouth, set so grimly when he was stopped at the airport five years earlier, spreads into an impish smile. He looks like he's about to laugh. His cheeks have even filled out a bit. The form he filled out states that he had been a Cuban refugee since February 1965. Refugee status may have been

granted retroactively, Yates suggested. On September 13, 1967, the signature of Robert L. Woytych, the district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, was stamped at a cockeyed angle on a sparse government form. The date stamp accompanying his signature strays over the previously blank line on the form, almost obscuring the numbers. But the meaning is clear—application approved." <u>Controversy – Rubio Brother-In-Law Orlando Cicilia: Drug Dealer</u>

In 1987, Rubio's Brother-In-Law Orlando Cicilia Was Arrested And Sentenced For Charges Stemming From Cocaine Dealing "In One Of The Biggest Drug Cases Of Miami's Baroque Cocaine-Cowboys Era." "On Dec. 16, 1987, a teenager named Marco Rubio arrived home from school in West Miami to find his mother in anguish. Earlier that day, federal drug agents raided a house a few miles away that his brother-in-law, Orlando Cicilia, shared with Rubio's older sister, Barbara. Cicilia, a large, sturdily built Cuban immigrant, had played an intimate role in Rubio's early life. But as the future senator from Florida was finishing high school and preparing to go to college, his brother-in-law's illicit career as a cocaine dealer was exposed in a major trial. Cicilia was eventually sentenced to a lengthy prison term in one of the biggest drug cases of Miami's baroque cocaine-cowboys era. Rubio, who was 16 at the time of the arrest, does not mention the ordeal as he runs for president, casting his family's Cuban American immigrant story as the embodiment of the American Dream." The depiction of Cicilia's criminal activities that emerges in those interviews and records goes well beyond the brief description offered by Rubio in his 2012 memoir. In the book, "An American Son," Rubio refers vaguely to Cicilia's involvement "in a criminal enterprise" without mentioning the scope of the drug ring. Rubio, who had moved with his parents back to Miami from Las Vegas more than two years before the arrest, writes poignantly about the arrest's effect on his sister and parents. But he plays down its impact on him personally, noting that his "family's troubles didn't diminish my enthusiasm for the upcoming football season."" (The Washington Post, 12/12/15)

Prosecutors believed that a member of Tabraue's crew had killed Larry Nash, an undercover informant for what was then the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, in 1980 and disposed of his body by dismembering it with a circular saw and burning it in a horse trough filled with charcoal. Nash's body was never found; a jury later decided that Tabraue had committed an act of racketeering by helping to dispose of the informant's corpse. What began as a marijuana-import operation in the late 1970s had blossomed into the far more lucrative business of distributing kilos of cocaine smuggled into South Florida from Colombia. During operation from 1976 to 1986, the ring moved half-a-million pounds of marijuana and 200 pounds of cocaine worth an estimated \$75 million. "It was a very large operation," said Delbert Woodburn, a Miami-Dade narcotics detective who investigated Tabraue in the late 1970s and early 1980s. Rubio Was Only Able To Pay Off His +\$100,00 Student Loan Debt By Receiving A \$800,000 Book Advance From Penguin Group In 2012 For His Memoir. "Rubio graduated from the University of Florida in 1993 and got his law degree from the University of Miami Law School in 1996. He served in local and state offices, including as Speaker of the Florida House of Representatives, before getting elected to the Senate in 2010. His book, "An American Son: A Memoir," was published in 2013. Financial disclosures showed Rubio received an \$800,000 book advance from the publisher, Penguin Group, in 2012, the Tampa Bay Times reported. The disclosures also showed Rubio no longer reported having \$100,000 in student debt. Rubio's annual salary as a US senator has been \$174,000 since taking office in 2011, with his income boosted significantly by book deals and royalties, as is common for US politicians. He published a second book, "American Dreams: Restoring Economic Opportunity for Everyone," in 2015. It's unclear how large a book advance Rubio received for that book, but the Associated Press reported in 2016 that 2012 had been his most lucrative year, suggesting it was less than for his first book." Liquidation Of Retirement Account

In 2014, Rubio Liquidated Most Of His Retirement Accounts Likely Costing Him \$24,000 In Taxes And Penalties. "He liquidated most of his retirement savings last year, though financial experts say that's usually a very bad idea. According to the AP, his financial-disclosure statement shows that he sold six retirement funds in September 2014 for \$68,000. The New York Times reports the move likely cost Rubio about \$24,000 in taxes and penalties, and at the time he had between \$100,000 and \$250,000 in a checking account, between \$50,000 and \$100,000 in a money-market account, and he'd signed a seven-figure book deal." "Florida Sen. Marco Rubio credits his short-lived time as a Mormon for providing a moral compass in his youth, though he also discloses for the first time his family's struggles with the constraints of the faith and his eventual return to the Catholic fold. In his new autobiography, An American Son, available Tuesday, the Florida Republican candidly discusses the three years he spent as a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and lauds the Utah-based faith for helping his Cuban-immigrant mother and him when they moved from Miami to Las Vegas when he was a grade-schooler. "All in all, the Mormon church provided the sound moral structure my mother had wanted for us, and a circle of friends from stable, God-fearing families," Rubio writes in his book. "When we left the church a few years later, mostly at my instigation, we did so with gratitude for its considerable contribution to our happiness in those years."" (*Salt Lake Tribune*, 6/18/12)

"Rubio — a potential running mate to presumptive presidential nominee Mitt Romney, a Mormon - talks for the first time in his memoir about converting to the faith, a family trip to Provo and Salt Lake City to visit temple sites and how seriously he took his new religion. "In contrast to my parents, I immersed myself in LDS theology, and understood it as well as an 8-year-old mind can," Rubio writes. "Although my school grades were never impressive. I was a voracious reader, and I studied church literature and other sources of information to learn all I could about the church's teachings." Rubio's journey to Mormonism began when his family settled in "fascinatingly strange" Las Vegas in 1979. The family's new home, on a cul-de-sac in a working-class neighborhood, was right across the street from his new friends, the Thiriot boys, who were Latter-day Saints. "They were a close-knit family who were always doing things together," Rubio says. "They represented the kind of safe, respectable family life my parents wanted for us." The faith's wholesomeness, its values and the community closeness that came with it drove Rubio, his mother, Oriala, and his sister, Veronica, to baptism. His father, Mario, didn't convert, Rubio writes. Bryan Thiriot, a Republican consultant and legislative chairman of a St. George district, recalls growing up with Rubio, who was also known as Tony, a shortened version of his middle name, Anthony. "We were very close friends growing up there," Thiriot recalls. The two attended school together, sat by each other in church, teamed up on camping trips and competed in Pinewood Derbies. "I would say this straight up, Marco is a very religious man," Thiriot told The Salt Lake Tribune, noting long conversations the two had about faith and politics. "We actually had conversations about Social Security." On occasion, Rubio's chatting got to be too much. "He never stopped talking. He was a constant talker," Thiriot says. "Sometimes he talked so much that he'd get in trouble at school." While LDS values and morals drew the Rubios to the faith, Rubio says, it was

the religion's ban on tobacco, alcohol and coffee that made staying tough. "Some of the church's rules were difficult for my parents, especially my father, to abide by," Rubio says, adding that his dad, who never joined the LDS Church, had smoked since age 13 and worked as a bartender." Rubio Notes Having Been Formally Baptized Into The Mormon Church. "My parents, especially my mother, attributed the neighborhood's wholesomeness to the influence of the Mormon Church. The neighborhood church sponsored a Cub Scout pack, father-&-son camping trips, and various other family activities. Mormons are encouraged by the church to recruit converts to the faith. I had been baptized in the Catholic Church, and when I was very young had regularly attended Mass with my mother. But ours had not been a very Catholic home for some time. By the time I had entered grade school, weekly Mass was no longer part of our family routine, and I had yet to receive the Church's sacraments. I don't believe my mother ever really understood Mormon theology, but her intense desire to be part of a community with upstanding values and caring, cohesive families made her an eager convert. My mother, sister and I were baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter-Day Saints, and began attending Sunday services at the church next door to my school." "Eventually, A Friend From Rubio's Grade School Who Was Catholic Piqued The Future Senator's Interest, And He Began Learning About The Faith His Mother Grew Up In. He Said Leaving The Mormon Religion Was His Decision." "Rubio says he chided his father for slinging booze, but also noted that Cuban coffee was a staple that neither parent would give up. Eventually, a friend from Rubio's grade school who was Catholic piqued the future senator's interest, and he began learning about the faith his mother grew up in. He said leaving the Mormon religion was his decision. "We left the Mormon church with nothing but admiration for the place that had been our first spiritual home in Las Vegas and had been so generous to us," Rubio writes. "I still feel that way." Another book out Tuesday, The Rise of Marco Rubio, by The Washington Post's Manuel Roig-Franzia, also sheds light on Rubio's time as a Mormon. Roig-Franzia writes that Rubio and his cousins adored the Osmond family and Rubio, his sister and their cousin Michelle performed songs from Donny and Marie. The book's author also notes that "faith was a central tenet of Rubio's life" and noted that a young Rubio had an unusual control over his family's religious identity, helping bring them to the Mormon faith and then back to Catholicism. "He really convinced his whole family to switch religions," says cousin Michelle Denis. One thing is clear, Roig-Franzia writes, the Rubio family never asked to be removed from the LDS rolls, "meaning they may still be counted as Mormons by the church."" (Salt Lake Tribune, 6/18/12)
